**Course Description:** Welcome to Human Geography Over the next semester, we will discover ways in which geography shapes the world around us. This course focuses on reinforcing geographic concepts that can be applied to a variety of locales around the world. By exploring prominent global features –cultures, settlements, and economies – we will begin to see how multiple elements combine to form our understanding of regions and identities.

## **Instructional Philosophy:**

The course will extend the 9th-grade students' understanding of the world around them through a detailed exploration of geographic concepts and skills. Strong emphasis will be placed on applying geographic thinking to interpret real-world problems and evaluate the solutions that are being pursued. Students will be challenged to predict cause-and-effect relationships regarding human actions and the physical environment. Students will also be introduced to a number of tools geographers use to collect and analyze data such as Geographic Information Systems, The Global Positioning System, and Google Earth.

## **Course Goals and State Standards:**

#### **Major Assessment Tools**

- Students will analyze primary sources often in Human Geography class. The students will develop skills of narrative, argumentative, and/ or explanatory writing.
- Students should expect some form of formal evaluation at the end of every unit. These will include traditional tests, but also could include other authentic assessments the teacher feels are appropriate.
- Assessments such as quizzes and small tests may also be used mid-unit as the teacher attempts to assess student progress throughout a unit of study.
- Students should expect to complete at least one major project every nine weeks.
- Map tests will be given in conjunction with each unit of study.

#### Other Assessment Information:

- Unlike middle school, we do not have a "no zero" policy. A student will receive a zero if work is not completed or turned in. See the policy for late work above.

They are designed thematically to aid in a student's overall comprehension of the material under study. Diligent and accurate completion of the study guide and maps in addition to classwork, note taking, reading, and study of all of the aforementioned should prepare the student for all unit tests.

## **Behavior Expectations and Consequences:**

- 1. **Be prompt.** Be at your desk and ready to begin class when the bell rings.
- 2. **Be respectful.** Treat everyone in the classroom with the courtesy and respect you wish to receive yourself. Pay attention and do not distract others. Also, respect the property, personal space, and opinions of others.

- 5. **Be present.** I expect you to be in class every day! Do not ask to leave the classroom unless it is an emergency.

<u>Consequences:</u> First offense – Warning; Second offense – Parent Contact; Third offense – Jordan detention; Fourth/Excessive issues - office referral.
