## [Coronavirus Tracker](#) — SF Chronicle

“The average number of new coronavirus cases reported daily in the Bay Area for the week that ended June 6 and included the Memorial Day holiday with limited reporting was 177, down from 200 the previous week. The daily average for May, which included a backlog of more than 1,000 cases being reported in Alameda County on May 4, was 231. That number is down from 470 in April and down from more than 3,500 per day in January.”

“The state has reported fewer than 1,000 cases a day on average for the past two weeks — the lowest numbers since March 2020. COVID-19 deaths are similarly low, with fewer than two dozen reported a day. EBMUD's board of directors declared the first stage of a drought in April and conditions have worsened.”

“Associate superintendent for business services Tony Wold ... said though the district's financial situation has improved since the board worked to [fill in a roughly \\$49.9 million structural deficit in 2019-20](#), the district will likely face additional budget challenges in future years. Wold added that the district can use one-time funds to pay for expenditures for the next two fiscal years but will likely face a budget deficit starting in the 2023-24 school year and may need to use up to \$15 million from the district's reserves to cover it.”

**Lumber shortage hikes cost of pallets for Northern California manufacturers — The North Bay Business Journal**

“Pallet prices in the U.S. are usually between \$9 and \$12. Today it’s closer to \$15 on average. In California, where goods often cost more than the national average, businesses are seeing an even greater increase. One North Bay company that didn’t want its name used said pallets had gone from \$10 to \$26 in the last three to four months.”

**City Church’s Pop-Up Shelter produces results for Fairfield’s homeless residents — Daily Republic**

“City Church has provided services to those in need for more than a decade. This pilot program began in April with the help of the city and some area churches to serve up to nine homeless individuals, with temporary shelter, case management, job placement, housing navigation and the ultimate goal of connections to permanent housing. ... All nine original participants in the program have been able to find entry-level jobs in the community. They live on-site, build up their funds and hopefully get to the point of living in Sober Living Environment homes, featuring rooms for three to four residents, with the ultimate goal of finding permanent residences.”

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**S.F. makes city ID cards free, ends more fees and fines to help low-income residents — SF Chronicle**

“The city will stop charging artists who sell their goods in designated street spaces and who are often low-income, immigrants or older people trying to support themselves. Families dealing with the deaths of loved ones, who can be homeless or low-income crime victims, will no longer have to pay for some documents and services from the medical examiner. It will now be free to get a city ID card, which many undocumented residents use. And people surrendering their animals or late to apply for a dog license won’t have to pay.”

#### **School bus charter shutting down Bayview facility, laying off 228 — San Francisco Business Times**

“The 228 affected employees include drivers, dispatchers, mechanics, fuelers and staff. The layoffs will become effective July 31, according to the filing. The Bayview facility is at 2270 Jerrold Ave.”

#### **S.F. school bus contract complicated by accusation of corporate espionage — SF Chronicle (from 2/23/21)**

“The San Francisco Board of Education introduced a resolution on Jan. 19 to award Zum, the bus contractor for the Oakland Unified School District, a five-year contract for \$152 million. That was \$17 million less than the bid by First Student, which describes itself as the largest school transportation company in North America, with 42,500 buses. A final vote is scheduled Tuesday, but First Student has asked the board to put the contract on hold while the company pursues its legal case against Zum and its consultant, Mark Frith. Frith was First Student’s day-to-day general manager in Northern California from March 2019 until December 2020 and presented the company’s contract renewal bid to the school board on Dec. 9. A day later, he signed a consulting agreement with Zum, and the following day, after announcing his departure, he downloaded First Student’s bid into his private email account, First Student’s lawyers said in court filings.”

#### **Bayview Community and SFMTA Receive National Planning Award — SFMTA**

“During a two-year open-ended planning process, the SFMTA partnered with five community-based organizations to develop a responsive and actionable plan that directly responds to the transportation needs, challenges, and values of Bayview’s residents.

Some of highlights from the plan:

- **Community-driven Partnerships** – The SFMTA partnered with local organizations [BMAGIC](#), [Hunters Point Family](#), [CYC](#), [El Centro Bayview](#), and

[BAYCAT](#) to prioritize including those hardest to reach and most vulnerable to transportation challenges.

