Allergic reaction

- Refers to spectrum of hypersensitivity reactions including urticaria, angioedema, anaphylaxis and anaphylactoid reactions
- Simple reactions involving only the skin are **NOT** termed anaphylaxis

What elements in the history are essential?

Features of impending anaphylaxis

- Lump in throat, voice hoarseness, swelling of lips, tongue
- Dizziness, lightheadedness, syncope
- Chest pain, breathlessness
- Abdominal pain or cramps, nausea/vomiting

What dangerous differentials should I not miss?

Asthma, croup, epiglottitis, foreign body aspiration Hereditary angioedema

What should I look out for on examination?

Resp: Angioedema of tongue/lips, stridor, voice hoarseness, wheezing.

CVS: Hypotension, tachycardia

Derm: Urticaria (raised generalized erythema)

GI: Abdominal pain, distension, diarrhoea, vomiting

What tests should I do?

Allergies are a clinical diagnosis, lab tests are pointless

What treatment should I institute?

Symptomatic Rx - antihistamines and analgesia (if stings etc.) Remove sting if present Steroids <u>only necessary in food allergies</u>

Can the patient go home if symptoms have improved?

Yes

What outpatient management is appropriate?

Anti-histamines

Steroids (0.5mg/kg) for 3 days only if food allergy

Dermatology/immunology appointment for recurrent cases or children with first onset reactions

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
