Dear Parents, Guardians, Staff, and Community:

I hope everyone enjoyed the Holiday break. It seemed that it went by quickly and, for those who celebrate Christmas, it was certainly not a white one. No matter what your tradition, this part of the winter, sometimes referred to as the Solstice, signifies hope and light. On December 21st, we celebrated the darkest day of the year. We know that each day from this point until summer we will see more and more light. It hopefully mirrors this holiday season with promise for better things to come. No matter what your politics, our world is in a dark place right now and we need the light—we hold on to that promise of hope and light no matter what faces us.

On a personal note, this has been a difficult November/December for the Baker family. We learned in mid-December that our 5-year old grandson, Sam, has Burkitt Lymphoma Stage III. This is a very aggressive cancer that requires a very aggressive treatment protocol on a variety of medications, including strong doses of chemotherapy. As I write this newsletter, Sam is in the hospital receiving treatment. He has been there through the Christmas season, and it looks like he will remain in the hospital for up to a couple of months. I don't share this for any extra sympathy, but rather to stress the fact that we are all susceptible to the unexpected and often harsh twists and turns in life. This is exactly why we need family, friends, coworkers, and community. It is what gets us through. Life goes on, but we do need to slow down and get our priorities straight. Sam has taught me a lot this holiday season about just that message. As we face other tough decisions in our school district, let's not forget that we need each other, and no disagreement is worth sacrificing relationships. It sounds simple but can be very hard—but certainly no harder than the battle that Sam faces over the next several months.

This is going to be a busy couple of months. The boards are working hard on the budgets to be presented. Each of our communities face their own challenges, but never alone. That is the beauty of small, rural communities—we are all in it together.

One more announcement from the supervisory union. Our Director of Finance and Operations, Brittany Currie, is moving on to a new and exciting job at Littleton Regional

Hospital. Board members will testify that Brittany was a strong asset to our SU. She was organized, knowledgeable, and accurate in her budget reporting and operations work. She will be missed. We wish you the best Brittany.

We are now splitting Brittany's job into two functions—Finance and Operations. We have two members of our current supervisory union management team that are willing and able to step up into these positions at least as interim for now. They are both local and have made great contributions in their current roles. Starting on January 15th, Joe Houston will be our Interim Director of Operations and Annie Houston will be our Interim Director of Finance. I am thankful they were willing, and I am certain that they will do a great job moving forward. And, the best part, with some coaching by Brittany, we will keep the district moving through this budget season. Welcome Joe and Annie!

Here are a few more updates for January:

Budget Season: As stated above, we continue to work with school boards on our budgets that will support our schools next year. In March we all come together to vote on those budgets. This year will be a little different especially as we look at the revenue side of the budgets. We have been depending on "Equalized Pupil" to determine our revenue. This year Act 127 is causing a change from this formula to a "Long-Term ADM (Average Daily Membership)" formula. Because the revised "weights" depend more on rurality, sparsity, and poverty, our towns should do better on the revenue side. In other words, the legislators acknowledged that educating in a rural area provides additional challenges.

How do pupil weights impact local homestead property tax rates?

Not surprisingly, it looks like the new Long Term Weighted Average Daily Membership (LTWADM) will be good for all of our districts. We are rural and we are sparse, so the weights add to our daily membership and our weighted enrollments have all gone up. This will make our LTWADM per pupil expenditures go down. This should help us budget for the services we need for our students and still maintain reasonable tax rates. This is exactly how the legislated formula was intended to work. It was supposed to provide educational opportunities for students who live in rural areas and where communities do not have the adequate tax base. Stay tuned for the public budget hearings where we try to explain this in more detail. Report Cards and Understanding Proficiency-Based Grading: The first Trimester or Semester (depending on the school) has now ended. We are currently in the process of sharing report cards with families. Many of you have already accessed report cards through the PowerSchool online portal. Information about signing up can be found here. All families will also receive a hard copy of their student's first trimester or semester report card by January 15, 2024.

In an effort to communicate clearly with families, here is more information about proficiency-based grading in OSSU.

In all OSSU schools, students are assessed on grade level standards. Many of these standards are not fully taught until the end of the school year, as they are year-end standards. When report cards are sent home, your student's class will not have completed instruction in all areas on the report card. You should expect that your student may have 1's and 2's on their Trimester One or Semester One Report Card, as the entire class is progressing in their instruction on various standards, with some standards just being introduced. This is a snapshot of their progress in a particular moment. This can be confusing for parents, as this was not how we were assessed when we were in school.

Please see the image below, which clearly defines what the numbers 1-4 represent on your student's report card. If you have questions, please contact your student's teacher. We want to hear from you. We are all in this together and will do our best to support you in understanding your student's progress in school as we make this transition!

