2026 Watch Party Overview

What is a watch party?

EOF hosts an Annual Budget and Tax Briefing to provide funders with the opportunity to network with colleagues and learn about and discuss pressing political developments, federal and state budget and tax battles and opportunities, and how the current landscape impacts families, workers, and communities. It is the only event of its kind focused on philanthropy and budget and tax policy.

Since 2014, watch parties have been organized to expand our reach to funders unable to participate in person by web-streaming our plenary sessions on the federal and state budget and tax outlook.

The purpose of the watch parties is to help funders:

- Gain a better understanding of this year's pressing federal budget and tax issues and their impact on families, workers, and communities;
- Learn more about coordinated efforts underway to shape the budget and tax fights ahead; and
- Consider grantmaking strategies and opportunities for collaboration with like-minded stakeholders.

As a watch party host, you set up (and co-brand) registration for your watch party. EOF will share the Zoom livestream and recording links for registrants. **There are two options for structuring a watch party.**

1. **Offer a Supplemental Program:** This is a great way to add value for your attendees. After streaming our event, you can host an in-person or virtual discussion with local experts on how the federal budget and tax landscape impacts your state or area of interest (e.g. early childhood, workforce development, etc.). You can show the live stream/recording during your event or share the link with attendees as pre-viewing. You also have the option of sharing the state budget and tax outlook link as pre-viewing for your program.
2. **Webstream Viewing:** If you don't have the capacity to provide a supplemental program, you can simply share the provided Zoom link(s) with your registrants.

There is no fee to participate. All watch party hosts will be recognized on the EOF website and in meeting materials.

Why budget and tax policy matter to funders.

Charitable foundations are working hard to reduce poverty, increase housing stability, reduce hunger, increase access to quality affordable child care and health care, and much more. But philanthropic dollars only go so far. We need state and federal revenues and programs to be adequately and equitably funded to ensure systemic changes are possible.

Public budgets and the revenue systems that support them are some of the most important policy instruments of our government. They reflect our values and priorities through decisions on how to tax residents and businesses and spend these collective resources. These decisions impact what families have to spend on basic needs and invest in their future, define the size of the government and its role in the national economy, and affect the lives of all Americans.

A solid understanding of budget and tax policy within our current political and economic climate is crucial for anyone working in philanthropy.

Why federal budget and tax policy matters to state and local funders.

States get about one-third of their revenue from the federal government — funds that help pay for health care, schools, housing, roads, child care, job training, and a range of other programs. Unlike the federal government, most states and localities must balance their budgets every year and are directly affected by fluctuations in federal funding, presenting state policymakers with important choices regarding how to adjust their own spending in response.

The One Big Beautiful Bill Act is a sweeping piece of legislation that will reshape the landscape of public funding and tax equity in the United States. It makes deep cuts to healthcare, housing, food assistance, and education while giving billions in tax breaks to billionaires and corporations. This law is highly regressive, increases the complexity of tax systems, grows the deficit and diminishes our ability to raise the revenue needed to provide services and good systems for the people who need it most. It also shifts significant administrative and eligibility burdens onto states, forcing lawmakers to make critical choices about cutting spending, tapping reserves, or increasing property and other state taxes.

Lessons Learned

- Helping members/funders see value and connection to budget and tax policy (and participating in watch party programming) remains challenging and takes time.
- Watch party audience sizes ranged from 5-25.
- Having local speakers is a big draw and adds value (and context) to watch parties.
- Co-hosting the event (or holding the event at a member/partner venue) can help boost participation.
- Several hosts noted they could have used more time for their local discussions (one hour was not enough).
- The additional tools provided (sample agendas, promotion text, connections to local SPP groups for local speakers, etc.) are useful.
- Weather can be a challenge for in-person gatherings. It would be helpful to have a weather contingency plan in place (e.g. virtual participation options).
- Technology (audio and video) issues occur most often during a live viewing. These occur despite technology tests and are user interface issues (not a result of the streaming technology). While viewing a recording eliminates most tech issues, there are other trade-offs to consider (more excitement around live participation, can interact in real time, and potential for recording to feel like old news as events can shift quickly).

- *How can we, as grantmakers, work collaboratively to ensure that decisions made about public funding impacting struggling populations and communities are informed by the best practices of our grantees?*
