Possible Surgery Risks

As with any surgical procedure, there exists a risk for complications, ranging from infection to issues with bone healing. Choosing the right oral surgeon and adhering to post-operative special care can mitigate these risks.

Risk of Nerve Damage

While rare, nerve injury can occur during implant placement, particularly in the lower jaw. This may result in temporary or permanent numbness, tingling, or pain in your teeth, gums, lips, or chin. Expert placement and detailed pre-surgical imaging help minimize this risk, but patients should be aware that precise implant positioning is crucial to avoid nerve complications.

Potential Implant Rejection

Though made from biocompatible materials like titanium, some patients' bodies may not fully accept the implant. This rejection can occur due to allergic reactions, autoimmune conditions, or other physiological factors. Early signs of rejection include increased pain, swelling, fever, and implant loosening. While proper screening can reduce this risk, it remains an important consideration for potential candidates.

Ongoing Maintenance Requirements
