Nouns and Noun Phrases & Verb and Verb Phrases CLASS NOTES

- 1. A **noun** is what the sentence is about, the **noun phrase** is the noun and all its modifiers.
- 2. A **verb** is what the noun is doing/being, a **verb phrase** is the verb and all its modifiers. Headword- means the ONE word we are talking about for noun or verb.

Modifiers- modify the noun or verb- tells us which one? how? where?, often times they are

Adjectives- modify a noun

Adverbs- modify a verb

Determiners- tell us which one

Articles- a, an, the

Demonstrative pronouns- this, that, these, those

Could be a possessive noun or pronoun- Bill's, his

There are 10 types of sentences- let's work on the first three.

Steps:

1. Circle the headword for NP and VP.

2. Color the noun phrase blue. Color the verb phrase orange.

3. Diagram the headwords, add modifiers underneath.

Sentence Pattern 1: NP be adverb of time/place

*Modifiers all go underneath. If you have a prepositional phrase the noun of the prep phrase is a flat.

The teacher is here.	The last performance was yesterday.	The students are in the library.

Sentence Pattern 2: NP be adjective

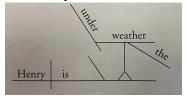
*The adjective that the noun phrase is becoming comes after a slanted line

The dogs are lazy.	The price of gasoline is ridiculous.	The play was very boring.

Sentence Pattern 2: NP be adjective (but a preposition phrase is acting as the adjective).

1. Henry is under the weather.

2. Kim is in a bad mood.



Sentence Pattern 3: NP1 be NP1

*The NP1 is being renamed but it's still the same thing- still use a slanted line.

The students are scholars.	Professor Mendez is my math teacher.	The tournament was an exciting event.
