



The Impact of Funding Delays on Programs and Survivors

Outreach and Advocacy Toolkit

Federal funding is critical to ensuring survivors of domestic violence and sexual assault can access lifesaving services and support. When funding is delayed, programs are left without the resources needed to operate, leading to reduced services, staff shortages, or even program closures - putting survivors' safety and stability at risk.

Funding delays have real and immediate consequences, and lawmakers need to hear from you! Use this toolkit to help guide your outreach and advocacy efforts.

Your advocacy is working - we have already seen success with the release of some delayed Notices of Funding Opportunities (NOFOs) and grants. **But the work is not done.** Questions remain about the release of the remaining NOFOs, when these funds will reach domestic violence and sexual assault organizations, and when critical funding that has yet to be distributed will be released. We encourage you to **continue contacting lawmakers to maintain momentum** and ensure your voices are heard!

Contact Your State/Territory Lawmakers

These funding delays also have significant impacts on state, territory, and local systems. Because many states/territories cannot absorb or backfill delays in federal victim services funding, disruptions at the federal level can create serious budget challenges for states/territories.

In addition to contacting Members of Congress, advocates should also share these concerns with state/territory lawmakers, attorneys general, governors, and other state/territory leaders who can help elevate the urgency of these delays.

Talking Points

Critical Funding Delays Impacting Survivors:

- Domestic violence shelters, rape crisis centers, and other programs serving survivors have been experiencing delays in federal funding across core funding for the field, including FVPSA and VAWA funding. This instability is forcing programs to consider staffing reductions, reduced services for survivors, and, in some cases, program closures.
- The U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) must **immediately publish the remaining FY26 Office of Violence Against Women (OVW) Notice of Funding Opportunities (NOFOs)**. DOJ and the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) **must also expedite the release of congressionally appropriated funds for VAWA and FVPSA grants** so programs can continue providing lifesaving services to survivors. Survivors and programs cannot wait - this action is needed today!

Family Violence Prevention and Services Act (FVPSA) Funding Delays:

- FVPSA funding provides core support to more than 2,000 domestic violence shelters and local programs across all states/territories, delivering lifesaving services and emergency shelter to over two million survivors and their children each year.
- FVPSA funding is the only federal funding source dedicated to domestic violence shelters and programs and is essential to keeping them operational.
- Fiscal Year 2026 (FY26) FVPSA funding was intended to begin on October 1, 2025. Although the FY26 Notices of Funding Opportunities (NOFOs) for FVPSA formula grants were finally released during the first week of June, they were originally due on January 30, 2026. This more than four-month delay has significantly pushed back the timeline for getting critical resources to domestic violence programs.
- It can take around 6-9 months from the time the NOFO is released for local domestic violence programs to receive funding.
- This delay means **domestic violence shelters and local programs in many states, territories, and communities across the country will face several months without the core funding that keeps the lights on and doors open.**
- Additionally, FY26 NOFOs for training and technical assistance were finally released in early August. If funds are not received by September 30, local and state programs may lose access to critical training, technical expertise, and

capacity-building support to help strengthen services and meet the needs of survivors and their children.

- **HHS must expedite the release of congressionally appropriated FY26 FVPSA funds** so that survivors receive lifesaving services and programs receive the vital support they need.

Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) Funding Delays:

- VAWA grants support more than two million services every year for victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking. This includes emergency shelter, legal services, mental health services, housing assistance, economic support, and specialized domestic violence services through law enforcement and the courts.
- **Some FY25 Office on Violence Against Women (OVW) grant funds have not been released.** These grants, intended to begin on October 1, 2025, are more than ten months into the grant year, leaving programs in limbo, with many having to lay off staff and reduce or eliminate grant services.
- **Some FY26 Office on Violence Against Women (OVW) NOFOs have also not been released. The delays in applications will inevitably delay grant awards and the release of funds nationwide.**

What These Delays Mean For Programs & Survivors:

- Most victim service providers operate with limited reserves and cash on hand, meaning **funding delays are effectively funding cuts.**
- As a result, programs - and the organizations that support them - are being forced to consider reducing services, reducing staff, or, in some cases, closing their doors. *[Insert state/territory/program-specific examples here.]*
- This instability is straining already overextended programs, increasing staff burnout, and reducing overall capacity to serve survivors.
- Victim advocates provide critical services including crisis response, emergency shelter, legal advocacy, and support for survivors of domestic violence and sexual assault. State and territorial coalitions against domestic violence and sexual assault, and training and technical assistance providers, give critical support to advocates and programs serving the complex needs of survivors. Continued funding delays are contributing to staffing losses and limiting access to these essential services.

