

Grade Schemes

The app handles most of the grade schemes around the world. It also allows you to modify and create custom schemes to suit your school.

Built-In

North America ▲

The built in grade schemes are **grouped into regions**, only to make them easier to find. You can use a grade scheme regardless of your actual location.

A Grade Scheme consists of levels, which are based on percent, grade point or grade. A grading scheme can be set for each semester, in the **Edit Semester** screen.

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Overview of Grading Types

Percent Based

These Grade Schemes are primarily based on percent, your mark as a percent is used to decide which level to place your performance.

Percent Based Grades

Here based on percent cutoffs you are awarded a grade. This is common in **Canada and Australia** e.g. 85% or more is given HD for High Distinction.

Percent Based Grades and Grade Points

Here based on percent cutoffs you are awarded a grade and a grade point. This might be common in **US High Schools**, Philippines and Malaysia.

Percent Based Grade Points

Here based on percent cutoffs you are awarded a grade point. This is common in Turkey.

None - Only Percent

Here there are no grades or grade points, and only percent marks are used.

Non-Percent Based

Non-Percent Based Grades and Grade Points

Here you are awarded a grade regardless of your mark in percent. This grade is also linked to a grade point. This is common in **US universities**. e.g you are awarded an A grade which also means 4.0 GPA.

Non-Percent Based Grade Points

You are awarded a grade point regardless of your mark in percent. This is common in European countries like France and Netherlands.

Non-Percent Based Grade

Here you are awarded a grade regardless of your mark in percent. This is common in England.

***Reverse GP** is when the grade points go in reverse order, where the lower the grade point the better it is. Common in Philippines and Germany.*

Sample Data by Grade Scheme

The App comes with sample data in the different grading schemes so you can test the app with a grade scheme like your's or close to your's.

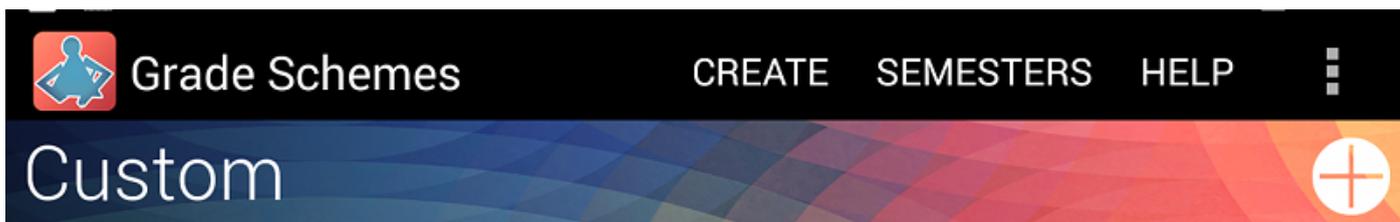

Note: This is only a rough grouping, you can apply a specific grading scheme to the sample data afterwards.

Creating your Grading Scheme

In the Grade Schemes screen click on create or the plus icon.



There are two ways to go about this: choose a built-in grade scheme similar to yours to import from and then edit it. Or make one scratch.

Importing and Modifying

1. Choose **Import** from the action menu
2. Select the grading scheme to import from.
3. App will load the levels and choose the grading type for you
4. Initially there will be no errors in the grading levels.
5. Click on the level to make changes
6. Once there are **no warnings** you will be able to **save** the grade scheme.

Creating from Scratch

1. Enter the name for the scheme
2. Choose the grading type. Note options without “Non Percent” are Percent Based.
3. Click on **Add Level**, work your way from the highest to the lowest.
4. Once there are **no warnings** you will be able to **save** the grade scheme.

Here is an example of how the levels will look like, touch them to edit them.

100 ≥	≤ 90	A
4.0 ≥	≤ 3.5	
90 >	≤ 80	B
3.5 >	≤ 3.0	
80 >	≤ 70	C
3.0 >	≤ 2.5	
70 >	≤ 60	D
2.5 >	≤ 2.0	
60 >	≤ 0	F
2.0 >	≤ 0.0	

Common Warnings

Last Level Should Cover 0%

Percent based grade schemes the last level should cover ($\leq 0\%$). You will often see this after you add your first level, but will disappear after you have added your last level.

First Level Should Cover 100%

Percent based grade schemes the first level should cover ($100 \geq$)

Overlap between this and above Level

For example the level above will go from 75 to 80 and this level goes from 60 to 70.

You will also get this if a cutoff is shared, only one of these two levels can have an *equal* to the cutoff mark.

$100 \geq$	≤ 75	A
$75 \geq$	≤ 0	B
Overlap between this and above level.		

This is the correct way

$100 \geq$	≤ 75	A
$75 >$	≤ 0	B

Note this will occur with grade points too.

To should be equal or greater than From

You will get this if you have entered the cutoffs the other way around. eg. You have entered $75 > \leq 80$ rather than $80 \geq < 75$.
