Concept note

Climate change burdens all of humanity, but not equally. Indigenous women and girls are disproportionately affected by the climate crisis because of their high dependence on the ecosystems in which they live. Their economic activities, as well as their social, cultural and spiritual relations, are directly linked to their environment. Climate change and environmental degradation exacerbate the difficulties already faced by indigenous women and girls including political and economic marginalization, loss of land and resources, human rights violations, discrimination and unemployment.

The interlinkage between climate crisis and gender inequality is one of the greatest challenges of our humanity. Gender inequalities rooted in legal and social norms and gender-differentiated roles and responsibilities dictate how women and men access and have control over land use and tenure, as well as over natural resources related to forests, agriculture, water and fisheries. The disparate impact of climate change on women and girls amplifies existing structured inequalities and poses unique threats to their livelihoods, health, and safety.

When environmental disasters happen, indigenous women and girls face multiple and intersecting forms of discrimination in accessing resources, information, mobility and decision-making spaces. Their health is further endangered by limiting access to services and health care, as well as increasing risks related to maternal and child health. Indigenous women and girls are less able to access relief and assistance, further threatening their livelihoods, wellbeing and recovery, and creating a vicious cycle of vulnerability to future disasters. Furthermore, weather-related disasters may forcibly displace indigenous women and girls or force them to migrate thus increasing their exposure to gender-based violence, such as human trafficking or any other form of exploitation while experiencing discrimination as both migrants and as indigenous peoples. Climate-related displacement, loss of livelihoods, food insecurity and increasing conflict over resources place indigenous women and girls at heightened risk. Indigenous women and girls face also risks arising from actions taken to mitigate climate change. Furthermore, climate change contributes significantly to the loss of traditional and spiritual ways of life of indigenous women and girls, and negatively affects their cultural identity.
