#### **Covid-19 restrictions**

As per August 6, cases of Covid-19 are increasing in Sweden, mainly among persons under the age of 40. Norway now requires people who have visited for example Gothenburg to stay in quarantine when they arrive home.

We may not ask you whether you are vaccinated or not, but we do hope most of you who come are fully vaccinated or have natural immunity after having had Covid-19. Of course we count on you that you do not come if you have symptoms compatible with Covid-19.

## A. Restrictions for gatherings in Sweden (as of July 15)

### Evangeliska Brödraförsamlingen (EBF)

can host 37 persons in one room where most live presentations will take place and 25 in another room (with a projector).

Another 30 can sit in the café and another 30 can gather on the outdoor balcony (if weather permits). We plan in the first place for the students to use EBF.

# Betlehemskyrkan

is a large church, but will mainly be used only for seminars 11.00-12.30. Presentations will be streamed to a large screen, but one of the seminars will be live in this location.

# B. Restrictions for entering Sweden from abroad (as of July 12).

If you are entering from Norway, Denmark, Finland or Iceland there are no restrictions or need for testing unless you have symptoms. If you have symptoms you need to take a PCR test.

If you are entering from any other EU/EES country you need to take a PCR test UNLESS you have proof of

- a negative PCR test less than 72 hours old
- having received a first dose of a covid-19 vaccine more than three weeks ago
- having had covid-19 within the past six months

### C. Restrictions for returning to your home country

We can not safely provide information about what restrictions apply for those visiting Sweden when you return to your home country. You yourself need to find out what your home country's health authorities require of you.
