

Arkivist¹ Dreidel

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Rules

[Don't have a dreidel handy? Play online!](#)

1. Each player needs an equal number of game pieces (usually 10-15). They can be candy, raisins, matchsticks, or other small objects.
2. Start with the youngest player and move clockwise.
3. Every round, every player puts one game piece in the “pot.”
4. Meaning of dreidel sides:
 1. *Nun* נ: do nothing.
 2. *Gimel* ג: take the entire pot.
 3. *Hey* ה: take half of the pot; if odd number of pieces left, take half plus one.
 4. *Shin* ש: add one piece to the pot.
5. Every round, each player spins the dreidel once. If the player's dreidel lands on *Gimel* ג or *Hey* ה, they must answer a question about archival practice correctly. Another player takes a card from the deck and asks the spinning player the question. If they get it right, they can proceed to taking the entire pot (*Gimel* ג) or half (*Hey* ה). If they get it wrong, they do nothing.
6. If the pot is ever empty, every player should put one in the pot.
7. The game ends when players have used all the question cards.
8. Whoever has the most game pieces wins. Every player gets to keep their pieces. If someone has none, maybe you should be nice and share. :)

Reflection





I had different ideas for a game with rewards, mostly badge/achievement rewards, but it seemed like they'd take too long to implement. I realized I needed to make something simpler for this assignment, something with physical rewards. My mind went to dreidel, and I realized I could combine it with Trivial Pursuit-like gameplay to make something that would educate people working in or studying archives. I ordered plain wooden dreidels and used pretty, metallic paint markers to decorate it. (That part wasn't related to archives, but I had a lot of fun doing it!)

I made a list of job skills and topics relevant to archivists and used it to guide me through writing questions. The questions are mostly about archival terms and concepts, with a few questions about careers in archives thrown in. Once I finished copying the

questions to note cards, I considered trying to make a digital version of this game as well, before realizing it's too outside my current skill set (and maybe overkill, since I already had the physical game).

One thing I hadn't considered was how easy it was going to be to play. My husband doesn't know anything about archives and I knew the answers to every question, since I had written them and *just* copied them to cards. Despite the game not being that fun for us to play, I think it would be a nice, quick game for someone who's interested in archives but doesn't know much about them.
