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Books:

Apcar, Lucille. *Shibaraku: Memories of Japan 1926-1946*. Parker, CO: Outskirts Press, 2011.

A unique situation of foreigners living in Japan prior and during WWII and the American soldiers they met during the occupation.

de Coningh, C. T. Assendelft and Martha Chaiklin. *A Pioneer in Yokohama: A Dutchman's Adventures in the New Treaty Port*. Cambridge, MA: Hackett Publishing Co., 2012.

In relating the story of his life on the island of Deshima and in the port of Yokohama during the late 1850's, Dutch merchant C. T. Assendelft de Coningh provides both an unprecedented eyewitness account of daily life in the Japanese treaty ports and a unique perspective on the economic, military, and political forces the Western imperial powers brought to bear on newly opened Japan.

Hall, Francis. *Japan Through American Eyes: The Journal of Francis Hall, Kanagawa and Yokohama, 1859-1866*. Princeton, NJ: Princeton University Press, 1992.

This abridgement of the unique journal of Francis Hall, America's leading business pioneer in nineteenth century Japan, offers a remarkable view of the period leading to the Meiji Restoration.

Hammer, Joshua. *Yokohama Burning: The Deadly 1923 Earthquake and Fire That Helped Forge the Path to World War II*. New York: Free Press, 2006.

Describes one of the worst natural disasters of the twentieth century: the earthquakes, fires, and tsunamis of September 1923 that destroyed Yokohama and most of Tokyo.

Hayes, Peter and Toshie Habu. *Adoption in Japan: Comparing Policies for Children in Need*. New York: Routledge, 2006.

The authors explore how Japanese society views adoption.

Jansen, Marius. *Making of Modern Japan*. Cambridge, MA: Belknap Press, 2002.

Describes Japanese society from 1600-present day.

Lavrov, George. *Yokohama Gaijin: Memoir of a Foreigner Born in Japan*. Bloomington, IN: AuthorHouse, 2012.

Similar to Leslie Helm, George Lavrov was born and raised in Yokohama. During 1975-1986, he was based in Tokyo where he represented American insurance interests. This is his personal story of his experiences in Japan.

Penn, Wilhelmina. *Thursdays in Yokohama*. Sapporo, Japan: Forest River Press, 2013.

A Japanese man meets with someone new to Japan every Thursday afternoon on the Bluff in Yokohama for coffee and conversation. (Fiction)

Poole, Otis Manchester. *The Death of Old Yokohama: In the Great Japanese Earthquake of 1923*. New York: Routledge, 2010.

First hand account of the disaster told by a survivor written immediately after the earthquake.

Pyle, Kenneth. *Making of Modern Japan*. Boston, Cengage Learning, 1995.
Analyzes the dynamics of historical change, discussing the major forces in Japan's development from 1600 to the present day, including samurai officialdom, industrialization, militarism, and social values.

Salvaggio, Eryk. *This Japanese Life*. CreateSpace Independent Publishing Platform, 2013.

Tackles the existential issues of living in a radically foreign culture.
