AGNC Grants Round-Up Hot Deadlines

1. **BUILD (Better Utilizing Investments to Leverage Development) Grant Program:** previously known as the Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) and Transportation Investment Generating Economic Recovery (TIGER) discretionary grants. The goal of the BUILD program is to fund projects that will have a significant local or regional impact and improve transportation infrastructure. The Minimum Award Size is \$1 million for rural capital projects. Applications must be submitted online no later than 5:00 pm eastern on **February 24, 2026**. 2. **Community Infrastructure Center:** A new partnership between **Amalgamated Bank, The Milken Institute, and NREL** is offering over **\$180 million** to help clean energy projects move forward. This includes **grants and low-interest loans** for projects that are **1.5 megawatts or smaller**—roughly the size of a community solar project or a system on a large building. This effort is focused on helping **tax-exempt organizations**—including **local governments, special districts, and nonprofits**—get access to the financing they need. The **immediate goal** is to support projects that are ready to start construction or be finished before **January 1, 2026**, but **projects at any stage of development are welcome to apply**. 3. **Rural Economic Development Initiative (REDI) (DOLA):** The Rural Economic Development Initiative (REDI) program is designed to help rural communities comprehensively diversify their local economy and create a more resilient Colorado. Projects that will be funded include plans, construction, programs, and capacity building. All applications must **create and retain jobs**, either direct or indirect. Projects should fall into one or more of the following categories: Job creation and retention; Capacity building; Economic resilience; Supports entrepreneurial ecosystems. All projects should be identified as a priority for the community within a comprehensive and holistic approach. 4. **The America 250 - Colorado 150 Commission:** Partnership with the Anschutz Foundation, Daniels Fund, El Pomar Foundation, Boettcher Foundation, Gates Family Foundation, and the Adolph Coors Foundation. The Commission will serve as a clearing house for organizations throughout Colorado to apply for grant funding for commemorative programs and projects. The Commission will review all proposals to determine alignment with the Commission's objectives and forward all proposals to partner foundations. Foundations will consider the Commission's feedback but will

ultimately make their own funding

5. **Local Planning Capacity Grant Program** (DOLA): Supports local government planning departments to streamline land-use, permitting and zoning processes for affordable housing—through activities such as system upgrades, code revisions, consultant/staff support, and multi-jurisdictional collaborations. Grants typically up to \$250,000, require a 20% local match. **Opens January 26, 2026 and closes February 26.** Learn more: [Local Planning Capacity Grant Program](#)
6. **Community Revitalization Tax Credit (CRTC) Program** (OEDIT): CRT will provide up to \$50 million in available tax credits (up to \$10 million a year for tax years 2025-2029) for capital projects supporting the creative industry. Eligible projects can apply for tax credits of up to \$3 million crediting up to 25% of the total eligible expenses of a project. 7. **Land Banking Program** (CHFA): The Land Banking program provides grants to eligible local or tribal governments and forgivable loans to eligible nonprofits with a demonstrated history of providing affordable housing. These funds must be used to acquire and preserve land for affordable for-sale housing or affordable rental housing. Mixed use may be allowed so long as the predominant use is affordable housing. From Monday, January 5th, through Friday, **February 6th**, at 5:00pm MT, LOIs will be accepted for **all eligible projects.** Learn more: [Land Banking Program](#)
8. **Disability Benefit Application Assistance Grant** (CDOO): Administered by the Colorado Disability Opportunity Office (CDOO) within the Colorado Department of Labor and Employment, this grant page outlines state funding opportunities overseen by the Colorado Disability Funding Committee to support community-driven work that improves the lives of Coloradans with disabilities. The programs include grants that help organizations provide disability benefit application assistance and fund new or innovative projects that enhance independence, access, and quality of life for individuals with disabilities across the state. By investing in both service-oriented assistance and creative solutions developed by nonprofit and community partners, the initiative seeks to strengthen support systems, promote inclusion, and expand opportunities for people with disabilities throughout Colorado. 9. **New and Innovative Idea Grant** (CDOO): "New and innovative ideas," mean novel, original or unique concepts for improving quality of life or increased independence for persons with disabilities, whether such concepts are completely new or propose changes to existing concepts, programs, projects, products, or fields. 10. **Wetlands for Wildlife Grants** (CPW): The Colorado Wetlands for Wildlife Program is a voluntary, collaborative, and incentive-based program to restore, enhance, and create wetlands and riparian areas in Colorado. Colorado Parks and Wildlife annually seeks applications for wetland and riparian restoration, enhancement, and creation projects to

support the goals of this program.

