If you're a parent of an elementary-age child in Boulder County thinking about summer camp signup, there are a few key things to know — deadlines, paperwork, cost & financial aid, availability, and planning ahead. What to expect / what to do ahead of time Registration often goes fast & fills up early

- Many camps in City of Boulder Parks & Recreation fill quickly once registration opens.
 For 2026, for instance, the "summer camp guide" becomes available early each year, and registration typically starts in mid-February. (City of Boulder)
- Some specialized or popular camps (arts, sports, nature, certain weeks) get fully booked, so it's smart to have a "plan B" in case your first choice gets taken.

Paperwork is mandatory (health, emergency contact, immunization, permissions)

- For most camps whether city-run, district, or private you'll need to complete health/medication/emergency info forms. For example, City of Boulder camps use an online system called ePACT for camper paperwork. (<u>City of Boulder</u>)
- Until that's done, your child may not be allowed to attend. (<u>City of Boulder</u>)

Fees vary — and there are financial-aid or subsidy options

- Some camps have different fees for residents vs. non-residents (for example, City of Boulder camps). (City of Boulder)
- If you qualify (e.g. based on income, public assistance, or other criteria), you may be able to apply for support. For example, financial aid or a discount program called PLAYpass helps reduce costs for qualified families. (PLAY Boulder Foundation)
- Keep in mind that some subsidies or assistance programs may have limited capacity or criteria; it's worth applying early if you might qualify.

Registration usually includes deposit or full payment, and cancellation / refund policies vary

- For City of Boulder camps, a deposit (non-refundable) is often required at registration, with the balance due by a certain time before the camp starts. (<u>City of Boulder</u>)
- Some camps may not refund fees if you cancel after a certain date; make sure to check each camp's cancellation policy. For example, in one local private-school-based camp, refunds were not available after a cutoff date. (<u>bouldercountryday.org</u>)

There are many types of camps: daytime, enrichment, sports, nature/outdoor, excursions — pick what fits your child and schedule

- The City of Boulder offers "general recreation camps" for kids ~5–14, with a mix of activities: arts & crafts, gym games, swimming, etc. (City of Boulder)
- There are also nature-focused camps like Thorne Nature Experience for kids ages ~5–11 that emphasize outdoor exploration, natural science, outdoor skills and get kids outside in parks and open spaces. (Thorne Nature Experience)
- Some camps offer "full summer" registration, while others offer flexible "week-by-week" or "day-camp" scheduling — which can help parents trying to mix work + summer childcare. (<u>Active Kids</u>)

IIII What you should plan and watch out for

- Set reminders Once registration windows open (often mid-Feb or early March for many programs), have your calendar ready and login credentials set so you don't miss the opening.
- Prepare paperwork ahead You'll need to upload health forms, immunization records, emergency contacts, pick-up authorization, etc. Make sure your child's immunizations are up to date.
- **Know your backup plans** Because camps fill fast, think of alternate camps / weeks to sign up for. If a camp offers wait-lists, get on them.
- Check financial-aid availability early If cost is a factor, apply for subsidies / aid early (or when application windows open), as funds might be limited.
- Read drop-off/pick-up & safety policies Many camps require daily sign-in/sign-out, and some charge late-pickup fees if you're not on time.
- Check refund / cancellation policies Camps often require deposit + full payment by a deadline, and may not offer refunds if canceled after a certain date.

@ Good to check but often overlooked

- Residency vs non-resident pricing: If you live in Boulder city you may get a
 resident rate; non-residents (or those outside "city limits") often pay more. (<u>City of Boulder</u>)
- Sibling / family discounts or extra fees: Some camps offer sibling discounts or different pricing for additional children; verify cost if you have more than one child attending.
- Transportation or shuttle availability: For outdoor or nature camps, sometimes shuttle
 or transportation may be offered only if enough kids sign up. (<u>Wild Bear Nature Center -</u>
 <u>We Are Nature</u>)
- Special needs / medical care accommodations: If your child needs medication, special care, or accommodations, make sure you complete and submit all required paperwork — including medical plans, allergy action plans, etc. (<u>City of Boulder</u>)

Here's a "starter list" of 8–10 summer camps in or near Boulder County for elementary-age kids (roughly ages 5–12), including a variety of themes (nature, arts, STEAM, general day camp). I include what I know now about ages, structure, registration timing, and notable features. Because 2026 info is still rolling out, double-check each camp's website for updated dates/prices when registration opens.

What to Check / Watch Out For (for These Picks)

- **Registration windows**: For example, Thorne opens registration in **January** for the coming summer. <u>Thorne Nature Experience</u>
- Paperwork required: Many camps (especially city-run or multi-camp providers) require immunization, health, emergency contact forms, often via online systems like ePACT.
 <u>City of Boulder+1</u>
- Flexibility vs rigid schedules: Some camps (like Steve & Kate's) offer flexible "day-pass / drop-in" plans — nice if your summer schedule fluctuates. <u>Steve & Kate's</u> <u>Camp+1</u>
- Camp type matters: If your child loves outdoors Thorne, Bear Creek, ABC Climbing, Avid4 or climbing-type camps might suit. If they prefer art/STEAM — Tinker Art Studio or Camp Galileo may be a better fit.
- Cost & extras vary: Some include meals/snacks & extended hours (e.g. Steve & Kate's), others may have additional materials fees (e.g. certain weeks at Camp Galileo).
