Course Description

Algebra 1 (A1) is designed for students who have completed Geometry with Statistics. This is the second required course before students choose the college or career pathway. A1 emphasizes functions: linear, absolute value, quadratic and exponential. Equations and expressions with linear and quadratic terms are also studied to learn how algebraic expressions model real-world situations. Statistical reasoning is studied to learn how data are represented and can be used to make predictions. Students enrolled in this course will take a South Carolina End-of-Course Exam that will count for 20% of their final grade. **PREREQUISITE:** Geometry with Statistics

Learning Objectives

1. Students will solve multi-step equations and inequalities, including those with variables on both sides. They will also determine if these mathematical statements result in one, infinite, or no solutions.
2. Students will analyze various linear scenarios to construct equations in multiple forms, such as standard and slope-intercept.
3. Students will learn to write, graph, and transform linear functions using function notation. They will also apply analytic methods to interpret linear relationships in data sets.
4. Students will master various methods for solving systems of linear equations and inequalities. They will also practice selecting the most efficient method for a given system.
5. Students will identify, graph, and transform exponential functions. They will use these functions to model real-world growth and decay scenarios to make predictions.
6. Students will analyze polynomial structures and perform operations such as addition, subtraction, and multiplication. Additionally, they will factor trinomials using greatest common factors and special patterns.
7. Students will graph quadratic functions and interpret their key features. They will also apply these functions to represent and analyze real-world situations.
8. Students will solve quadratic equations using tables, graphs, and factoring. They will also apply advanced techniques such as square roots, completing the square, and the quadratic formula.

9. Students will compare and contrast different function families, including linear, exponential, quadratic, and absolute value functions. They will evaluate how these models represent varied relationships and behaviors.

Attendance Expectations

It is imperative that ALL students are actively engaged and present every day!

Absences in High School are accrued per course. Any absence in excess of 5 may cause the student to lose credit for a 90-day/semester course. Absences that are medical (doctor notes), bereavement, and/or Principal Approved are not included in the maximum absences. Make Up Work

Late Homework will be accepted, but points will be deducted. It is the students' responsibility to make up work. All assignments are posted on google classroom every day. If you are out, you need to look on google classroom to make up what you missed.

Minor: If a student is absent for a minor assignment, a zero will be entered in the grade book and coded as make-up. Students will have 5 days to complete the assignment for full credit. Students who refuse to complete work will be referred to administration.

Major: If a student is absent for a major assignment, a zero will be entered in the grade book and coded as make-up. Students will have 5 days to complete the assignment for full credit with their teacher or in Major Make-up Lab. If the student does not make up the assignment within 5 days, they will automatically be assigned to Major Make-up Lab. Students who refuse to complete work will be referred to administration.

Greer High School Late Work Policy (Minor Grades)

At a minimum, students may receive up to 75% on minor assignments turned in 1 day late. At a minimum, students may receive up to 50% on minor assignments turned in 2 days late. This policy does not apply to students who are absent for instruction. When considering absences, teachers will assign a reasonable amount of time for students to make up assignments that does not exceed 5 days.

Redo/Retake/Revision Procedures

At the end of each quarter, a test will be given on all topics covered in that quarter. The grade on that test will replace the lowest test grade that quarter. If the grade is lower than all other test grades, it will not be counted. This gives students an opportunity to show that they learned the material they previously missed.

Magic School

MagicSchool strictly protects privacy and does not collect or utilize student data. All AI software, including MagicSchool, complies with GCS Board Policy and Administrative Rule IA.

Generative AI

This course may utilize generative AI tools, such as MagicSchool and Google Gemini, to supplement traditional instruction. Greenville County Schools prioritizes the ethical use of these technologies for brainstorming and self-guided learning.
