### Safety Plan: WE KEEP US SAFE!

We do not expect any trouble at the event - but we have trained and experienced Peacekeepers who will address any trouble we encounter! And everyone who attends can join in on the peacekeeping in their own corner of the march - check out this <a href="mailto:amazing (short!">amazing (short!)</a> IG video on how to do this (from our wonderful friends at Indivisible SF)!

## Goals of Safety Team (Peacekeepers):

- 1. To keep demonstrators safe
- 2. To promote nonviolence, de-escalate conflicts and buffer demonstrators from disruptors
- 3. To facilitate communication between planners & demonstrators
- 4. To facilitate the action as planned

A core principle behind all No Kings events is **a commitment to nonviolent action.** We expect all participants to seek to de-escalate any potential confrontation with those who disagree with our values and to act lawfully at these events. Weapons of any kind, including those legally permitted, should not be brought to events.

### Organization

The Safety Team will include ~65 members, in coordination with bike marshalls organized by the BADASH collective (~105 people total). All members of the team are trained in de-escalation, and can be recognized by their yellow vests and smiling faces. Because of the anticipated size of the event, leadership is partially decentralized among 8-9 Group leaders under one Safety Lead. Groups will be distributed throughout the length of the march. Bike marshalls will usually be the first to block streets along the route, and pedestrian Safety Team members will take over their duties as the march progresses. The march route has been chosen to minimize the potential for "trapped" vehicles.

### **Roles**

The Safety Lead will support Group Leads in coordinating traffic blocking, de-escalation efforts, and problem solving. Safety Team Members will answer questions from marchers, provide de-escalation services, conduct traffic blocking, and facilitate a smooth event. The Safety Team is not a security team and does not participate in physical restraints. Safety team members do not communicate with the police with the exception of the police liaison, who serves as a single point of contact with Oakland Police Department and BART Police under extraordinary circumstances (for example, traffic accidents or counterprotestors threatening deadly force). Medics will be distributed throughout the march and can provide first aid and other support for marchers. Legal support will be provided by the National Lawyers Guild.

### ADA plan (see map & plan here)

- Don't want to march? Come straight to the Lake Merritt amphitheater, where we will have ADA seating!
- A good time to arrive is in the noon-1:00 hour, before the first marchers arrive.
- You can be dropped off at the amphitheater on Lake Merritt Blvd (between 12th St. and 1st Ave.). There's a curb cut, and a flat sidewalk surface to traverse down to the front of the amphitheater seating, where there will be plenty of chairs directly in front of the stage.
- Once the marchers begin to arrive, there will be a cordoned-off path from the sidewalk to the seating area, with ADA support volunteers and peacekeepers to ensure the path stays clear.