11. **Proposition 123 Local Planning Capacity Grant** (DOLA): This is the final opportunity to secure funding that can support your jurisdiction with implementing the Proposition 123 requirements to expedite the development review process in time to meet that deadline. 12. **Grant for Arts Projects** (NEA): Supports arts projects that benefit the public, including performing arts, visual arts, literature, media arts, folk and traditional arts, and multidisciplinary arts activities. Grants may fund creation and presentation of new work, community engagement and arts education, arts programming in underserved communities, partnerships with arts service organizations, and projects that integrate arts into community development or civic life. Typical award amounts range from \$10,000 to \$100,000 (or more) depending on the project category and scope; matching cost share is not required for most applicants. **Deadline: February 12**. 13. **Build to Scale** (EDA): The Build to Scale (B2) program supports organizations that strengthen entrepreneurial ecosystems to support entrepreneurs as they build and scale technology-driven businesses—and the employees in the new, good jobs they create—to make and deliver new technology products and services. Build to Scale (B2S) grants fund programs that support innovators, entrepreneurs, and startups transforming ideas into the critical, emerging technologies of the future. The Build to Scale program aims to: build capacity for entrepreneurs and innovators to invent, improve, and bring to market new technology products and services; accelerate the growth of regional economies focused on industries of the future; empower communities to enable technology innovators and entrepreneurs to pilot and test their products and services; and increase access to capital for technology-enabled entrepreneurs. 14. **EmpowHer Grants** (Boundless Futures Foundation): EmpowHer grants support impact-focused female founders who need early-stage business capital, a network of business advisors, or both. Eligible applicants are female entrepreneurs with businesses registered and operating solely in the United States. An applicant's business must make a social impact through its product or business model, be earning revenue, and not be more than five years old. We define 'social issues' as issues that impact society, and we refer to the [United Nations Sustainable Development Goals](#) as a useful tool for thinking

about social issues. We believe that

15. **Advanced Industries Early-Stage Capital & Retention Grant** (OEDIT Advanced Industries): Colorado-based advanced-industry technology companies may apply twice per year (typically **January and July cycles**) for reimbursement grants of up to **\$250,000** to **commercialize disruptive technologies** developed or manufactured in Colorado. Applicants must provide a 2:1 non-state match, meet revenue/funding caps, and show technology viability. Next deadline: **March 2026** (winter cycle). 16. **Advanced Industries Export Grant** (OEDIT): Small- and medium-sized Colorado businesses in advanced industries may receive reimbursement of up to **\$15,000** (50% of eligible costs) to support **export activities** like international business development, trade shows, marketing, translation, export training, and legal/compliance support. **Applications are open on a rolling basis until funds run out.** Apply at: [Advanced Industries Export Grant](#)
17. **Rural Entrepreneur Grant** (Startup Colorado): Our grants empower rural entrepreneurs to elevate their businesses and make a lasting impact on their communities. 18. **Micro Grant** (History Colorado): The Micro grant supports grass-root preservation efforts. This may encompass any project type which could be applied for as a competitive grant but offers more flexible application timing for smaller-scale projects. 19. **Main Street Mini-Grants** (DOLA): Colorado Main Street offers non-competitive mini-grants to their Candidate, Designated, and Graduate communities based on available funding each year from DOLA. The further along you are in the program, the more money you get. To qualify for a mini-grant, you must fill out an application (found on their website) and the money may only be used for planning, training, and physical improvements. 20. **El Pomar Foundation – Trustee Review Cycles:** El Pomar Foundation accepts grant applications on a rolling basis, reviewed quarterly during Trustee meetings. 21. **Hometown Grants** (T-Mobile Foundation): Local governments, tribal leaders, or nonprofit community leaders in Colorado towns with **populations under 50,000** may apply for funding to build or revitalize community spaces (e.g., parks, libraries, town squares, ball fields). 22. **Spark Good Local Grants** (Walmart Spark Good): Eligible entities: Deed-verified organizations with a Spark Good account, including nonprofit organization (c3) government entities, schools, and faith-based groups with community-wide benefit. 24. **Nasdaq Foundation Quarterly Grant Program:** Supports work in two main areas: enhancing financial literacy and investor engagement in under-resourced communities and strengthening/scaling entrepreneurship among under-resourced or underrepresented founders. Grants typically span one year and have no fixed minimum or maximum, though the average size is ~\$75,000. 25. **Craigslist Charitable Fund.** Supports projects advancing animal protection, environmental sustainability, and social good initiatives. Grants generally cover no more than 30% of an organization's annual budget, though exceptions may be made. Academic institutions may allocate up to 10% for indirect costs. Applications are reviewed in quarterly cycles beginning in 2026, with decisions typically issued within two months of the close of each submission window. 31. Revitalizing Main Streets: Opportunity 2 – Small Multimodal & Economic Resiliency

