Some extra notes:

- You can research FOSTA/SESTA (Stop Enabling Sex Traffickers Act and Fight Online Sex Trafficking Act) for more information on what the law looks like.
- Finding banking discrimination information is hard on google, so if you want to learn more, google "lending discrimination." Many of the same issues apply to other aspects of banking and overlap with sex workers, but sex workers are rarely mentioned because sex workers aren't protected under most related laws.
- Something we didn't get to in the show is PayPal's discrimination against sex workers
 and campaign to get rid of them. They go through periodic cycles of doing that, it is worth
 researching. They often find ways to steal at least some of the money sex workers have
 as they do so.
- Violence against sex workers by police is high, this often includes sexual assault. This
 means that sex workers not only fear police because they could arrested, they also often
 feel they can't turn to police if they are in danger.
- The police often don't take action in cases of violence against sex workers, this includes cases of murder against sex workers.
- Something else not mentioned in the show is financial institutions are often willing to work with police to uncover sex work related crime. This generally happens on a larger scale, like when planning raids on spas.
- Some examples of sex work: Escorts, Street Workers/Prostitutes, Stripping, Camgirl/webcam model, Nude model, phone sex operators
- The Black and Missing Foundation, Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women, and the Coalition to Stop Violence Against Native Women were in my notes because I wanted to mention some other marginalizations and risks. Trafficking is a minor topic in their overall scope.
