Lower Delmarva Peninsula

Contextual history: An English Expedition landed in the region of Accomack (the Delmarva Peninsula) in 1603 and Captain John Smith visited again in 1608. At the time there were about 2,000 Accawmacke Indians living in the area. 1606

Northern Ireland

East Ulster Settlement Begins

Contextual history: James Hamilton and Hugh Montgomery, two rival Ayrshire Scots, fund the settlement of Antrim and Down on land formerly belonging to Con O'Neill. The two Scots offered cheap rent and had many takers among the Scottish lowlanders. The Scots found it hard going, however, and the Presbyterian settlers were <u>persecuted by the Anglican establishment</u>. http://www.ulstervirginia.com/eastulster1606.asp

If James Henderson came to Virginia via Ulster (which I doubt), it's unlikely his ancestors could have been in Ulster for more than one or two generations, since settlement of the earliest Ulster enterprise only began in 1606. Our Hendersons appear to have been in Virginia well prior to the first significant wave of Ulster Scot settlement in the American colonies. We currently have **no evidence** indicating that James Henderson was an Ulster Scot, other than his name appearing in this article. We have to consider the possibility that the author may simply have made assumptions based on Henderson's Scottish surname. Attempts to communicate with the author to ascertain on what evidence he classified James Henderson an Ulster Scot have not been successful.

I am currently pursuing circumstantial evidence that appears to point towards an origin in Perthshire. There is a group of Hendersons in 16th century Perthshire whose naming patterns and birth dates match those I speculatively expected to find. There is also a cluster of Y-DNA testers of the same terminal SNP around Perthshire. This SNP appears to have originated in the Netherlands. Many of the Scots who went to Ulster were from the Scottish borders and the west (which isn't to say that someone from Perthshire might not have come to America via Ulster, but again, I am finding absolutely nothing that would lead me to suspect an Ulster connection for our Eastern Shore Hendersons).

1607 May 14

Jamestown Settlement

Contextual history: Just a year after the East Ulster settlement got underway, The Virginia Company, a diverse association of royal favorites, entrepreneurs, speculators and adventurers founded the <u>first</u>

<u>permanent English colony in Virginia</u>. They arrived at the entrance to the Chesapeake Bay in late April and chose the site for the Jamestown settlement in May (primarily for its easy defensibility).

While James Henderson was not part of the original Jamestown settlement, on <u>1 Jul 1680</u> his son John would marry Elizabeth Barnaby, granddaughter of James and Sarah Barnaby of early Accomack Co VA. James (a comparatively wealthy planter in his own right) was the brother of <u>Richard Barnaby</u>, a prosperous London Merchant, and of <u>John Barnaby</u>, who arrived in Jamestown in 1620 and was a servant in Governor George Yeardley's house. <u>See Barnaby Family Chronology</u>.

1618

The headright system begins in Jamestown, VA

Contextual history: The headright system began in Virginia in 1618 as an attempt to solve labor shortages and attract new colonists. Colonists already living in Virginia were given two headrights of 50 acres. Immigrant colonists who paid their own passage were given one headright for themselves, and one headright for any individual whose passage they paid (including members of their own household). The cost of passage in the 17th century was about 6 pounds per person. A claimant could receive their headright even if their transportee or indentured person died in passage. The governor or local council had to certify the validity of an importation, and then the person could select the land they desired, and have a survey. The claimant would then take the survey to the colony's secretary who would create a patent to be approved by the governor. Once the patent was obtained, it could be bought, sold or traded. Over time, the secretary's office that issued headrights grew lax and people took advantage of the lack of governance (during the 1660's and 1670's the number of headrights was about four times more than the increase in population). Source: Wikipedia

It has been my observation that often two or three enterprising individuals would claim the same settlers as headrights, albeit at different times. Just because someone shows up as a headright on a patent does not necessarily mean they were being transported any further than across county lines. In fact it does not mean that they actually arrived in America alive or remotely close to the year they appeared as headrights, or that they actually ever settled on or near the patent that their headright certificates were used to claim. Ship's captains would often claim headrights for entire lists of passengers, whose indentures would then be sold and whose new masters would then claim them a second time for a second piece of property. In 1666 James Henderson transported several headrights in Accomack County (not necessarily into...simply within). In 1668 he would claim a headright patent in Maryland using his three children and new wife, Alice, whom he was "transporting" across the border from Virginia into Maryland. 1620

Colonists trading with Manokin Indians on Eastern Shore

Contextual history: Deposition of John Westlock of Somerset Co MD (age 90 in 1670) states that as early as the year 1620 white men were coming into the **Manokin River** to trade with the Indians whose town was located in an upper fork of that river (modern-day Stewart's Neck). Westlock was being called upon to identify the location of the "Trading Branch." Depositions by Somerset Co MD citizens German Gillet and Henry Hooper (also given in 1670) state that traders were coming from Rappahannock County VA to trade with the Indians on Manokin river in 1656.

This is important because it shows that the colonists regularly crossed the bay to do business. This west-to-east movement should be taken into consideration when speculating about the settlement patterns of the Eastern Shore. Thomas Savage (Jamestown 1619) was the <u>first settler on the Eastern Shore</u> and an ancestor of Mary Ann Savage, wife of **Gilbert Henderson**'s son, John.