Grant Program (CDOT): Eligible local governments, business improvement districts, councils of governments, and colleges/universities may apply for state-funded grants (up to \$250,000 per project) aimed at **improving** pedestrian, bicycle, transit, senior, and disability-friendly **safety in urban arterials or downtown main streets**. A 10% local match is required. Applications are accepted continuously, reviewed every month by CDOT; review deadlines fall on the **last Wednesday of each month**. Apply via email to

32. **Community Facilities Direct Loan & Grant Program** (USDA Rural Development): Colorado rural local governments and Tribes may apply for direct loans and grants (up to \$1.5M or more) to **develop essential community facilities**—such as healthcare clinics, community centers, or housing services—supporting pre-development, construction, or renovation. 33. **Film Festival Support & Promotion Grant** (OEDIT/Economic Development & International Trade): Colorado festivals and educational film events may apply for sponsorship grants (typically **\$2,000–\$10,000**) that support **rural-based festivals** to attract tourism and economic activity across the state; eligible events must take place in Colorado and apply through OEDIT's portal. 35. **Community Impact Program** (GOCO): The Community Impact program funds the **planning and/or construction of new or upgraded parks, trails, natural areas, and other outdoor amenities**. Funding may also be used for stewardship work. \$100,000 – \$2,000,000 per project. This grant opportunity is highly competitive, especially for projects at the higher end of this range. 36. **Land Acquisition Program** (GOCO): The Land Acquisition program supports urban and rural landscape, waterway, and habitat protection priorities and improves outdoor access. Competitive projects consider opportunities for passive public recreation access; wildlife habitat and migration corridors; critical watersheds, waterways, and riparian ecosystems; scenic viewsheds and greenways; and open spaces, particularly those that serve disproportionately impacted communities. Eligible projects are **fee-simple land acquisitions that provide public access**. GOCO also considers conservation easements when tax credits are financially insufficient or impractical. Generally, up to \$3 million per project. GOCO may suggest a revised award amount as needed. 37. **The Pathways Program** (GOCO): The Pathways Program helps address pressing issues and opportunities through research and knowledge-building activities; data-gathering and analysis; development of tools and models; and expanding staff capacity. This program supports high-level visioning processes, equity initiatives, climate resilience efforts, and community engagement strategies that build networks and partnerships.

