**COURSE RATIONALE, STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES**

International purchasing or sourcing. Includes the advantages and the barriers of purchasing internationally, global sourcing, procurement technology, and purchasing processes. Emphasizes issues of contract administration, location, and evaluation of foreign suppliers, total cost approach, exchange fluctuations, customs procedures, and related topics.

The goals and objectives of this course prepare students to (1) understand the elements of purchasing, sourcing materials internationally, and supply chain management, (2) achieve job advancement, and/or (3) fulfill personal goals.

Learning outcomes include international purchasing and sourcing issues; completing a project in sourcing specific items; and utilizing technical factors such as exchange rates, channels of distribution, or customs regulations to resolve problems.

Working knowledge of computers, email, and the internet.

## **INSTRUCTIONAL METHODOLOGY**

### **Artificial Intelligence Guidelines**

AI is allowed to be used in this course under the conditions listed below. Business is using AI. It is best that you become familiar with it. Most employers are going to require you to use AI to aid in your job. Introduction: The use of generative AI (GAI) is permitted in this course under certain conditions to enhance learning while maintaining academic integrity. Rationale: GAI is permitted to foster technological fluency and to leverage advanced tools for research, as long as it does not substitute for critical thinking and learning. Definition of GAI: Generative AI encompasses technologies that create content through learned patterns and data without direct human input. Usage Permissions: Permitted: GAI can be used for initial research, idea generation, and learning coding practices. It is not to be used for final submissions with no review process. Assessment: Contributions of GAI must be clearly cited and will be assessed on the student's ability to critically analyze and integrate the AI-generated content. Penalties: Misuse of GAI, including a failure to cite, will be considered a breach of academic integrity, with consequences including a failing grade for the assignment and academic review. Exceptions: Should the technology be required as an accommodation, exceptions will be made on a case-by-case basis.

Asynchronous Online (ONL or Online)

Students will read assigned material and listen to narrated chapter presentations. Quizzes and Exams will be taken either online in Blackboard using an electronic device and internet connection or in class. The Project and Extra Credit assignments will be submitted in Blackboard.

Synchronous Online (DLS or Distance Learning)

Students will read assigned material before each virtual lecture. Students will attend lectures going to the course site in Blackboard and clicking on “Blackboard Collaborate Ultra”. Quizzes and Exams will be taken online in Blackboard using an electronic device and internet connection. The Project and Extra Credit assignments will be submitted in Blackboard.

Synchronous Classroom (FTF or Face-to-Face)

Students will read assigned material before each classroom lecture. Quizzes and Exams will be taken either in the classroom or online in Blackboard using an electronic device and internet connection. The Project and Extra Credit assignments will be submitted in Blackboard.

### **Withdrawal Policy**

It is your responsibility to ensure your name is removed from the rolls should you decide to withdraw from the class. The instructor reserves the right to drop a student should I feel it is necessary. If you withdraw, you should verify that the withdrawal is recorded before the Final Withdrawal Date. **The Final Withdrawal Date for this semester is (See the Academic Calendar for this date)**. You are strongly encouraged to keep any paperwork in case a problem arises.

You are responsible for understanding the impact that withdrawal from a course may have on your financial aid, veterans' benefits, and international student status. Per state law, students enrolling for the first time in Fall 2007 or later at any public Texas college or university may not withdraw (receive a "W") from more than six courses during their undergraduate college education. Some exemptions for good cause could allow a student to withdraw from a course without having it count toward this limit. You are strongly encouraged to meet with an advisor when making decisions about course selection, course loads, and course withdrawals.

### **Missed Exam and Late Work Policies**

You will do better in the course if you complete all assignments and exams on the dates listed in the course schedule. All work must be submitted by the last day of the semester. Due to ongoing COVID-19 challenges, no points will be deducted for late work submitted after the due date in the course schedule. However, the instructor will contact you if you fall behind and grades of "0" will be given assignments and exams not completed by the last day of the course.

### **Incompletes**

An incomplete (grade of "I") will only be given for extenuating circumstances. What constitutes "extenuating circumstances" is left to the instructor's discretion. If a grade of I is given, the remaining course work must be completed by a date set by the student and professor. This date may not be later than two weeks prior to the end of the following semester. A grade of I also requires completion and submission of the Incomplete Grade form, to be signed by the faculty member (and student if possible) and submitted to the department chair.

Students may request an Incomplete from their faculty member if they believe circumstances warrant. The faculty member will determine whether the Incomplete is appropriate to award or not. The following processes must be followed when awarding a student an I grade.

1. Before the end of the semester in which the "I" is to be awarded, the student must meet with the instructor to determine the assignments and exams that must be completed before the deadline date. This meeting can occur virtually or in person. The instructor should complete the Report of Incomplete Grade form.

2. The faculty member will complete the form, including all requirements to complete the course and the due date, sign (by typing in name) and then email it to the student. The student will then complete his/her section, sign (by typing in name), and return the completed form to the faculty member to complete the agreement. A copy of the fully completed form can then be emailed by the faculty member to the student and the department chair for each grade of Incomplete that the faculty member submits at the end of the semester.
3. The student must complete all remaining work by the date specified on the form above. This date is determined by the instructor in collaboration with the student, but it may not be later than the final withdrawal deadline in the subsequent long semester.
4. Students will retain access to the course Blackboard page through the subsequent semester to submit work and complete the course. Students will be able to log on to Blackboard and have access to the course section materials, assignments, and grades from the course and semester in which the Incomplete was awarded.
5. When the student completes the required work by the Incomplete deadline, the instructor will submit an electronic Grade Change Form to change the student's performance grade from an "I" to the earned grade of A, B, C, D, or F.

If an Incomplete is not resolved by the deadline, the grade automatically converts to an "F." Approval to carry an Incomplete for longer than the following semester or session deadline is not frequently granted.

Grades for assignments and the course grade are available in 'My Grades' in Blackboard. Grades of "0" are posted one week after the completion date in the Course Schedule. Grades for late assignments are manually posted by the instructor within two weeks of completion. The previously recorded score of "0" for the late assignment is

manually changed by the instructor to the score earned by the student. The course grade at any time during the semester reflects the current grade in the course for past assignments.
