Relation to Curriculum	This course is a compulsory course and offered in the 6 th semester.
Teaching Methods	Teaching methods used in this course are: - Lecture (i.e., SGD, Problem Based Learning, Focus Group Discussion, TPS, TGT, NHT, case study, demonstration, and video-based learning) - Structured assignments (i.e., Nursing care plan) - Practice in Nursing Laboratory (i.e., Clinical Skill Lab) - Team based project during Clinical Fieldwork (i.e., field observation) The class size for lecture is approximately 60 students, while for clinical skill lab is about 15 -20 students for each lecturer and clinical field work is about 7 – 10 students for each lecturer. Contact hours for lecture is 26,67 hours, assignments are 32 hours, private study is 32 and practices are 45,33 hours

1. A triage nurse in the emergency department receives 5 simultaneous patient visits. The first patient is an elderly woman complaining of shortness of breath; the second is a hit-and-run accident victim with lacerations on the head and hand; the third is a toddler with a temperature of 39°C, a history of tonic-clonic seizures at home for 15 minutes; the fourth and fifth patients are a husband and wife involved in an accident where the husband has an open fracture of the mid-shaft of his right tibia, while the wife has a head injury and appears apathetic. Which patient needs first-priority assistance? **(CLO2)**

 - B. The second patient
