Statement of Faith

The Bible is the inspired Word of God. Our God is One, but manifested in three Persons—the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Salvation is the gift of God to man through faith in Jesus Christ. The New Birth is necessary to all men, and when experienced, produces eternal life. We believe in sanctification, which is living a life of holiness. Healing is the privilege of every member of the Church today provided through Jesus' death on the Cross.

- **THE SCRIPTURES**—The Bible is the inspired Word of God, the product of holy men of old who spoke and wrote as they were moved by the Holy Spirit. The New Covenant, as recorded in the New Testament, we accept as our infallible guide in matters pertaining to conduct and doctrine (2 Tim. 3:16; 1 Thess. 2:13; 2 Peter 1:21).
- BAPTISM OF THE HOLY SPIRIT- "Do not leave Jerusalem, but wait for the gift my Father promised, which you have heard me speak about. For John baptized with water, but in a few days you will be baptized in the Holy Spirit." Acts 1:4. The Baptism of the Holy Spirit is different than being baptized in water. Jesus emphasized the importance of receiving the Holy Spirit, the power of God, to be able to demonstrate or verify the Kingdom of heaven.
- **THE GODHEAD**—Our God is One, but manifested in three Persons—the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, being coequal (Deut. 6:4; Phil. 2:6). God the Father is greater than all; the Sender of the Word (Logos) and the Begetter (John 14:28; John 16:28; John 1:14). The Son is the Word flesh-covered, the One Begotten, and has existed with the Father from the beginning (John 1:1; John 1:18; John 1:14). The Holy Spirit proceeds forth from both the Father and the Son and is eternal (John 14:16; John 15:26).
- **ETERNAL LIFE AND THE NEW BIRTH**—Man's first step toward salvation is godly sorrow that worketh repentance. The New Birth is necessary to all men, and when experienced, produces eternal life (2 Cor. 7:10; John 3:3–5; 1 John 5:12).



- **SANCTIFICATION**—The Bible teaches that without holiness no man can see the Lord. We believe in the Doctrine of Sanctification as a definite, yet progressive work of grace, commencing at the time of regeneration and continuing until the consummation of salvation at Christ's return (Heb. 12:14; 1 Thess. 5:23; 2 Peter 3:18; 2 Cor. 3:18; Phil. 3:12–14; 1 Cor. 1:30). Sanctification includes abstaining from lustful desires including but not limited to, adultery, fornication, same-sex relationships, drunkenness, greed, hate, envy, etc. (Galatians 5:19-21; I Timothy 1:8-11).
- **DIVINE HEALING**—Healing is for the physical ills of the human body and is wrought by the power of God through the prayer of faith, and by the laying on of hands. It is provided for in the atonement of Christ, and is the privilege of every member of the Church today (James 5:14,15; Mark 16:18; Isa. 53:4,5; Matt. 8:17; 1 Peter 2:24).

	This course teaches children that God is the provider of our daily food, emphasizing gratitude and the concept of sharing God's love through hospitality.
CULINARY ARTS 2 The Agape Kitchen: The Art of Hospitality Materials Used: Abeka	This course takes a comprehensive look at hospitality from a Christian perspective. Teens will advance their culinary skills, learning more complex techniques such as braising, roasting, and decorating baked goods. Lessons cover not only cooking, but also menu planning, table setting, and food service. The final project involves preparing and serving a full, restaurant-quality meal to a group of friends or family, putting their skills into practice.
	This course teaches youth how to use food and fellowship to bless others, demonstrating God's love through thoughtful service and generous hospitality.
ART 1 & 2 Created in His Image Foundations of Christian Art	In this introductory course, students will discover the fundamentals of art through a biblical lens. Exploring the elements of art and principles of design, students will learn to use their creativity to glorify God, their ultimate Creator. Projects will cover a variety of media, including drawing, painting, and collage, with each lesson connecting to a scriptural theme.
	Key projects:
	 A landscape painting demonstrating God's majesty in creation. An illuminated manuscript-style drawing of a favorite Bible verse. A self-portrait reflecting the idea of being "fearfully and wonderfully made."



	4. Designing an altar cloth or banner using Christian symbolism.
DANCE 1 Youth Praise Dance	This class focuses on the fundamentals of praise and worship dance. Dancers will learn foundational steps from various styles while exploring the biblical meaning behind praise dance. The curriculum covers basic choreography, expressive movement, and the use of flags and banners as worship tools. The class is suitable for all experience levels, emphasizing a heart of worship and the ability to expressively use the entire body.
DANCE 2 Lyrical & Contemporary Worship	In this expressive and dynamic class, students will delve into the lyrical and contemporary dance styles for the glory of God. The focus is on connecting mind and body through fluid, emotive movement to tell a story inspired by faith in Christ. Dancers will develop their technique and challenge their skills with turns, leaps, and improvisational exercises. The goal is to grow in musicality and expressive movement while deepening their appreciation for dancing as a form of worship.
PRAISE & WORSHIP 1 Creating a Youth Worship Team	This practical course is for students who want to develop a worship band for their youth group. Topics include: 1. Instrumental Skills: Basic instruction and rehearsal for common worship instruments (e.g., guitar, bass, keys, drums). 2. Song Selection: Choosing songs with relatable, theologically sound lyrics and accessible melodies. 3. Team Dynamics: Learning to collaborate effectively as a band and grow spiritually together. 4. Stage Presence: A focus on posture, presentation, and authenticity while leading worship.
PRAISE & WORSHIP 2 Christian Songwriting	In this creative course, students learn the craft of writing and composing original worship songs. The class focuses on expressing personal faith experiences through music.