It is also important to share these concerns and messaging with state/territory-level leaders, including state legislators, attorneys general, governors, and other state/territory leaders - particularly where funding delays are creating challenges for state and local budgets.

These delays will force programs to consider staffing cuts, reduced services, and, in some cases, complete closures.

Additionally, FY26 FVPSA NOFOs for training and technical assistance to support local programs were finally released in early August. If funds are not received by September 30, local and state programs may lose access to critical training, technical assistance, and capacity-building support needed to strengthen services and meet the evolving needs of survivors and their children.

At the same time, some FY25 OVW grants are now more than ten months delayed, and many of the FY26 OVW NOFO's have still not been published. This funding provides critical services for survivors, including emergency shelter, legal services, mental health support, housing assistance, and economic support.

It is essential to keeping more than 2,000 local programs operational nationwide and supporting lifesaving services and emergency shelter for over two million survivors and their children each year.

Although the delayed FY26 FVPSA NOFOs for formula grants to States and Territories were finally released in early June, they were originally due on January 30, 2026. Because it takes approximately six to nine months from the time a NOFO is released for local programs to actually receive funding, these delays mean shelters and programs may still face extended periods without the core operating funds needed to keep services available. This gap places programs at immediate risk, particularly because most states and territories cannot backfill FVPSA funding.

Additionally, FY26 FVPSA NOFOs for training and technical assistance to support local programs were finally released in early August. If funds are not received by September 30, local and state programs may lose access to critical training, technical assistance, and capacity-building support needed to strengthen services and meet the evolving needs of survivors and their children.

At the same time, there have been significant delays at OVW. Some FY25 OVW grants, intended to begin on October 1, 2025, are now more than ten months overdue, and some of the FY26 OVW NOFOs have also not yet been published - further delaying applications and funding nationwide. OVW grants support more than two million services each year, including emergency shelter, legal services, housing assistance, mental health care, and economic support for survivors of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking.

This means that many programs will continue to face months without core funding that keeps the lights on and doors open. **[@Representative or Senator]**: Tell HHS to expedite the release of congressionally appropriated funds. - FY26 Family Violence Prevention and Services Act (#FVPSA) funding notices for training and technical assistance to support local programs were finally released in August. - Some Office on Violence Against Women (#OVW) grants were supposed to begin on October 1, 2025. More than ten months into the grant year, some grant funds haven't been released, leaving programs in limbo and forced to lay off staff and reduce or eliminate grant-funded services for survivors. **[@Representative or Senator]**: Tell the DOJ to expedite the release of congressionally appropriated OVW funds. Survivors can't wait. #FundSafetyNow #SupportSurvivors #SurvivorsDeserveBetter

- Our communities depend on federal grants to support survivors of domestic violence and sexual assault. 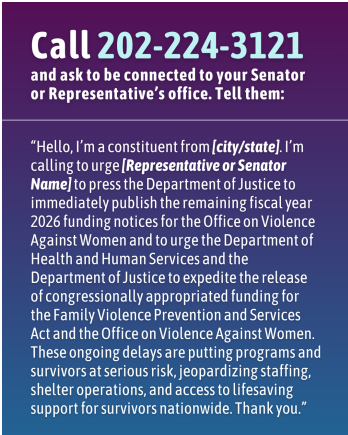

Media Outreach

Media coverage can be an effective way to increase public awareness and add pressure on the Administration by highlighting the real impacts funding delays are having on survivors, programs, and communities.

Sharing these stories publicly can help elevate the urgency of releasing federal funds. Use the talking points above, along with local examples, to help develop your messaging and illustrate the impact of these delays.

Contact journalists you have worked with previously or reporters who have covered issues related to domestic violence, sexual assault, federal funding, or related policy issues. Thank them for covering these important issues and explain why these new developments are urgent and need coverage.

If you are unfamiliar with reporters covering these topics in your local paper or media outlets, search the outlet's website using key terms such as "domestic violence," "sexual assault," or "federal funding" and look for coverage beyond crime reporting.

You can also reach out to reporters in your city or county who may be interested in these issues. Contact information is often available in the outlet's "Contact Us" section or on reporter profile pages.
