## Part 4

Chenjerai tells us that the liberation of people of color in the US is despite, not because of, America and the values of “life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.” That by resisting America, its laws, economic system, and the white supremacist vision, is how our social justice victories have been won. How does this fit in with the dominant narrative in the US? How does it fit in with the white supremacist/nationalist rhetoric around race today?

Chenjerai talks about the importance of understanding that the story was deliberately and specifically only for certain white men. However, Dr. King used it to great effect. Why do you think Dr. King used the story? Who was he appealing to?
