INTRODUCTION

Describe the background of the problem, objectives, and expected benefits of the research, as well as a review of relevant literature, and end with a hypothesis. This section should also include: (a) the current state of the art related to the topic being researched (as cited from primary and current sources); (b) knowledge gaps; (c) the researchers' arguments regarding their efforts to close the gap as a contribution of the research to scientific progress; (d) a description of the research objectives; and (e) the formulation of research questions or research hypotheses.

(This section should be a maximum of 20% of the entire manuscript. Written in Times New Roman, 11 pt, justified, single spaced)

METHOD

Research Design

Describe the research design. Authors are also expected to justify their decision in choosing a particular design by adapting it to the research objectives/hypotheses/questions.

Participants [Use the term "participants," not "subjects." The word "subject" should only be used for animals.]

Describe the criteria for participant recruitment and the demographic characteristics of the participants (e.g., age, gender, education level, etc.). Also describe the sampling technique used. For **qualitative research articles**, in addition to describing the characteristics of the participants, the author also needs to describe the

characteristics of the researcher that may affect the data collection and/or recording process.

Measurement (for quantitative research) or Data Collection Strategy (for qualitative research and literature reviews)

Clearly describe the author's strategy for measuring all study variables. Include detailed scale formats and response options. Also include results of reliability and/or validity estimates (if applicable). Describe how scores were calculated for analysis (e.g., by summation, averaging, etc.). If the author conducted any assumption tests (e.g., normality tests), include them in this section and describe them in as much detail as possible.

For a systematic review or meta-analysis, this section should at least include keywords for the literature search, inclusion and exclusion criteria, and a PRISMA flow diagram (http://prisma-statement.org/prismastatement/flow diagram.aspx)

Data analysis

Describe the statistical tests or other data analysis techniques used by the authors. Also include the software used and its version.

(This section should only cover a maximum of 20% of the entire manuscript [except for qualitative research articles which may have a longer Methods section]. Written in Times New Roman, 11 pt, justified, single spaced)

RESULTS

This section should include the results of descriptive analysis (where relevant) and the results of hypothesis testing, which are then critically analyzed and presented sequentially or in an integrated manner. Avoid narratives about data interpretation. If any, include tables/graphs/figures that are already meaningful and easy to understand. Tables/graphs/figures should not contain raw data that requires further processing. The most recommended visual data presentations

are line charts and bar charts (avoid using pie charts).

For **qualitative research**, describe the findings (e.g., themes, categories, or narratives) along with examples of the analytical process that led to those findings (e.g., data quotes). The Results section may also include illustrations (e.g., diagrams, tables, models, etc.) as long as they are relevant and useful in explaining the findings. Photos and links to videos may also be included, if appropriate.

The results obtained from the research have to be supported by sufficient data. The research results and the discovery must be the answers or the research hypothesis or research question stated previously in the introduction part.

DISCUSSION

This section contains an explanation of the findings (interpretation of research data), comparison with findings from previous studies, and their relation to the current state. The Discussion section usually gives significance to the results of the data analysis and compares them with previous findings (cited from relevant, current, and primary sources). This section should conclude that the research adds new knowledge related to the knowledge gap as its contribution to scientific progress.

(This section should only cover 30%-40% of the entire manuscript. Written in Times New Roman, 11 pt, justified, single spaced)

CONCLUSION

The content of this section should answer the research question (rather than simply summarize results of the study) and include recommendations for future research or other relevant parties. Conclusions recommendations should be concise and clear. The summary should be based on the Results and Discussion section (maximum three paragraphs) and should be written in narrative form (not bullet points) that summarizes the results of the data analysis and discussion, and highlights new insights from the study that contribute to the advancement of psychology (or science in general).

Authors **should** declare any potential conflicts of interest that might influence the way in which they conduct their research and report and present their results. If none exist, the author may write the following statement:

"[Author name] does not work for, consult, own shares in, or receive funding from any company or organization that would benefit from this manuscript, and has disclosed no affiliations other than those noted above."

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REFERENCE

Write the reference list alphabetically and chronologically. This section **is not a bibliography**, so only cited sources should be listed. Do not include sources that are not cited in the text. The sources listed (and cited) should be: (a) relevant; (b) current (published in the last 10 years; at least 80% of the list); and (c) primary (mainly from journal articles; at least 80% of the list). The style of writing references follows the following writing style: The references format using APA (American Psychological Association) 6th Edition Style.
