Pondering Prayer concept

Sermon - please do not record this message.

Last week's message was: God always comes down, invites us into relationship, tells us to go and multiply, and then fills all who follow him with his Spirit so we can live in community while facing outward. Today we'll see what facing outward looks like. First, a little theology, then some transparency.

Some theology

Trinity -

- the Divine Community¹
- Humanity the extension of the Divine Community

God did not create us just to receive love and honor from us, but to share the love, joy, honor, and glory he already had within the Trinity.²

Motivation -

A riff on the journey from gratitude (Ez 16, especially v 42-3, 53-54a, 59-63) to intimacy (Rom 5.1-5, 11).

The value of building community³ - Keller's Every Good Endeavor.

Every good endeavor, when pursued in response to God's prompting, matters forever. 1 Cor

15.58. ...nothing you do for the Lord is ever useless.

Human beings "filling the earth" means something far more than plants and animals filling the earth. It means more than procreation; it means building and caring for civilization. He gives this job to us.

Jesus didn't save us so that we can go to heaven; heaven is a by-product. He saved us to life as his intimate ally in this life and the next.

In this life, we are to display who God is to a watching world. And when people notice something different about how we operate and react, we are to find ways to deflect God's glory to the watching world.

Andy Crouch writing about his wife: In her work as a physics professor, Catherine can do much to shape the culture of her courses and her research lab. In a laboratory's sterile and technological environment, she can play classical music to create an atmosphere of creativity and beauty. She can shape how her students respond to exciting and disappointing results and can model both hard work and good rest rather than frantic work and fitful procrastination. By occasionally bringing her children with her to work, she creates a culture where the family is not an interruption. Instead, it's where research and teaching are natural parts of a mother's life. By inviting her students into our home, she shows that she values them as persons, not just research productivity units. At the small scale of her laboratory and classroom, she has the real ability to reshape the world.⁵

Work is partnering with God in his love and care for the world. This biblical conception helps us appreciate all work, from the most simple to the most complex, by believers and nonbelievers. Christians with a biblical theology of work not only value and participate in the work of all people but also see ways to work in ways distinct to Christians.

God is the Creator of the world, and our work mirrors his creative work when we create a culture that conforms to his will and vision for human beings – when it matches up with the biblical storyline. God does more than create. He loves, cares for, and nurtures his creation. He feeds and protects all he has made. And we must do this same building and nurture of culture.

God is the only boss who will not drive us into the ground; the only audience that does not need our best performance to be satisfied with us. Why? Because his work for us is finished.

Some transparency

I'm a bit shy about telling personal stories. They make my wife uncomfortable. But at the same time, I frequently preach the importance of living transparently in our world. So this morning I'll be a bit transparent.
