Course Description/Student Learning Outcomes:

This course implements the California English Language Development Standards (<u>CA ELD Standards</u>) in order to help students begin to develop their proficiency in the English language and literacy. This course integrates reading, writing, speaking, listening, and language. English learners will use language to interact meaningfully in school and beyond. In addition, English learners will be knowledgeable about English and utilize language as a resource for communicating and learning. This course requires students to use technology, cooperative learning, and other effective research-based learning strategies. Students will be assessed in the four strands: reading, writing, listening & speaking, and language (grammar and vocabulary) to demonstrate language acquisition. In addition, students are expected to practice consistently by completing all tasks and applying effort during each lesson. Students will share stories of their cultural heritage and compare them to American culture. Students will develop an understanding of the importance of classroom community, of working with peers to accomplish common goals, and of taking personal responsibility to complete their own work.

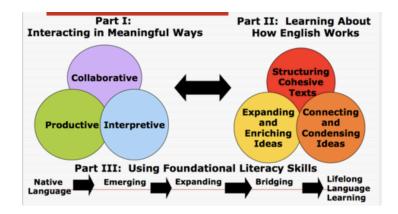

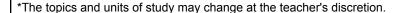

Assessment and Grading (BP 5121 / AR 5121): To ensure that every student has an equal opportunity to demonstrate their learning, the course instructors implement aligned grading practices and common assessments with the same frequency.

1. Grading Categories

☐ Interpretative (reading, viewing, listening) 30%

You will be consistently reading and listening to a variety of texts such as audio, short articles and video to develop active listening and analytical skills. Throughout the year, students complete informal and formal assignments that involve viewing the news, articles, reports etc. You will need to show how you are able to interpret these texts for meaning by taking multiple choice guizzes, writing summaries, and vocalizing opinions based on the content.

☐ Writing and Grammar 30%

You should expect to practice grammar, sentence structures and writing daily in class. For each unit, you will be given multiple opportunities to practice your writing skills in interpersonal correspondence (letters/emails/texts/etc) as well as in formal written essays in order to demonstrate skills such as informing, justifying opinions, arguing, and summarizing.

☐ Speaking 25%

You should expect to speak English daily in class. For each unit, you will be given multiple opportunities to practice your language skills, vocabulary, and pronunciation in spontaneous and guided oral conversations as well as present information on a variety of topics. Students will use oral language to exchange information, support opinions and persuade others while learning to adjust language choices to particular contexts.

☐ Learning Checks: (Participation / Homework / Classwork) 15%

Speaking and writing and engaging in grammar and vocabulary practice activities for homework and in class are vital to developing the skills you need to be successful. Credit will be given for completion of assignments and quality of effort. Some assignments may be graded. You should expect to do additional practice on your own to further your language proficiency. Your participation in class will be assessed for effort in speaking, volunteering, collaborating with other students, being a student leader, etc. Students will keep all classwork/homework and written assignments in a folder or binder in order to help develop good work habits and organizational skills.

2. Achievement Evidence Collected

Students will be informed of the aligned quantity, weight, and due dates of assignment/assessments in each grading category as much in advance as possible. See each category above for types of evidence collected within each category.

4. Homework/outside of class practices (AR 6154):

Students should expect to spend approximately one half hour per night on reading and/or written assignments two to three times a week. Students are expected to participate in class activities and daily assignments some of which may need to be finished outside of class.

5. Excused absence make-up practices (Education Code 48205(b)):

Every moment of class time is important. It is your responsibility to find out what you've missed by going to our Canvas page, agenda slides AND talking with your teacher. You have as many days absent to make up any work as long as these are "excused". Work assigned prior to an absence is due the day you return to class. You should plan to attend ACT to

make up any tests or quizzes or if you need help with any assignments.

Students have the opportunity to retake or revise graded assignments or assessments if they earn below 75%. They can request a retake by submitting the revision form and completing the revision within one week of receiving feedback. Any request after one week will not be allowed unless there are extenuating circumstances. Students have the potential to earn back a maximum of 50% of the points missed.

9. Extra credit practices: No extra credit will be allowed.
