This week, I want to focus on the role Catholic Social Teaching plays in shaping our school environment, guiding us towards building a just and compassionate world. Here at Christ the King, we strive to integrate these Catholic Social Teaching principles into everything we do.

One of the cornerstones of Catholic Social Teaching is the Dignity of the **Human Being**. We believe that every person, from our youngest students to our dedicated staff, is created in the image and likeness of God. This means fostering an atmosphere of respect, understanding, and inclusivity. We celebrate our diverse backgrounds and perspectives, recognising the unique value each individual brings to our school family. This fortnight we have seen this lived out in the learning the students have undertaken for Reconciliation Week. As Ms Carolyn Freebairn shares below, our students uphold the human dignity of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples by acknowledging their history, respecting their cultures, and working towards a future where they have equal opportunities and a rightful place in Australian society. This week I was also grateful to the staff and students at Iona College who welcomed our F.I.R.E Carrier Leaders to their school to witness their Commissioning Ceremony. Focused on reconciliation,

Another key principle of Catholic Social Teaching is **Common Good**. We are all interconnected, and our well-being is linked to the well-being of others. In our school community, this translates to a sense of shared responsibility. Students are encouraged to participate in activities that benefit the wider community. We learn to think beyond ourselves and consider the needs of our classmates, teachers, and the world beyond school. This was demonstrated spectacularly during our Kicking for Viqueque celebrations on Thursday when students learnt about the education, healthcare, and infrastructure projects supported by their fundraising. Together our community raised over \$1500. I'd like to particularly thank Mr Chris Hansen for sharing his tireless work in Viqueque with us and for helping us facilitate this partnership. I'd also like to thank and acknowledge Mr Keegan Doherty, Mrs Jessica Young and Mr Kieran Whelan for their hard work in making this day a success.

Solidarity is another important Catholic Social Teaching principle. It reminds us that we are called to stand in unity with others. Whilst this takes many forms at our school, we often see this lived out through our Social and Emotional Learning programs which promote positive social interactions and foster a sense of belonging. At Christ the King students learn to appreciate diversity, celebrate differences, and create a safe space for everyone. This sense of community strengthens the foundation for solidarity within the school. In the same way, it was a delight this fortnight to come together for our JLC Community Conversation. Delivered by Kate Davidson, accredited Mental Health Social Worker and Director of Wonderkind & Co Therapeutic Consultancy, this session provided parenting strategies to build psychological strength, extend emotional intelligence and encourage age appropriate independence.

The principle of **Participation and Subsidiarity** teaches us that decisions should be made at the most appropriate level. At Christ the King we know that Learning Conversations enable our students to become confident and articulate as they clarify their understanding and execution of their learning goals. Learning Conversations provide students with the opportunity to build strong relationships with their teachers as they work together to continually improve the child's performance by applying targeted feedback. This fortnight it has been wonderful to welcome many families onsite as children further take ownership of their learning by conduction Student Led Learning Walks.

By integrating these principles into our daily lives, we create a school community that is not only academically strong but also ethically grounded in Catholic Mission. As we move forward, let us continue to work together to foster a learning environment that celebrates the Catholic Social Teaching principles, and empowers individuals to contribute positively to the world around them.

Some additional information below from our School Uniform Policy:

- **Hair** As per the advice of the Head Lice policy, long hair must be tied back. Ribbons and other accessories must be school colours navy blue, white or red. Extreme hairstyles and unnatural hair colour are not acceptable (exemption may occur for approved fundraising days). School Hats can be purchased from the Office.