	 Song Structure: Exploring common song structures, such as verse-chorus-bridge. Lyrical Content: Writing lyrics that are both personal and theologically sound. Melody Creation: Developing memorable and singable melodies. Creative Worship: A project-based class where students write, compose, and present their original worship song to the class and at worship services.

PLEASE NOTE: If a student withdraws before the completion of the current semester, you will still be responsible to pay all tuition and fees through the end of the semester.





STUDENT HANDBOOK 2025-2026

GIFTS AND CALLINGS

All students enrolled in JRA are invited, encouraged, and challenged to experience the gifts and call that God has blessed them to have. All students will receive a gifts evaluation; however, they aren't required to use their gifts profile to choose their classes.

CLASS SCHEDULES

All classes are 3-hour/week courses. Each course will be for a semester (4-months) per the above calendar of events. Each student will be permitted to take 2 courses a semester if the classes are available.

Classes will be Saturdays and/or Monday, Tuesdays, and Thursdays. Times will vary based on each individual instructor and the specific class registered for by each student. Each class has a maximum enrollment of 15 students.

ATTENDANCE

All students enrolled in JRA are expected to attend at least 75% of days from the date of enrollment.

ABSENCES

Excused: Any student who is not in attendance due to sickness or other unavoidable cause will be considered excused provided a note from the parent/guardian (with working phone number) is submitted to JRA instructor when the student returns to the academy. Otherwise the absence will be considered unexcused.



Students and parents are encouraged to give prior notice of scheduled appointments.

TRANSPORTATION

Students will use their normal mode of transportation to the JRA Enrichment program.

EARLY CHECK-OUT

Students will only be released from the JRA enrichment program once a parent has signed a student out of the class. Teenage students with driver's license are permitted to attend the program without parent pick up and drop off with prior written consent from a parent/guardian and a copy of their driver's license on file. Once signed out, the student will be escorted to the front lobby to meet their parent. Students may only be signed out by someone with authority in listed on their application. Students will not be released to any unauthorized person without administrative permission. Students who choose to walk out of class will be subject to the JRA discipline policy.

TELEPHONE USE

Students will be able to bring cellphones to class; however, they will be restricted to emergencies when the parents must be contacted. Cellphones are not to be seen while in class unless permitted by the instructor. Students who do not follow the telephone use policy will be subject to the JRA discipline policy.

DRESS CODE

JRA students will be under the same dress code as the general population of the non-profit programs. All attire should be modest and not revealing. Shirts and pants are both required to be fitted.



STUDENT RULES

All JRA students must adhere to the rules and regulations of JRA and CROSSED: The Youth Law Center. Any students violating the rules of the will be subject to discipline and/or suspension. A student may be disciplined for:

STUDENT INFRACTIONS

- 1. Smoking and/or possession of lighters and tobacco products. This includes electronic cigarettes.
- 2. Gambling or betting money.
- 3. Committing an act that detains, distracts, or infringes upon the rights of others as individuals.
- 4. Horse playing.
- 5. Threatening a student, faculty, or staff member.
- 6. Fighting or aggressive behavior.
- 7. Open display of affection. Students should keep their hands to themselves.
- 8. School dress policy infractions. No sagging pants, hoodies on head, short skirts (fingertip length), or tops revealing cleavage. No clothes that reflect drug, alcohol, or gang affiliation. Bandanas or flags are strictly prohibited.

ILLEGAL ACTIVITY

- 1. Bringing any device/object that can be reasonably considered a weapon or danger on school grounds. Violators will be charged criminally.
- 2. Dishonesty of any form, including stealing or possession of stolen property.
- 3. Vandalism of JRA/CROSSED property.
- 4. Possession of any alcoholic beverage or illegal drug.
- 5. Intimidating actions that disturb the normal routine and welfare of the Academy, as an individual or part of a group.



BEHAVIOR MANAGEMENT NON-COMPLIANCE POLICY

Policy

Should a student be found not in compliance with the regulations and guidelines outlined in the Standard of Conduct policy, the following actions will be taken depending on the degree, level and frequency of non-compliant behaviors.

Procedure

Listed below are the different levels of non-compliance and the appropriate actions.

