- B. Our annual meeting took place on Back-to-School nights on August 7, 2025 at 3:00 and 6:00. Parents were notified about the meeting in their students' teacher placement letters mailed to them on Thursday, July 24, 2025.

- C. Offer flexible meetings, such as meetings in the morning or evening, and provide, with funds provided under this part, transportation, child care, or home visits, as such services related to Parent and Family Engagement. We provide notice for our parents of all family engagement events. There are times that parents come in during the daytime for special engagement activities including making gingerbread houses for a STEM experience. The other events are hosted in the evenings. The principal makes home visits when needed to connect with parents in an effort to improve students' academic and emotional well-being.

Each month, we have a portion of our newsletter that is dedicated to Title I and providing information to families so that they are engaged in and informed of school improvement goals and strategies. Parents are strongly encouraged to weigh in on school goals and strategies during the meetings.

This year, HCPS has hired many additional EL teachers and an EL liaison to serve our community of English Learners. These teachers and liaison will ensure that they establish positive relationships with the students and their families while helping students master state academic standards and meeting their socio-emotional needs.

Students and families are provided with a planner for the school year outlining assessments and grading policies for the division. Teachers will hold parent/teacher conferences twice this school year to involve parents in making instructional decisions for their children and informing them of their progress on mastery of state academic standards.

Teachers keep in contact with parents regularly, documenting these communications in a communication log to track them. Teachers break down the standards and explain educational acronyms that are used when communicating with parents/guardians to ensure they understand.

BUILDING CAPACITY FOR PARENTS AND STAFF – REQUIREMENTS FOR ENGAGEMENT

To ensure effective involvement of parents and to support a partnership among the school involved, parents, and the community to improve student academic achievement, **each school and district must:**

This year, our school will host a Reading Night to help parents learn strategies to help their children at home learn/practice reading skills. We will also have a STEM night where parents will learn to use some of the instructional technology that their students are using in school.
- Provide professional development to teachers, specialized instructional personnel, and other staff on the value of parents and their communities to increase academic achievement.

HCPS has instituted non-negotiables for our division staff. The first non-negotiable is building positive relationships with students, families, and colleagues. The district curriculum team developed training for the

principals to present to the faculty. All faculty members received this training before the start of school in August 2025.

- Coordinate and integrate parent engagement programs and activities with other Federal, State, and local programs, including public preschool programs, and conduct other activities, such as parent resource centers, that encourage and support parent engagement. We have VPI classrooms in our schools and offer parental support and workshops through the VPI program.

All communications go home in students' native language. Our ParentSquare messenger translates all documents into the students' selected home language. District newsletters are also translated for parents to keep them updated on events and expectations.
