

Netflix releases first part of 'Bridgerton' season 3

The eagerly awaited first part of "Bridgerton" Season 3 premieres on Netflix this Thursday. This season of Shonda Rhimes' historical romance series will focus on the love story between Colin Bridgerton (Luke Newton) and Penelope Featherington (Nicola Coughlan).
