Cell Phones & Electronic Devices

To maintain a safe and orderly learning environment, students' use of electronic devices (with the exception of their school laptop) which include: cell phones, music listening devices, earbuds, cameras, game systems, smart watches, or other devices are restricted. Students will not be permitted to access phones during class time. Students will place phones in a designated area upon entering the classroom.

Refusal to do so will result in a referral for being defiant.

- First offense will result in the parent picking up the phone after school.
- Second offense will result in the student losing phone privileges for 5 school days.
- Third offense is loss of phone privilege for 30 school days.
- The fourth offense will result in loss of phone privileges for the remainder of the school year.

At Carroll County High School students are forbidden to possess, view, send, or share pictures or text sexual content while the student is on school grounds or at school sponsored events. This policy strictly prohibits sexual material in electronic or any other form and includes but is not limited to the sexual material contained on cellular phones, digital cameras, or personal digital assistants and sexual material transmitted by text message, e-mail, or any electronic communication device. A student who violates this policy is subject to severe consequences including possible expulsion.

It is also a violation of the Kentucky criminal statutes to possess, create, photograph, exhibit, or disseminate certain categories of material of a sexual nature that meet the definitions of child exploitation or child pornography. School personnel are required to report to law enforcement or child protective services whenever there is reason to believe that any student or other person is involved with child exploitation or child pornography. A person who is convicted of child exploitation or adjudicated a juvenile delinquent for violating the child exploitation statute is required to register with the state of Kentucky as a sex offender.
