Name of Course: Human Ecology

**Catalog Description**: This course is designed to introduce the general principles of human adaptation to the environment, explore human biological and cultural adaptations through time and space, explore the scope of human diversity as well as demography and population dynamics.

# **Learning Outcomes:**

Students will develop

- A more complex understanding of the components of human ecology through space and time.
- An understanding of how biology impacts human adaptation.
- An understanding of the impact of culture and behavior on human adaptation.

# **Course Requirements:**

- Students are expected to have read the required text, participate in class discussions and visit assigned web sites each week.
- The paper you produce must be appropriately cited. You must provide a citation if you paraphrase (change another author's words) or quote (taking something verbatim from another author). This includes any and all references that you find on the internet along with any other sources of information including people you interview.

#### *Individual Project:*

You will have the chance to try out changing your life to be more environmentally sustainable. Here are the steps:

- Choose a specific goal. (e.g., I want to eat less processed foods.)
- Define the goal in behavioral terms. (e.g., I will have 1 home cooked meal per day)
- Tell someone about the goal; make a public commitment.

- Before making any changes, observe your relevant present behavior for 2 days and write down circumstances surrounding the behavior. (e.g., I eat out when I am in a hurry)
- Examine the conditions under which the behavior occurs and look for ways to change the circumstances that lead to the non-goal behavior. (e.g., I can make sure that there are always good whole food options available in my fridge or freezer)
- Make a formal contract with yourself
- Put your plan into action for one week, then go back to keeping track of goal-related behaviors for the next three weeks.
- Write up what you learned from the whole process as described above and what questions, reflections or broader speculations it left you with. Make sure to include a minimum of four academic articles and/or books in your paper. The paper must be between 1700-1900 words. See the individual project rubric for grading information.

### **Group Discussions:**

Each Thursday one group will be leading the discussion for 20 minutes regarding the assigned reading for the week (textbook and/or readings in Blackboard). You can use multi-media to assist in the discussions, a handout or even group work as needed. Be creative and have fun discussing archaeology! See the group discussion rubric in Blackboard under Course Documents. Exams:

There are three exams. Exam 1 will be on material covered in Weeks 1-5, Exam 2 will be on material covered in Weeks 6-10 and Exam 3 is on Weeks 1-10. You are only required to take two exams. If you should decide to take all three exams, then I will use the best two exams to determine your final grade. Exams will be on any material covered as part of the class (lectures, book, articles, films, websites and guest lectures). Exams will consist of a combination of short answers, lists, and essay questions. No make-up exams will be offered.