- **Showing Respect and Building Trust** – Through a series of 22 interviews with community leaders & elders, the SFMTA created a Statement of Intent. This serves as a promise to the public of accountability, trust & transparency, preserving community voice, and delivering effective projects in a community historically subject to long planning timelines and limited improvements.
- **Direct Public Outreach** – The project team focused on meeting residents where they were, spending 295 hours speaking face-to-face with over 4,000 residents throughout a 14-month public outreach period.
- **Equity Index** - A tool for mapping vulnerability to transportation challenges, with definitions and calibration supplied by Bayview residents. This ensured the plan benefits those whom the community believes to be most in need.
- **Youth Transportation Summit** – The Girls2000 program worked with SFMTA staff to organize the summit for Bayview youth of color, attended by Supervisor Walton.
- **“Next Stop”** - A must-watch short-four-minute-film produced, shot and edited by young women of color in the Bayview. Discussing transportation, safety and advocacy, the film ends with the call to action: Sound Off! Be Heard!
- **The SFMTA’s First Participatory Budgeting (PB) Exercise** - Led by a Community Steering Committee of 12 residents & community leaders, Bayview residents directly voted on how to spend \$760,000 to improve transit and transit access in their community.
- **A Commitment of \$3.61 Million** – A transparently-developed set of priority projects based on the needs and lived experience of Bayview residents – with prioritization for funding based solely on resident input.”

### [Bayview Neighborhood Park \\$3.3M Makeover Includes Cool Kid’s Play Area](#) — CBS San Francisco

“Improvements added to the park, located at 1 Lillian Court, include a new children’s play area equipped with new synthetic turf and a custom skywalk that connects to a climbing net and 25-foot slide. Other improvements to the park include a new picnic area and barbeque grill; a lawn; outdoor fitness equipment; new seating; new lighting; accessible pathways; and revamped landscaping that includes the addition of 14 new trees.”

“The word Umoja means ‘unity’ in Swahili, and it’s the inspiration for a network of about 30 Bay Area groups called Umoja Health. Their effort to understand the culture of local neighborhoods has helped ramp up COVID-19 testing and vaccination rates in the Bay Area’s Black communities.”

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#### [Unemployment Improves In East Palo Alto Area: Feds](#) — Patch

“The unemployment rate in the East Palo Alto area has largely improved since the beginning of the pandemic and there was some improvement from March to April, according to the federal Bureau of Labor Statistics. San Mateo County’s unemployment rate was 4.8 percent in April, which was down from 4.9 percent in March. That reflected significant improvement from April 2020, when the unemployment rate stood at 11.8 percent. San Mateo County’s April unemployment rate is lower than California’s 8.1 percent rate, according to the latest local figures from the BLS.”

#### [From farms to families: How a federal program to help farmers during the pandemic is changing the local food landscape](#) — The Almanac

“The Farmers to Families food box program was announced in April 2020, when the USDA created a Coronavirus Food Assistance Program. A total of \$16 billion was set aside to provide direct payments to agricultural producers and \$3 billion went to create and implement the Farmers to Families Food Box program. Later funding in December 2020 added another \$1.5 billion to the program. The program had five contract rounds, and in the first two, the Concord-based Fresh Approach was included. Fresh Approach, a nonprofit that provides locally-grown produce, nutrition education and gardening skills to Bay Area communities, collaborated with local farms and organizations. While the pandemic exacerbated local hunger needs, there was already a significant amount of

food insecurity, both nationally and locally. Reports vary, but the average rate of food insecurity was about 17% in San Mateo and Santa Clara counties pre-pandemic, according to the Silicon Valley Institute for Regional Studies, which authored a report on regional food insecurity.”

#### **Ethnic Media Reporters recognized for covering 2020 epic events — East Palo Alto Today**

“Selected from 235 submissions from reporters working in print, digital, TV and radio platforms in eight languages, the winners were chosen by judges with language and cultural fluency who know the challenges of working in the sector. ‘Ethnic media has quickly become an increasingly indispensable bridge for communicating with diverse populations within our state,’ Governor Gavin Newsom said at the opening ceremony.”

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#### **Water bills going up for East Bay Municipal Utility District customers — Richmond Standard**

“The water bill is set to increase starting next month for East Bay Municipal Utility District (EBMUD) customers, after the agency’s Board of Directors unanimously approved rate increases as part of a two-year, \$2.25 billion budget on Tuesday. Water and wastewater rates will each increase 4 percent in the first year, starting July 1, 2021, and an additional 4 percent each in the second year, starting July 1, 2022, according to EBMUD, which called the rate hikes ‘vital to water and waster system improvements.’ An average household using 200 gallons of water per day will see a \$2.53 increase in their monthly water bill starting in July, and an additional increase of \$2.66 monthly the following year, EBMUD said.”

