Summary of On-Site Plan

Updated August 12, 2020

- **K-5 students** will be on campus five days per week
- Each class will be a stand-alone cohort, kept separate from all other class cohorts throughout the day, including at recess and carpool.
- Science, Music, Design and Library will travel to the students, rather than have the students travel to a new space.
- Students will have individual desks and individual materials.
- Classes will be held partially outside and some fully in classroom-sized tents in order to maximize ventilation.
- Students and teachers will wear masks indoors and outside, with appropriate planned breaks. Teachers will have the option of using clear face shields when not in close proximity to students.
- Classroom surfaces will be disinfected daily.
- Air purification equipment will be employed where needed, such as in bathrooms and populated spaces that lack adequate ventilation
- Students will be asked to wash hands each time they enter or exit a classroom.
- Student and faculty health will be monitored via protocols adapted from our <u>summer protocols</u>.
- A distance learning option will be available for families who choose not to have their children attend classes on campus.

Additional for Seniors:

- Students will be on campus Monday through Thursday.
- On Fridays, Seniors will have a distance learning program for Design, Seminar, Math study hall, and Senior Project work.
- Senior students and faculty will be divided into an A group and a B group. Each group will be a stand-alone cohort with its own classrooms and team of teachers. These cohorts will not mix.
- The students in each cohort will primarily be in their grade-level groups.
- A distance learning option will be available for families who choose not to have their children attend classes on campus.

These plans have been developed with advice from the state and from our internal health advisory group and we will continue to make changes in response to additional information from the Oregon Department of Education, the Oregon Health Authority, and the CDC. We are fortunate that Arbor's space and resources allow us to create an environment in which the risk of COVID-10 transmission is reduced. However, we understand that children and adults may contract and transmit the virus and that by coming together on the campus faculty, staff, students, and student families risk infection. Should such infection occur, we will follow all public health protocols in responding, as outlined in the Arbor School Communicable Disease Management Plan.