Projects must address current issues affecting Coloradans, prioritizing proposals that consider disproportionately impacted communities and meaningfully involve community members in project design and implementation. \$100,000 to \$300,000 per project. 38. **Community Development Block Grant Planning and Feasibility Studies Grant (CDBG)** (DOLA): The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Planning and Feasibility Study Grant helps Colorado communities **plan economic development projects that create or retain permanent jobs**. The project needs to create or retain at least one full-time equivalent job per \$20,000 funded. Generally, the project needs to fill at least 51% of the jobs it creates or retains with low- to moderate-income persons. This program may award up to \$75,000 in grants per year. 39. **Transit Oriented Communities Infrastructure Grant Program (OEDIT)** - The Colorado Department of Local Affairs (DOLA), in partnership with Colorado Energy Office (CEO) and Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT) will offer state assistance to local governments through the Transit Oriented Communities Infrastructure Grant Program (TOCI) for the purpose of **upgrading infrastructure and supporting regulated affordable housing in Transit Centers** and designated Neighborhood Centers within certified Transit-Oriented Communities. The pilot round of funding is anticipated to **open October 27, 2025**. Notices of Awards are estimated for 2026. A second funding round will be held in 2027. 40. **Colorado Environmental Justice Grants Program**: This grant opportunity was created by the Environmental Justice Act to provide funding to communities disproportionately impacted by pollution and climate change. The Environmental Justice Advisory Board oversees the EJ Grants Program and will serve as the selection committee for the grants. You can apply for this grant if you are part of a: non-profit organization, local government, federally-recognized Tribal government, university, other educational institution, for-profit corporation, or grassroots organization. 41. **Accessory Dwelling Unit Grant Program (ADUG)** (DOLA): provides grants to certified accessory dwelling unit (ADU) Supportive Jurisdictions for activities that promote the construction of ADUs. 44. **Historic Structure Assessment Grant** (History Colorado): Awarded for the sole purpose of preparing a report on the physical condition of a historic building or structure in accordance with a mandatory State Historical Fund assessment scope of work. 50. **Disaster Supplemental Grant (EDA)**: American communities that received major disaster declarations due to hurricanes, **wildfires**, severe storms and flooding, tornadoes, and other **natural disasters occurring in calendar years 2023 and 2024**. 51. **Fish and Wildlife Resources Fund Grants** (CWCB under DNR): Grant money to mitigate impacts on fish and wildlife resources. 52. **Wild and Scenic Rivers Fund Grant** (CWCB under DNR): To foster cooperative and collaborative processes aimed at the development of protections for river-dependent outstandingly remarkable values ("ORVs"). These protections would be intended as an alternative to wild and scenic river designation under the federal Wild and Scenic Rivers Act, while also protecting Colorado's ability to fully use its compact and decree entitlements. The goal of the Freight Rail Tax Credit is to incentivize businesses to use specific rail lines in Coal Transition communities in Colorado. Program Benefits: Businesses can get back up to 75% of their eligible costs (Qualified Expenditures) through this state income tax credit; a business must use the tax credit for the same tax year that it had the qualified expenses and executed their freight rail use plan, but it may reserve tax credits for future years; if the tax credit a business receives is more than the income tax it owes for that year, the business will get the extra amount back as a refund (Refundable tax credit). Disadvantaged Community Program:

Reduced rates available depending on severity of Disadvantaged status (currently 1%-2.25%). Planning, Design & Engineering Grants and principal forgiveness may be available.

- Planning Grant for up to \$10,000 with 20% local match
- Design & Engineering Grant up to \$300,000

Private non-profits are eligible for planning grants and for loans, but are not eligible for Design & Engineering grants or principal forgiveness.

Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) Funding:

- Special funding for drinking water projects with a special focus on lead service line replacement and emerging contaminants through 2026. Eligible applicants may receive partial loan forgiveness. Funding is available to local government borrowers. Learn more: [Drinking Water Revolving Fund](#)

112. Water Pollution Control Revolving Fund (CDPHE): Wastewater treatment and collection, nonpoint source pollution, and storm water projects

Green Project Reserve Program: Reduced rates available for eligible green costs greater than 15% of total project cost, (reduced interest rate for the first \$3 million only).

Disadvantaged Community Program: Reduced rates available depending on severity of Disadvantaged status (currently 1%-2.25%). Planning and Design & Engineering Grants may be available.

Loans typically range from \$100,000 to \$10 million. Loan applications under \$10 million are approved every other month by the CWCB Board. Applicants should anticipate a minimum of 5 months from the time of application until funds are made available. Loans over \$10 million must be approved annually by the
