Details on the Scion Sale for 2026

The **Lost Apple Project** is delighted to be able to offer scions of apples (old and new), pears, plums, and cherries again this year. There are also grafted apple trees available. A link to details on prices for scions and grafted trees and how to order them is provided below. Order scions and trees right away since the **sale ends on February 1st**.

The centerpiece of the 2026 Scion Sale are the recovered varieties identified by the Lost Apple Project. They are listed first in the center column. Below those are more apple varieties, many of them heirlooms. Further down in the left column are the varieties of pear and plum scions available this year.

Use this [order form](#) to order apple, pear, and plum scions for 2026. The form is also used for ordering grafted apple trees. Sale is open until **February 1st**.

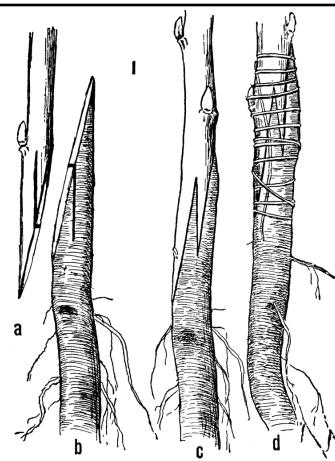

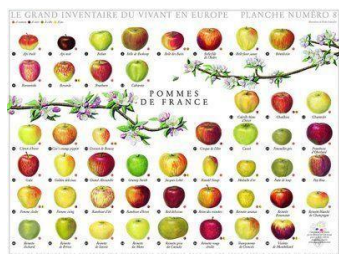
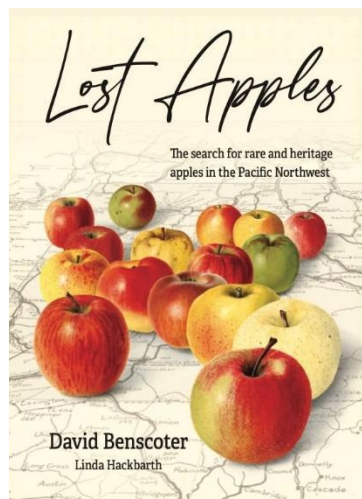

Sources for Finding Apple Descriptions

There are a lot of apple varieties cultivated in the US and other apple growing regions of the world. One of the most comprehensive sources of information about apples is the [Orange Pippin](#) data base. It is especially helpful in finding out about heritage and cider apples. Another easy to use list is the one for [Gould Hill Farm](#). The [Pick Your Own](#) site has apple variety lists by state. Apple Rootstock - \$4 each

We are delighted to be able to provide two different apple rootstocks, M7 and M111, for bench grafting at \$4 each.

The **M7** provides precociousness (starts fruiting while fairly young) and size control (semi-dwarf at about 50-60% of size of a standard seedling). It is free-standing as a mature tree (but should be supported while young).

The **M111**, also considered a semi-dwarf, is the largest of the Malling series, offering a well anchored and self supporting tree that is about 75-85% of a standard seedling. If you live in an area where fire blight is common you should choose the M111 because it is as fire blight resistant as those in the Geneva series of apple rootstocks.

If you are wanting smaller dwarf trees in the M9 size range (vs. the semi-dwarf sizes above) then check out Cummins Nursery's extensive range of choices for rootstock.

Special Note About Grafting Japanese Plums: The success rate for bench grafting Japanese plum scions onto rootstock is typically poor. However, topworking existing plum trees with Japanese plum scions using	the Growing Produce website. Very frank (Mary Poppins didn't write any of these) apple descriptions are found on the Philo Apple Farm website (e.g. see description for the Astrachan - Red).
