About the Teacher: This is my 19th year teaching in North Carolina and 4th year at Hopewell High School. I have taught at North Meck(10yrs), Hough(3yrs), and Mountain Island Charter Schools(2yrs). I have also coached soccer and lacrosse. I was ranked #3 Math teacher in CMS in 2007 using growth model. I am from Rome, NY. I received my Bachelor of Science in Mathematics from Clarkson University in Potsdam, NY in 1998.

• Classroom Rules

Refer to Hopewell School rules. I will enforce school policies in addition to the following:

- 1. When the bells rings, the student must be in the assigned seat with needed materials ready and begin on the Warm-up activity.
- 2. All assignments must be in pencil, notes may be done in pen
- 3. No heads on the desk or sleeping permitted.
- 4. No person grooming in class. (brushing hair, lotion, make-up, etc..)
- 5. No eating or drinking in class with the exception of bottled water.
- 6. Remain seated until the bell rings.
- 7. Respect yourself and others
- 8. No cell Phones, if they are visible they will be confiscated and follow Hopewell's Policy
- 9. Severe Disruptions: Students will be sent to lock-out and a Discipline referral will follow
- 10. No hats/hoods are allowed in class
- 12. Do not do other class assignments in class
- 13. No cheating (giving or receiving answers or copying homework)

Remediation and Reassessment: Every student at Hopewell High School will be given an opportunity to master course objectives through a variety of strategies provided during class and outside of class. Student's formal grades will be broken down by objectives. After each formal assessment, every student will be given the opportunity to improve their mastery of specific concepts and then demonstrate this improvement to improve their grade." Students who score a 79% or below can retest after completing remediation (Test corrections and fill

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out the specific form). A final quarter test will be given and that will average the two grades if they improve (maximum grade they can achieve is a 79). It is the student's responsibility to initiate and complete the remediation and retest process within two weeks after the original test date (unless other arrangements are made with the teacher).

Attendance Policy: It is expected that students arrive to class before the tardy bell. Students who arrive late must get a tardy pass from student services. Students who miss more than 10 class periods in a semester must make arrangements with the teacher to recover this missed class time. Students who do not do make up missed time, over 10 class periods, will receive a grade of "F" according to N.C. law.

Leaving Class and Dismissal: Students should not ask to leave the room for any reason other than a restroom break or an emergency. Per school policy, no one is to leave class the first or last 15 minutes of class. The classroom teacher will dismiss the class - not the bell.

Honor Code Policy/Violation:

CMS-Hopewell High School Honor Code: Hopewell High School is committed to the academic, social, and ethical development of all students. Plagiarism and cheating do not allow for a student to maximize their learning and compromises trust between student and teacher. It is the expectation that all students will demonstrate responsibility and integrity. Responsible students take ownership for their learning and their actions at all times. When students show integrity they do the right thing when no one else is looking.

Consequences for Honor Code Violations:

1st Offense: 0 for assignment, teacher - parent contact, student completes a reflection, opportunity to redo assignment (no grade higher than a 79%) 2nd Offense: 0 for assignment, 1 day ISS, and required parent conference.

Student make up assignment for up to a 50% grade.

3rd Offense: 0 for assignment, parent contact and 1 day OSS. Student NOT eligible for re-take.

Tardies will be teacher managed. Students are considered tardy if they are not in your classroom at the sound of the bell. Being in the horseshoe is no longer acceptable. Students must be in class. If a student is late, they will enter the teachers classroom and the teacher will record the tardy in PS. Students entering more than 10 minutes late will be counted as truant and report to lockout room for the block (unexcused absence)

. <u>1-4 Unexcused Tardies</u>: Teacher records tardy, verbally warns student about expectations and calls home by the fourth tardy to speak to a parent/quardian.

5 Unexcused Tardies: Teacher speaks with student, calls home, and submits disciplinary referral. Disciplinary actions include a period of In School Suspension (ISS) or other disciplinary consequences.

