**The Vanuatu Government has become the first nation-state to call for a Fossil Fuel Non Proliferation Treaty.**

The President of Vanuatu His Excellency Nikenike Vurobaravu called on the UN General Assembly to develop a Fossil Fuel Non Proliferation Treaty to stop the expansion of new fossil fuel projects, and manage a global fair transition away from coal, oil and gas.

In Vanuatu's address to the UN General Assembly on September 23, they called for nations to use *all* legal pathways to protect human rights from the devastation caused by coal, oil and gas production.

The President will take this historic first call to the main stage of the Global Citizen Festival in Central Park on September 24.

Vanuatu needs support from around the world to amplify this call and for movements and leaders globally to urge other nation states to join them.

## Overview

**Today at the UN General Assembly, Vanuatu called on other nations to join them in establishing a Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty.**

They are the first **nation-state to call for an international mechanism** to stop new oil, gas and coal projects and create new negotiations on how to manage a global just transition away from fossil fuels.

**Vanuatu aims to tackle the primary cause of the climate crisis: fossil fuels.** According to the latest IPCC report, coal, oil and gas are responsible for 86 percent of all carbon dioxide emissions in the past decade.

While the UN Secretary General, International Energy Agency, World Health Organization and IPCC have all signalled that new fossil fuel projects are inconsistent with our climate targets, governments and corporations plan to produce more than double the fossil fuels in 2030 than is consistent with limiting warming to 1.5°C.

**Today marks a pivotal moment in the journey towards greater global governance of fossil fuel production.** For the past two years, the proposed Fossil Fuel Treaty has gained support from thousands of civil society organisations, major cities, hundreds of Parliamentarians, Nobel Laureates, Indigenous peoples, trade unions, faith leaders, youth activists and health professionals. Now the proposal has been made by Vanuatu within the international policy arena. Similar political moments were pivotal in the pathway towards treaties to manage nuclear weapons, landmines and chlorofluorocarbons.

This historic call comes at a critical moment of global climate loss and damage, upending livelihoods and costing human lives. **His Excellency President Nikenike Vurobaravu invited members of the UN General Assembly to join Vanuatu in developing a Fossil Fuel Treaty on the global stage.**

**Vanuatu's call for a Fossil Fuel Treaty continues to build on their leadership in global climate policy.** [Vanuatu has recently launched efforts to secure an advisory opinion from the International Court of Justice on the human rights impacts of climate change.](#) The advisory opinion would inform lawsuits around the world and strengthen vulnerable countries' position in international negotiations. This initiative was recently backed by Pacific leaders at the Pacific Islands Forum.

Earlier this month, [Vanuatu also submitted a groundbreaking update to its commitments under the Paris Agreement](#) to include phasing out fossil fuels and a costing of tackling destruction caused by rising seas and wild weather. The enhanced action plan is one of the first to comprehensively address loss and damage from climate impacts at a country level.

This multi-pronged approach to seeking greater climate policy through multiple multilateral forums – within the UNFCCC, the International Court of Justice and now through a Treaty on fossil fuels – **paves the way for a new era of international climate policy focused on equity and justice and addressing the biggest drivers of the climate crisis – coal, oil, and gas.**

## Key Messages

- **Pacific leadership has been essential to the international response to the climate crisis for decades.** Pacific nations have been champions of international agreements on climate change in general and on the specific and useful mechanisms within them from the UN Framework Convention, its Kyoto Protocol, and the more recent Paris Agreement. Vanuatu continues this leadership today through their call for a Fossil Fuel Treaty.
- Despite consistent warnings from climate scientists and civil society that emissions must fall dramatically, **even without any fossil fuel expansion there is currently enough coal, oil and gas under production to take global heating well beyond our global climate target of 1.5°C.** The most recent estimates are that, for even a 50% probability of staying below 1.5°C, expansion of fossil fuels must end and approximately 40% of developed reserves must remain in the ground.
- Current international climate agreements primarily focus on emissions reductions and make no explicit mention of fossil fuels. **The Paris Agreement** sets the benchmark for global climate action through its global temperature goal but **can be complemented by a Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty with three clear pillars:** 1) end expansion of fossil fuel production, 2) phase down existing production in line with 1.5°C, and 3) enable a global just transition for every worker, community and country.
- **The push for a Treaty to manage a global just transition draws significant lessons from other treaties to manage global threats,** such as nuclear weapons, landmines and chlorofluorocarbons. Pacific policy leadership was critical to securing many of these mechanisms and now we are seeing them also lead the push for a Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty.