4	Exceeding	The student is exceeding expectations and demonstrates an in-depth understanding which can be applied independently across content areas.
3	Proficient	The student is proficient and meets expectations for the targeted knowledge and skills by demonstrating sufficient understanding through application.
2	Developing	The student is developing proficiency towards the expectations and shows partial understanding of the foundational knowledge and skills.
1	Beginning	The student is not demonstrating sufficient proficiency or evidence of progress towards the expectations of the foundational knowledge and skills.

PowerSchool Parent Portal: PowerSchool is where parents can keep tabs on student grades and attendance, update your contact information and submit required school forms. For parents who have never logged in, please take a moment to log in today at https://ps.ossu.org/public/. If you have more than one student, you can link all of them to your account so you can see each child's progress, grades, attendance, etc. with just one login.

If you need help logging in for the first time, please reach out to your school's administrative assistant.

NEW PowerSchool Mobile App: Download the **PowerSchool Mobile app** from the Apple App or Google Play Store and get anytime, anywhere access to grades, attendance, forms, schedules, and more on any iOS or Android device. **Please note:** *Before downloading or logging into the PowerSchool app, you must first have a Parent Portal account set up from a computer.* If you need help in <u>creating an account</u>, please reach out to your school's administrative assistant.

Why use the app? With the PowerSchool App, you will have convenient access to your child's grades and attendance information in real time. After downloading the app, you will sign in with the OSSU district code: JHLB. You will also need to enter your Username and Password that you use to access PowerSchool from a computer.

Access Control

OSSU is in the process of updating our school safety procedures to meet the requirements of VT ACT 29. A component of this legislation requires us to revisit how we allow visitors to access our campus buildings. With limited exceptions, all exterior doors other than a dual door main entry are to remain locked at all times when students and staff are present in any OSSU building. This includes after school so adjustments may have to be made for athletic and after school program pickup. In addition, during pickup and dropoff, parents/guardians may accompany their students to the exterior access door but shall not enter the building with limited exceptions.

Another requirement of the new ACT 29 law is for schools to engage in training and drills for options based response to an intruder in the building or on campus. OSSU has adopted the ALICE training system to meet this requirement. Schools will be conducting ALICE training with students. The ALICE system utilizes a trauma informed approach with age and ability appropriate lessons and strategies. Each school will be holding an information session prior to beginning training with students so that parents/guardians can gain a better understanding of how ALICE will be presented to their children. Afterschool Programming: Once a week during the Fall WonderKids Afterschool program, students from Craftsbury, Hardwick, Wolcott, and Woodbury Elementary schools made colorful handmade gifts. Felted soaps, tie dyed scarves, and rolled beeswax candles were bundled with decorative papers they had stamped, and holiday greeting cards. On December 21, these gifts were donated, going out to about 100 families through the Craftsbury and Hardwick Food Pantry. What a wonderful gift these generous elementary school students shared this holiday season!

Policy Work: We continue to prioritize policies that are required by law as we review and revise across the SU. This work needed to happen. Many of our policies were sorely outdated. Remember, you can find the adopted policies here. In January, we will review **Responsible Computer, Network & Internet Use.** We hope to adopt **Prohibition of Firearms and Weapons** and **Volunteers and Work Study Students.** If you have feedback on any policy, please contact a board member or me. Board Meetings: Our school boards have been very busy and as previously mentioned, are now in budget season. I feel very fortunate to work with such committed members. Portrait of a Graduate: We are coming to a close on the feedback stage that will provide us themes related to attributes we want for all of our graduates. We have interviewed and/or surveyed multiple stakeholders throughout this phase. Our last step is to meet with all board members to let them have input on their hopes and dreams for an Orleans Southwest graduate and present a final draft in late January. Once the Portrait is adopted, we move on to an even more critical phase where we look at our "Current State of Analysis" (CSA) against the indicators in the portrait to see our strengths and our weaknesses and build a very specific strategic plan with action steps, timelines, and assigned responsibilities. Our goal is to have a draft action plan in place by the end of this school year. It is aggressive, but so important for the future of all our schools.

Equity Update:

The Equity Team has been hard at working creating an implementation plan for the district Equity Policy. With help from multiple stakeholder groups throughout the SU we are very close to a rollout so lookout for updates. Before break both Wolcott and Hardwick hosted the Anti-Racist Storytime for adults where we engaged in community conversation and shared our December holidays lesson. Testing for Polychlorinated Biphenyls (PCBs): We have received the test results for Hardwick Elementary School. Not surprisingly, there were a few rooms that exceeded the allowable levels. We are working with the state to determine the exact source and to abate the PCB traces. While this work is going on, we will make sure that none of the identified rooms are in use. On a positive note, we were told that the levels were not as significant as other findings across the state. These tests were taken as part of the State of Vermont mandated testing schedule. Our next schools to be tested according to the State of Vermont schedule are Hazen Union School and Lakeview Elementary in the spring of 2024 with Craftsbury Schools and Woodbury Elementary following in spring of 2025. Because of its construction date, Wolcott Elementary School does not have to be tested.
