PROBLEM STATEMENT

Maternal mortality and morbidity are significant global health challenges, as the World Health Organization [WHO] estimates that 830 women die daily from preventable causes related to pregnancy and childbirth. Women of reproductive age, particularly those living in low- and middle-income countries, do not have access to maternal health services and are the most affected by maternal mortality and morbidity. To avoid maternal deaths, it is vital to prevent unintended pregnancies. All women, including adolescents, need access to contraception, safe abortion services, and quality post-abortion care. We can not achieve this without playing our vital role as SRHR advocates and future healthcare providers and raising awareness about these issues.

Most maternal deaths are preventable, as the health-care solutions to prevent or manage complications are well known. All women need access to high quality care in pregnancy, and during and after childbirth. While progress has been made in reducing maternal mortality over the past few decades, the rate of decline has slowed in recent years, highlighting the need for innovative approaches to improve maternal health outcomes.

As medical students and advocates, we must empower people to make informed and individual decisions about their body and health and break the taboos they are imprisoned in. Empowering those people to claim their reproductive rights cannot be achieved without promoting maternal health between the medical students themselves as **we cannot strive to make the world a better place while we are missing awareness ourselves.**

As a celebration of the International Day for Maternal Health and Rights, marked every year on the 11th of April, We would like to take a further step towards a world where maternal health is prioritized through a **three-day online capacity building camp** covering all the topics related to Maternal Health and Access to Safe Abortion.

GOAL(S)

Strengthen maternal health advocacy efforts through building the capacity of 30 medical students regarding the pressing issues and empower them to disseminate this knowledge in their NMOs and communities.

- 2. To engage SCORAngels from different regions and variable levels of experience, by the end of April 2024.**
 - 2.1 At least 3 regions are represented in the camp.
 - 2.2 Conduct 2 regional sessions prioritizing Americas and EMR as the least engaged regions in MHASA.
- 3. To cover all the program's focus areas in a simple and organized way, by the end of April 2024.**
 - 3.1 At least 1 topic under each focus area is incorporated
- 4. To celebrate and appreciate the efforts that various NMOs have done in advocating for maternal health and rights, by the end of April 2024.**
 - 4.1 This will be through the Activities fair that will focus on highlighting the efforts of at least 2 activities from all the five regions and hopefully motivate other members to begin focusing on MHASA initiatives.

5. **To tailor the content to be user-friendly and inclusive on different levels, by the end of April 2024.**
 - 5.1 Using inclusive language throughout the whole camp
 - 5.2 Share the materials and survival kit after the camp.

6. **A follow-up plan will be created by the participants to be certain that they will make the best use of the info they gained, by the end of April 2024.**
 - 6.1 The selection of the participants will depend on how concrete, realistic, and impactful their follow-up plans are.

- Concrete and impactful Follow-up plans.
- Basic MHASA related Experience will be an asset.
