SOC 205 Week 6: Overview

This week we are looking at society's institutions that provide health and safety: healthcare, social services and government. We will look at how these systems, including the criminal justice system and incarceration system, can provide health and safety and how they can create and sustain systems of oppression, inequity and injustice.