Level 1: Minor Misbehaviors

For the misbehaviors that are considered mild in nature and occur once, participants will receive a verbal warning by a member of the JRA staff.

Level 2: Continuous Minor Misbehaviors

For misbehaviors that are considered mild in nature, but occur frequently, participants will receive a written referral to be placed in the participant's folder. If the problem continues to be an issue for the student or staff, The administrative team will schedule a time to meet with the parent/guardian of the participant to discuss their behavior.

Level 3: Major Misbehaviors

For the misbehaviors that are considered major in nature but occur once, student will receive a written referral to be placed in the student's folder and a letter to the student's parent/guardian should be sent home with the participant. In addition, the administrative staff will schedule a time to meet with the parent/guardian of the participant to discuss their behavior.

Level 4: Continuous Major Misbehaviors

For misbehaviors that are considered major in nature and occur frequently and after all other options have been exhausted, students will receive an appropriate temporary suspension from the enrichment program. During the suspension, the administrative staff will schedule a time to meet with the parent/guardian of the participant to develop a plan of re-admission.



CORRECTIVE ACTION PLAN POLICY

Statement

The primary goal of the JRA is to ensure an environment that is safe, orderly and healthy. JRA has established standards and rules governing conduct and procedure to ensure consistent nondiscriminatory enforcement of rules for participants and employees. It may be necessary to take corrective action measures to discourage inappropriate behavior.

Policy

Employees are required to record incidents on the Corrective Action Form (Attachment I) and submit the form to the JRA Director. Upon completion of the Incident Form, students are to be dismissed from the enrichment program for the day and will be contacted by the administrative team to discuss the incident. Staff must immediately contact the parent/guardian of a student who is dismissed from the Enrichment Program. The Corrective Action Policy outlines the actions taken after an individual is subject to disciplinary or corrective action. It is important for the employee to evaluate the inappropriate behavior and make sure it is grounds for dismissal.

Procedure

- 1. Participants who fail to abide by established standards and rules will be subject to corrective action. The progressive steps of corrective action may vary depending upon the nature of the infraction, the circumstances surrounding the offense and the participant's record.
- 2. The SCA recognizes three levels of offenses identified as minor, major and permanent offenses. There are several progressive steps of corrective action for each level. Suspensions from the SCA shall be from the day of the offense. Corrective Action shall proceed to but is not limited to the following guidelines.

*Students who have demonstrate misbehavior beyond final step in each category will be subject to a hearing before the Director of the enrichment program to determine the next corrective action that will be taken by the Department.

- 3. A representative list of Minor Misbehaviors includes, but is not limited to:
 - a. Misuse/Abuse of equipment
 - b. Failure to follow SCA rules
 - c. Behaving or responding disrespectfully toward others
 - d. Any failure of good behavior and sportsmanship
 - e. Minor behavioral misconduct
 - f. physical confrontation
- 4. A representative list of Major Misbehaviors includes, but is not limited to:
 - a. Any form of fighting or assault
 - b. Belligerent, defiant, abusive, vulgar, or threatening conduct or speech
 - c. Vandalism or acts that cause damage to or loss of property of the Center, its employees, participants or visitors.
 - d. Theft (attempted or accomplished), removal of, unauthorized possession of, tampering with or use of property belonging to an employee or participant.
 - e. Smoking in the building or on premises
 - f. Unlawful or unauthorized use or possession of alcohol.



- 5. A representative list of Permanent Misbehaviors
 - a. Unlawful or unauthorized use, possession, sale or transfer of illegal drugs or narcotics.
 - b. Possession of weapons or other unauthorized dangerous materials

The list of misbehaviors contained herein is meant to be illustrative and not all inclusive. Engaging in activity that is inconsistent with the ordinary, reasonable and commonsense rules necessary to the mutual welfare of the enrichment program and its students and visitors will also subject an individual to corrective action.

A written record of all incidents of misconduct will be signed and dated by the administrative team and a letter explaining the corresponding corrective action will be sent to the home of the program. These documents will be kept on file at JRA.

Corrective Action Procedures

- 1. Take Immediate Action
- 2. Remove students from conflict making every effort to avoid physical contact
- 3. Calm all parties involved in a respectful manner
- 4. Take appropriate Corrective Action

Warning

A verbal warning is administered and written documentation is completed and logged in the proper Corrective Action Binder.

Written Warning (Minor Only)

A verbal warning is administered and written documentation is submitted to a Program Director for scheduling of conference with parent/student.

Suspension

Suspension of student begins immediately. If the participant is age 17 & under, the parent/guardian is immediately informed of suspension. Documentation of incident is submitted to Program Director. A phone call regarding the situation is made to the minor's parent/guardian; a written notification to participant or participant's parent/guardian is composed and delivered to household. Consequences are dictated by the Corrective Action Policy. Suspended patrons placed in Corrective Action Suspension File.
