Guiding Questions

Unlike previous segments the podcast will not help with answering these questions. It is an interesting conversation with Nikil Saval in 2020 the day after being elected. The readings are worth diving into.

- Why do Saval or Battistoni find it important to push through work they are dreading?
 - What motivation do you rely on to overcome a dreaded task?
- Why is Alyssa Battistoni dissatisfied with people joining the union but not organizing?
- Why doesn't Nikil Saval like the 'story of the self'?
 - Why might it still be important anyway?
- Both Battistoni and Saval have to learn how to lean into uncomfortable conversations. As Battistoni puts it "Often, however, you have to learn to speak differently—to speak as a different version of yourself."
 - How do the different campaigns shape the way the authors end up adapting?
- What does it mean for organizers to be accountable to each other?
 - o In what ways does it help?
 - o In what ways could it hurt a campaign?

- These essays cover campaigns that lost in 2016, but both contain seeds of later victories. In 2020 Nikil Saval was elected a state senator in Pennsylvania, and in 2023 graduate workers at Yale won union recognition in a NLRB election with 1,860 voting in favor and 179 voting against.
 - What lessons can we draw from the ebb and flow of victories and losses?
 - What is required to persevere through a loss?
 - What are the dangers of always promising victory?
