We are also going to ask a bit more of ALL LOCAL Writers this year. As many published writers are aware, Book Reviews are extremely important to online sales. Amazon does not allow associates of the Author to publish reviews due to past bad acts by a few "mean," defamatory players. This prevents our closest fans and readers from posting reviews.

Each month I plan to mention two to five published books by local authors and I want YOU to write book reviews for the mentioned books. Most will be on Kindle Unlimited and cost \$2.99 or less if they are not. IF you felt the book did not deserve a rating of 4 or 5 stars, please don't review the book on Amazon. Reviews posted with 3 stars or less are considered negative by the algorithms. You may message me with a poor review and I will pass it on to the author so they can revise if possible. I have contacts with over 500 Florida writers. If only 20% of you write a short review and post on Amazon, that is 100 reviews. Most of us struggle to get our readers to write reviews; let's BE the Reviewers. We can do this together. Any questions? Contact me @ DGOULD497@gmail.com.

AI can raise revenues for authors and publishers. It is easy to generate movies from novels and a movie version could be offered to readers on a subscription basis. Novels could be expanded with new materials so instead of just selling books, publishers and authors could have recurring incomes by offering annual updates.

The cost of paper books will increase whenever they include full-color AI-generated illustrations. Selling e-books for full color readers will be the new standard.

In the process, he solves the murder of the "Coquettes on 24<sup>th</sup> Street" while grappling with the gambling and booze mobs that invaded the Gulf Coast, the "Red Scares" in Tampa and the Ku Klux Klan. He also reclaims Clarinda, his wife, who had found that Sarasota had become, quite frankly, "too bourgeois."

#### The Florida Book Awards

The Florida Book Awards, established in 2006, is an annual awards program that recognizes, honors, and celebrates the literature by Florida authors and books about Florida published in the previous year.

Authors must be Florida residents, except in the Florida nonfiction, cooking, and visual arts categories, where the subject matter must focus on Florida.

The awards program is coordinated by the Florida State University Libraries, with the involvement of other library, literary, and cultural organizations, including the State Library and Archives of Florida, Florida Library Association, Florida Humanities, Florida Center for the Book, Midtown Reader, and the Word of South festival.

The call for submissions of eligible books is announced in the summer and concludes in early January. By early March, medalists will be announced in each of the 11 categories. Traditionally, awards are presented to all award winners at a banquet in Tallahassee in April.

Florida Book Award-winning books are on permanent display in the library at the Governor's Mansion in Tallahassee, and in an exhibit case on the third floor of Florida State University's Strozier Library.

There are two more Awards groups I wish to share with you. Many of the writing contests online and in magazines are shams, a way for the host to make a lot of money with little output. I try to ensure the contests I share are not shams. The best way to tell the difference is: Has anyone ever heard of it? Is it respected in your genre? What organizations are they affiliated with?

Two large contests that are a bit pricey and have overwhelming competition are Writer's Digest Contests and the IPPY's. I personally know a few winners from Writer's Digest and the awards are great promotional tools, because they are Respected as rofessionals and Internationally known.

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## Writing Tips

No matter how many times we learn about these pesky three-letter words, it always slips my mind when I need it. So for those who still lay on the floor or lie their head on the pillow...

#### Word Choices: Lay vs. Lie

Imagine your friends are over for a movie night, and they've brought a tray of brownies to share. You take the platter from them — but do you tell them you're going to "lie" it down or "lay" it down? And will you all "lie" down to watch the movie, or "lay" down? It's an age-old question: What is the actual difference between "lay" and "lie"? When *do* you use one over the other?

#### Why are "lay" and "lie" confusing?

To clarify: We're not talking about the kind of lie you might tell when you call out of work or don't finish your homework on time. We're talking only about the setting/reclining meaning of the verb.

"Lay" and "lie" are often confused because both words are about people or objects positioned horizontally on a surface. But they are used to refer to different scenarios.

It can be quite simple — if you're in the present tense. The past tense is when things really get confusing, since the past tense of "lie" is "lay" (sorry). But don't worry, we'll give you a few easy tips to help you along.

#### When to use "lay" vs. "lie"

"Lay" is a transitive verb. Transitive means that you have an object that is being acted upon. So "lay" means to set down or place something — an object — in a horizontal position. Here's an example in the present tense: "I *lay* the book on the nightstand." In this instance, the book is the object that is having something done to it.

"Lie" is an intransitive verb, meaning the object doesn't need something else to put it down. Instead, the person or subject is doing the action. "Lie" means to stay at rest in a horizontal position, or to recline. An example of "lie" in present tense would be, "I feel the wind as I *lie* in my backyard on the grass." In this example, the person is performing the action rather than having the action done to them.

