Undergraduate Research Advising

At the University of Michigan, students engage with research labs by signing up for courses that provide them with different levels of research training. Under “independent research supervision” you will see students I have supervised who developed their own projects for year-long or semester-long papers. Oftentimes my role here was to provide feedback on big picture theoretical ideas, help them design studies, and provide feedback on analyses and manuscript drafts. Under “lab research supervision” you

will see projects I have supervised as part of my own or my advisors' broader program of research. For these students my role was to teach and oversee literature reviews, data cleaning in R, stimuli development, participant recruitment, and conducting laboratory studies.