5-9 Unexcused Tardies: Teacher calls home, submits disciplinary referral, and student is given consequences. Range of consequences includes In School Suspension (ISS) or revocation of school privileges.

<u>10+ Unexcused Tardies:</u> Student is given Out of School Suspension (OSS) and parent conference is held prior to student returning to school.

Truancy: A student is considered *truant* if they report to class more than 10 minutes after class without an excused pass. Students will report to the lockout room for the entire block and receive an unexcused absence.

Personal Electronic Device: Hopewell High School enforces a strict ban on electronic devices during the instructional setting. Personal electronic devices include, but are *not* limited to: cellular phones, pagers, smart phones, music and media players, gaming devices, tablets, laptop computers, smartwatches, personal digital assistants, earphones, headphones, iPods, and speakers. CMS recommends that students do not bring personal electronic devices to school. Hopewell High School assigns each student a laptop for their use.

- -Student use of an electronic device will be permitted from 6:45 a.m. through 7:07 a.m. (breakfast) during the student's assigned lunch, and before/after school ONLY. Headphones and earbuds are NOT permitted during school hours except during breakfast and the student's assigned lunch. Once students enter the instructional environment, cell phones are strictly prohibited. Student use of phones for instructional purposes in the classroom is at the classroom teacher's discretion.
- -Students are required to ask their teacher's permission to use an electronic device for academic purposes.

Personal electronic devices may not be used to cause any disruption in the educational process or for unethical or illegal purposes. Prohibited uses include, but are not limited to: cheating on assignments and/or tests, harassing or bullying others, and taking or distributing unauthorized photographs or recordings of other people. Students are not permitted to record school activities held during school hours without explicit permission from a teacher or staff member. Students caught filming/recording disruptive or prohibited behavior on campus will be subject to discipline.

- -Students will not be able to answer phone calls or video chat during breakfast, lunch or class transitions. Students must use the main office phone or teacher office phones. Permission must be granted in advance by the teacher.
- -Parents/Guardians are encouraged to call the front office if an important message must be relayed to the student.

Student Consequences:

First offense: The device will be confiscated and secured in the office. A written warning will be issued to the student. A parent or legal guardian may pick it up during after school hours between 2:30 and 3:30 pm or 6:45 and 7:15 am. If a student refuses to surrender the device, a disciplinary consequence will be issued, up to and including suspension.

Future offenses will be considered insubordination and consequences assigned accordingly. This can include suspension and revocation of technology privileges.

***All student consequences are subject to administrative review. An individual student consequence may be increased or decreased, depending on the severity of the incident. These

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changes will be made at the discretion of the student's administrator. CMS will not be responsible or liable for, the theft, loss, data loss, damage to any personal electronic device brought to school.

<u>Late Work</u>: Per CMS policy, students will receive a maximum of 65% on any late work showing concerted effort, if turned in at the beginning of class one day after the original due date. After this, late work showing a concerted effort will receive a 50% if turned in prior to the first day of the midterms (1^{st} and 3^{rd} quarters) or the final exams (2^{rd} and 4^{th} quarters).

<u>Make up Work:</u> When a student is absent from class, arrangements for all make-up work, including homework, quizzes and review quizzes/tests must be made within five days of returning. Arrangements need to be made <u>by the student</u> with the teacher to complete missed assignments. If a student returns from a 1 day absence on the day of a test, he or she will be expected to take the test with the class. Final responsibility for making up class work and test lies with the student. The student must be responsible for making up all missed work and tests. If a student is absent on the day of a test, he or she must make arrangements to make up the test after school with the teacher.

<u>Communication</u>: Accurate information about what is going on in school does not always make it from students to parents. The following can help ensure you are aware of what is going on in class and your child's progress. I will send out class email (distribution list) on due dates on major assessments and other pertinent information. I will use your information from powerschool, if is incorrect be sure to email me your correct email and information so you are informed.
