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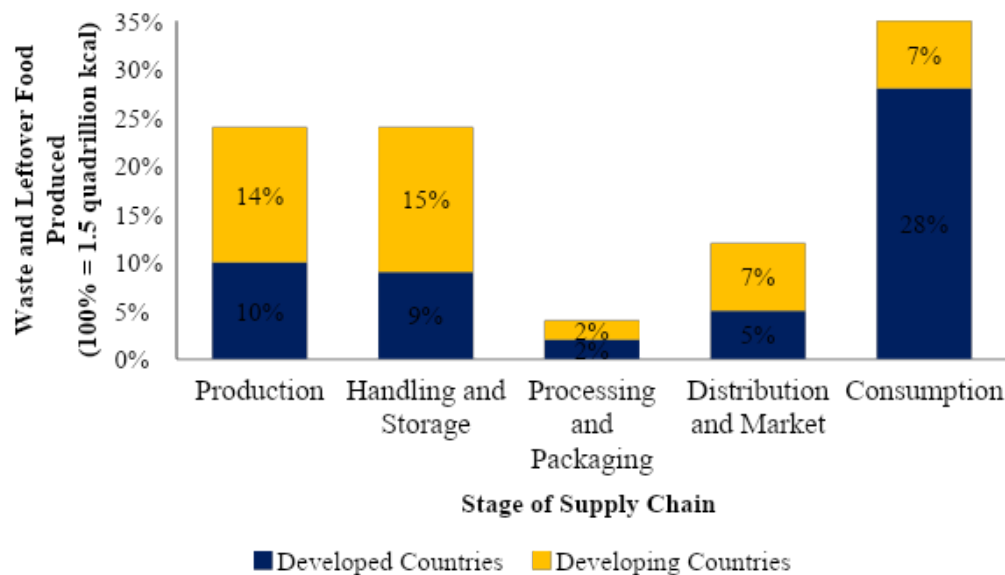


Fig. 1. Percentage of waste and leftover food produced in each stage of supply (Hanson et al., 2015)

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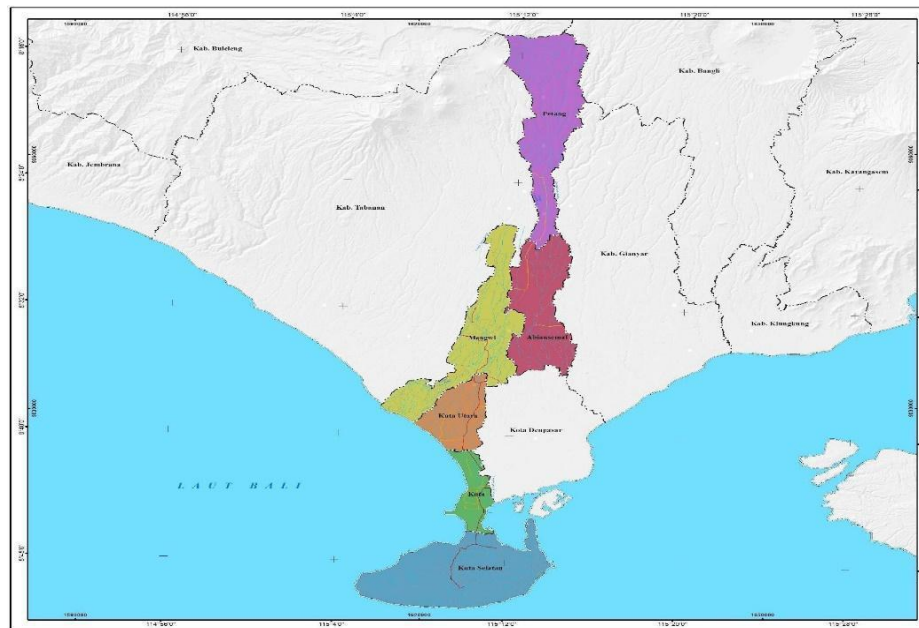


Fig. 2. Research location

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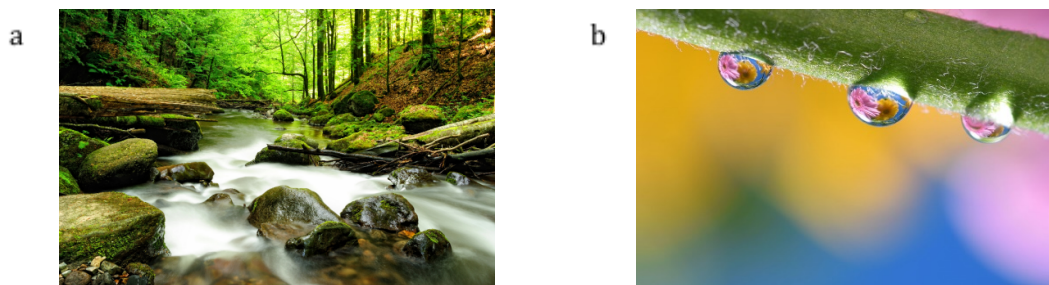


Fig. 3 (a) First picture; (b) Second picture