So, in the present tense, the simplest way to determine which word to use is by looking at what is actually being reclined. If the reclining object is inanimate and/or requires someone to put it down, use "lay." If the object is self-sufficient, such as a person, use "lie." Quick memory tip: Only a person can lie on a bed and tell a lie.

#### "Lay" and "lie" in other tenses

Here's a chart to help you understand how the two are used in different tenses.

verb	present tense	past tense	past participle	present participle
lay	lay	laid	laid	laying
lie	lie	lay	lain	lying

Let's tackle the past tense of each, since that's where there's the most opportunity to pick the wrong word.

#### I \_\_\_\_ my clothes out last night before I went to bed.

Which one is it — "lay" or "lie"? Here's how to tell: Is something happening *to* an object? Yep! The clothes are being set out. That tells us that we need the verb "lay," past tense "laid."

#### I laid my clothes out last night before I went to bed.

Now, what about the past tense of "lie"?

## I heard a noise coming from the basement as I \_\_\_\_\_ on the sofa watching a horror movie.

In this example, there is not a specific action being performed upon an object. Rather, the speaker (the subject) is doing the action. This means we need the past tense of "lie," which (confusingly) is "lay."

I heard a noise coming from the basement as I *lay* on the sofa watching a horror movie.

My Second Writing Tip this month helps you determine the reading level needed to read your books. This is ESPECIALLY helpful with Children's & Young Adult books. However, if you are writing genre fiction, keep in mind that the average comprehension level is Eighth Grade.

#### **How Do You Measure Readability?**

When writing, you want to make sure your writing is readable, or easily understood, clear and legible for targeted readers. But how do you measure that? Sure, you could read a few sentences and say, "It seems readable to me, I guess," but there are actually tools out there you can use to put a number to the readability of your writing.

My tool of preference is in Microsoft Word. The major readability statistics are Flesch Reading Ease and Flesch-Kincaid Grade Level. For the Flesch Reading Ease and Flesch-Kincaid Grade Level statistics to come up in the "Spelling & Grammar" review of your content you will need to enable those statistics. To do this select "File" then "Options" next go to the "Proofing" tab and check the box that says "Show readability statistics."

Flesch-Kincaid scores are readability tests designed to show how easy or difficult a text is to read. This score is given in two different ways. First is the "Flesch Reading Ease" and the other is "Flesch-Kincaid Grade Level".

The Reading Ease number is from 0 to 100. With a score of 90 to 100 your writing could be understood by an average 11-year old and a score of 60 to 70 could be understood by average 13 to 15-year olds. A score of zero to 30 means your writing could be understood by a university graduate. The higher the score the easier the writing is to read and comprehend.

To give you an idea of where some major publications fall in this range Reader's Digest has a Flesch Reading Ease around 65, Time magazine has a score of 52 and the Harvard Law Review falls somewhere in the low 30s.

The Flesch-Kincaid Grade Level applies a reading grade level to your writing. New York Times articles have a tenth-grade reading level and romance novels have about a fifth-grade reading level. A sixth-grade student could understand content with a Flesch Reading Ease of 60 to 70.

Now what? So you know how to measure readability, but how do you improve the readability scores of your writing? It ultimately comes down to

what you're writing about. Content about astrophysics is going to be more complex and have a higher reading level than some other subjects so always keep in mind the subject of your writing.

A great starting point is to ask, "Would someone new to this subject understand what I'm saying?" You need a balance with readability. You don't want to write your content too industry-specific, but you also do not want to write for a five-year old because then your writing might lack professionalism.

To improve Flesch-Kincaid scores, try getting your message across in as few words as possible. Sentences should err on the shorter side as well. When it comes to paragraph lengths, shorter is better here also. Shorter paragraphs make reading seem to go by more quickly and are less intimidating to readers. Our final tip is to pick out complex words and replace them with shorter, simpler synonyms.

So why does this all matter again? Making sure that your content is readable to your users is important when it comes to holding your reader's attention and making them want to read your material. When we write blog articles for SEO purposes, it is all about user experience. The better experience a user has on your site, the more it will help your website's performance in the search engines. By keeping your articles clear, concise and easy to follow you can ensure that readers will understand your products and services. So whether you are writing an article for your company blog or creating new content for your website readability is an important factor for Google. Great content is not considered great until it is read and understood!

For reference, this article has a reading ease score of 62.5 and a grade level of 8.7, which fits in with our recommendation. Try to keep your reading ease score between 30 and 60 and your grade level around eighth grade.
