 - 2. The police force is too large and militarized. A 50% reduction in budget is being called for and that money would be put back into the community. Follow the link above to sign the petition. Here's 3 budgets from the Seattle City Budget to help show inflated police budget:
 - a. \$409 Million Seattle Police Department
 - b. \$195 Million Human Services

c. \$99 Million - Education

iii. <u>Email to Tacoma City Council</u> to fire and arrest the officers involved in the Emmanuel Ellis case and to oppose a budget increase for the Tacoma Police Department and reallocate those funds to community programs.
