## Sermon-Based Bible Study - Trust Issues

## **CONNECT**

**Ice Breaker Question:** What "lessons" did you learn from your parents on spending, finances, money management, and generosity? (Either by their teaching or example)

Community Question: What is the best financial decision you have made? Biggest regret?

Intro: This week Chris begins a series of messages addressing our relationship with money and how important it is to us and to God for our well-being.

## **STUDY**

1. What did you hear in this week's sermon that was new about how spiritually important our relationship with money and possessions is, and what God has to say about it?

**Read 1 Timothy 6:9-10** (Read it a few times, in different versions if possible, and reflect on their meaning)

- a. Who do you know who does not "want to get rich" or at least "have more money"?
- b. How does "wanting more" fool us and seep into our lives?
- c. Few people would openly admit to "loving money". How do we "fall in love" with money and how does it become "evil"?
- 2. Read Luke 12:15. "Be on your guard against all types of greed"
  - a. Remembering that Jesus' audience was not rich: How is "wanting more" deceiving us about real security and contentment?
- 3. Matthew 6:24: "You cannot serve both God and money".
  - a. How is living in both the "kingdom of money/possessions" and "God´s Kingdom" impossible? When have you found yourself trying to do just that?
  - b. How is worry and anxiety often tied to desiring "financial security" and often competes with "God as Lord"?

## **APPLY & PRAY**

**Reflect:** Who has been a good example to you of living out today's sermon in their life? What is your plan to live in a more holy relationship with money/possessions becoming more generous, less "worried about money"?

**Prayer Requests:** Have someone take prayer requests for your group. Have someone write them down, and make sure someone distributes them or texts the group.

Follow up: Follow up on past prayer requests.

Pray: Have someone in your group pray over everyone for faith to treat others as Christ does.