#### **Richmond Conflicted on Reallocating Police Funds — Richmond Pulse**

“The meeting centered on a presentation from city staff that offered an alternative to the Reimagining Public Safety Community Task Force’s recommendations to shift \$10.3 million from the police department. Staff suggested reducing the task force’s proposed funding to \$5.58 million with \$2.3 million coming from the police department. The remaining money would stem from the [American Rescue Plan Act](#) and excess funding

from the current fiscal year. After hearing from 56 public speakers, the council did not approve the staff's recommendation. Instead, the council voted 5-2 for staff to continue working with the task force to see how the police department can further fund a community crisis response team and SOS! Richmond."

#### **For Their Health, Older People Get Back in the Water — Richmond Pulse**

"For a 2016 study published in the Journal of Rheumatology, 48 sedentary middle-aged or older adults with [osteoarthritis participated in swimming exercises](#) for three months — 45 minutes a day for three days a week. Physicians saw significant reductions in participants' joint pain, stiffness and physical limitations. They also noted a 15 to 30% increase in maximum handgrip strength, isokinetic knee extension, flexion power and the distance participants could walk in six minutes."

#### **Richmond Art Center to host Drag Queen Story Hour for families — Richmond Standard**

"The Richmond Art Center (RAC) is celebrating Pride month by hosting a free online 'Drag Queen Story Hour with PerSia' on Saturday, June 12 from 10-11 a.m. In an event geared toward kids and their families, PerSia will read *A Day in the Life of Marlon Bundo* by Jill Twiss, according to the RAC."

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#### **Coronavirus Tracker — SF Chronicle**

"The whole state will throw off the tier structure shackles June 15 when the state reopens. Over 1 million adults in the San Francisco metro area — almost one-third of the adult population — [plan to take an overnight trip at least 100 miles from home](#) in the next four weeks as the pandemic eases, U.S. Census Bureau data shows. That's more than the California average of 26% and the national average of 28%."

#### **Solano cruising toward end of state blueprint – and start of county fair — Daily Republic**

"The Solano County Fair Association reported that it has not made any changes to its county fair plans because of the county going into the orange tier or the prospect of the state's Blueprint for a Safer Economy going away Tuesday. The centerpiece of the fair remains the annual Livestock Show and Auction, with participant-only showing and judging at the fairgrounds in Vallejo, and the second straight year with an online auction. A drive-in concert series is also planned, with a food festival for those who buy tickets to the shows. The Solano County Fair is scheduled June 17-20."

“The grants will be made to East Palo Alto Community Alliance and Neighborhood Development Organization, Preserving Affordable Housing Assets Longterm Inc. and Youth United for Community Action to build two secondary homes as part of a co-op community land trust with a leadership development program; to [United Hope Builders](#), to build a factory in East Palo Alto to manufacture prefabricated homes and employ local residents; to City Systems, to create a project showcasing secondary home constructions in garages; to Soup, to promote a new financing model with low upfront costs for financing secondary homes; and to Symbium, to help homeowners and nonprofits plan ADUs and aid cities in streamlining the approval processes for the secondary homes, sometimes referred to as in-law units or granny cottages.”

California workers receiving unemployment benefits will receive an extra \$600 on top of their weekly amount as part of the federal relief bill. Depending on how much you make, you'll get weekly benefits from \$40 to \$450 from the state and an additional \$600 from the federal government. Benefits will last for up to 39 weeks. 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## Watch Out For Scams

The IRS is urging people to look out for scam calls and emails about COVID-19 relief money. The IRS says it will never call you to verify or provide financial information. Do not open any emails or answer any questions from people who call you asking for personal information:

KRON 4 reports that scammers are sending out what appears to be an urgent text telling people about possible exposure to someone with COVID-19. The text tells the recipient they have come into contact with someone who tested positive. It then advises them to self-quarantine and tells them to click a link for more information. The link is likely a phishing attempt to get the recipient's information so don't click on it.

Beware of unemployment pension scams. [According to the Federal Trade Commission](#), scammers are filing for unemployment, using information from people who haven't lost their

jobs. Sometimes money is sent to the real person, and the scammer contacts them pretending to be a government official. Then they'll tell the victim the funds were sent to them by mistake and direct the victim to send it somewhere. That's called a money mule scam. Transferring stolen money, that makes the situation worse.

If you received funds from unemployment and did not apply, the FTC recommends that you report it to them at [IdentityTheft.gov](https://www.identitytheft.gov), your employer, the unemployment office, and check your credit reports and cyber security.
