# Is communication always about what you say?



Ideograms: Graphic symbols that represent an idea. (Basically the same thing as pictograms except there's a difference in the relationship between the symbol and the image it represents.)




#### **Early scripts**

#### **Alphabets**



Egyptians were one of the first people to develop a language however the first couple of languages consisted of Egyptian, Sanskrit and Greek.




#### Story telling

**Helen Keller** was a deaf and blind woman who advocated for people with disabilities. She is stated to be the most influential deaf and blind person to live in the world. "Keller learned the manual alphabet and could communicate by finger spelling." She succeeded in effective communication with the seeing and hearing world as the first blind-deaf person.



**Greta Thunberg** is a young woman and activist born in Stockholm, Sweden. In 2018, Thunberg began to form protests in order to show how climate change has affected humans. To many people, she brought up logical points on how there was no other planet to live on beside Earth. Scientists could not just magically create planets or find a random new place to live.
