Write a 500-700-word reflection that addresses all of the following:

- How familiar with politics are you, in general? Do you keep up with the news? Explain why or why not (no judgment!)
- From what dates did you listen to the podcast? What themes or trends came out of the episodes in terms of politics, government, race, gender or power?
- What did you learn? What are some of the key issues, events, etc. that stood out to you from your chosen podcasts?
- What questions or concerns remain for you after having listened?
- What topics do you want to talk about more in class? Why?
 - What is your "Can't Let it Go"? What is it that you can't let go of, politics or otherwise?

US Govt: Race, Gender and Power Honors:

- Due: First full week of school.
- Listen to 7 episodes of the NPR Politics Podcast.
 - At least TWO of those episodes MUST be Friday episodes, which are a bit more in-depth and feature "Can't Let It Go" (CLIG) at the end. CLIGs are fun!

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Write a 750-950-word reflection that addresses all of the following:

- How familiar with politics are you, in general? Do you keep up with the news? Explain why or why not (no judgment!)
- From what dates did you listen to the podcast? What themes or trends came out of the episodes in terms of politics, government, race, gender or power?
- What did you learn? What are some of the key issues, events, etc. that stood out to you from your chosen podcasts?
- What questions or concerns remain for you after having listened?
- O What topics do you want to talk about more in class? Why?
- What do you see as the most important political issues facing the nation right now? Why?
 How would you approach this issue?
