

The Publishing Playground

Why a Playground? Free play helps you learn to communicate with others, practice conversation, and expand vocabulary on topics that you may never have encountered before. Playgrounds can help learn how to follow and change rules, share, and take risks without punitive strings (or punishments). These kinds of social interactions can also help practice picking up on social cues like body language and tone of voice.

Purpose: Today, you want to 'play' with different modes of publishing writing. In our upcoming multi-genre writing project, you'll want to think about how you want to publish your work AND how you want to 'package' your work. The tools you'll be working with today may impact your decision making as you move through the unit. You want to take time to play and experiment with a variety of tools that will shape your project. Use the chart below to help you keep track of your thinking as you play. You want to take good notes of ideas as they occur to you so that you can reference this throughout the end of the semester.
