Austin Community College SLNG 1317: Introduction to the Deaf Community Master Syllabus

Course Description

An overview of the physical, educational, social, and cultural implications of deafness and hearing loss within the context of the individual's personal life, family, and community in today's multicultural world. Emphasis is on current educational and vocational programs, legislation, technology, and other issues.

Course Objectives

Student will...

- 1. Define culture and multicultural.
- 2. Discuss the characteristics of North American deaf/hearing communities.
- 3. Examine the labels and stereotypes of Deaf people in historical context (cultural vs. pathological perspectives on Deaf people.)
- 4. Understand behavior and group norms, values, and common knowledge of Deaf people.
- 5. Identify Deaf community's historical events, person(s), and organizations that impact the Deaf community.
- 6. Define attitudes and oppression within the Hearing and Deaf communities.
- 7. List issues currently controversial among members of the Deaf community.
- 8. Explore the traditions of Deaf people Deaf history, Deaf folklore, Deaf Art/De'VIA, ASL literature, and Deaf literature.
- 9. Learn how to work with the Deaf: Teaching, Interpreting & Advocating.

- **1. PowerPoint slides & presentations** (20%, 5 presentations @ 4% each). Your PowerPoint presentation must be uploaded to the *Intro to the Deaf Community* course on ACC's Blackboard Digital Dropbox <u>prior</u> to class time on the due date. You will present your topic in class. See the <u>PowerPoint</u> <u>presentation handout</u> for more details.
- 2. Video Reflection Papers (10%, 2 papers @ 5% each). The goal of these assignments is for you to express your own thoughts, opinions or questions (not research papers or summaries). All papers should have one-inch margins on each side; use size-12 font (ie. Time New Roman, Calibri, Arial); double-spaced; black ink; stapled. No papers will be accepted after the due date except under circumstances I deem to be extreme or unique. A computer mishap will not excuse a late paper.

Video #1 "Sound & Fury"

Write 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 pages explaining how you felt after watching the movie *Sound & Fury*. Did you agree with anyone involved? Did you think all people involved had valid points? Did this movie change your perspective on cochlear implants? What new insights did you gain from this movie?

Video #2 "Dwarf"

Write 1 % to 2 pages paper comparing the culture, oppression, and experiences of little people to that of the Deaf community. How are these two groups similar, how are they different, and what experiences do they share.

- 3. **Midterm** (25%) The midterm will cover all material presented to that point of the class. It will include information discussed in class, handouts, articles, videos shown in and out of class, class assignments, and lecture. There will be no make-up of the midterm.
- 4. **Final Exam** (25%) Cumulative in nature; it will include comprehension and production, information from the handouts, articles, videos shown in and out of class, class assignments, lecture, and discussions. There will be no make-up of the final.
- 5. **Participation** (10%) Class attendance and participation is about 7.7 points daily. Points begin to be counted on August 23. No points are earned on exam days. You should plan to attend class regularly, inasmuch as the material covered in class and participation in class discussion are vital to your performance in this course.
 - a. Each tardiness and early departure of at least 5 minutes from class will be documented. You are allowed to be tardy or exiting early a maximum of three times. Beyond the maximum will result in losing two (2) points for each time you come to class late or leave early.
 - b. The instructor will withdraw any student who is absent <u>three</u> classes.
- c. Please inform me if you have an exceptional circumstance that causes you to miss class. All students will be encouraged to participate in class discussions and activities on a regular basis. "Participation" does not mean giving "right" answers. It means thinking about the material, sharing your thoughts, paying attention, and giving your best effort.
- 6. **Self-reflection cultural report** (10%) Prepare a 4 6 page paper (APA format) on your understanding of your cultural identity. How does your cultural identity impact your understanding and behavior as a person outside and/or inside of the deaf community? How have you changed over time? How can you apply what you have learned to your personal/professional life? Have you always felt the way you do now about social justice issues? Be critically self-reflective; demonstrate knowledge of critical theory, social justice, multiculturalism and changing societal demographics.
 - **No extra credits accept except under circumstances I deem to be extreme or unique.**