Note that "Rappahannock County, Virginia" is likely present-day Essex County, Virginia (sometimes referred to as Old Rappahannock).

ca 1630-1640 Estimated date of birth of James Henderson Sr.

The Eastern Shore of Virginia had an unusually youthful population. If, in fact, 25 years of age is a reasonable historical estimate for approximating the age of Henderson at the baptism of his son John in 1661, it could be possible that the former was born sometime in the 1630's."

I have found birth records in Perthshire for Gilbert Hinderson b ca 28 Dec 1630, s/o John Hinderson and James Hinderson b ca 5 Oct 1632 s/o John Hinderson, however, there was more than one John Henderson in Perth in the early 1630's so I cannot be sure these two were brothers. Both men named their eldest sons John, which would support the theory that both men were sons of a John Henderson.

1630's

1634 Mar

First Maryland settlers land near Point Lookout on Chesapeake Bay

Contextual history: A 400 ton English merchant ship, the Ark, was hired by Cecilius Calvert to bring roughly 140 English colonists to the Province of Maryland. The *Ark* was accompanied by a pinnace called *Dove*, and the <u>settlement party, led by Leonard Calvert</u> (brother of Cecil Calvert, Lord Baltimore), consisted of 17 gentlemen and their wives, and about 200 others including indentured servants. The ships stopped briefly in Jamestown to resupply and consult with the Virginia colony. The colonists sailed up the Chesapeake Bay and and landed on St. Clement's Island before moving on to an Indian village they had purchased on the St. Mary's River. Their new settlement was called St. Mary's City. <u>Source: Wikipedia</u>

Henry Bishop Senior (possible grandfather of Sarah Bishop Henderson, w/o William Henderson Sr.) was an early settler of St. Mary's City and was the first elected burgess of Mattapanient Hundred in 1638. His name is found on the <u>passenger lists of the Ark & Dove</u>. See also <u>Bishop Family Chronology</u>.

*Note: there is some disagreement whether this Henry Bishop, servant to Jesuit priest Andrew White of St. Mary's City, was related to Lt. Henry Bishop of Somerset County MD, father of Sarah Bishop Henderson. Some researchers say this Henry Bishop died intestate and without issue, however, there appear to have been two Henry Bishops who died around the same time in Somerset County, and I am working under the assumption that one of the two was this elder Henry Bishop, and the other was Lt. Henry Bishop, father of Sarah Bishop Henderson.

1634

Accomack County, VA is formed

Accomack Shire VA is established as one of Virginia's original eight shires. The first American Contextual history: Sheriff, William Stone was appointed. http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Accomack County. Virginia

1635

Eastern Shore, VA

1642

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Northampton County, VA

Accomack Shire VA renamed to Northampton County VA

Contextual history: Accomack Shire (named for the chief of the local Accawmacke clans) is called Northampton County to eliminate "heathen" names in the New World. In 1663 Northampton was divided into two, and the northern portion of the county was renamed to its former name of Accomack). The population of the county in the 1640's was about 1,000. According to the website Delmarva Settlers, "Historian Jennings Cropper Wise writes 'when we come, therefore, to trace the origin of our Eastern Shore colonists, while we should not dogmatically state as a matter of fact that many of them came from New England, yet we should bear in mind the strong evidence that points in that direction. Wise also notes that the colonists of the Eastern Shore had strong Puritan sentiments, in some cases desired religious freedom, and were, in general, eager to take advantage of the region's rich natural resources."

I currently have no reason to believe **James Henderson Sr.** fell very into the category of those with strong Puritanical sentiments since he was called into court in 1663 for not attending church. This may have been on account of his having been a Presbyterian — although we have no evidence that he was. The agitation for a Presbyterian church that is evident among the Ulster Scots who would trickle in over the decades does not seem to have been a primary concern of Henderson. His reason for only sporadically making the trip to the southern end of the peninsula to the Anglican parish may have been something as simple as inconvenience (or an unwillingness to pay the required tithes). His property was far to the north of the county (and would later fall within Maryland's boundary) and the trip may have simply been onerous to undertake on a regular basis. On the other hand...maybe he was a Presbyterian. The thing it seems he was not, it seems safe to say, was a Quaker or a Catholic.

Historical Note: "Colonial Chesapeake historians tend to note significant migrations during the mid-seventeenth century, which brought many Eastern Shore Virginians to Maryland. One of these movements is characterized by an influx of Quakers to Somerset County. Historian Clayton Hall notes that 'under these conditions, the number of Quakers in Maryland had become so large that in 1661 stated meetings were established.'...Another major group that migrated to Somerset County around the same time as the Quakers were, in the words of historian Clayton Torrence, 'men who, though a liberal type in religious matters, yet conformed to the Church of England, having no other apparent reason for leaving the colony of Virginia than the economic one of greater opportunity afforded them by newly opened lands."" https://nabbhistory.salisbury.edu/settlers/profiles/henderson.html

1644

Eastern Shore, VA

1648

England

Contextual history: "After having been a prisoner for several years, King Charles I was beheaded January 30 in front of Whitehall Palace." Contextual history: "A 'great storm and tide' destroyed a large quantity of tobacco stored in various rolling houses." *Source: Seventeenth Century Virginia Hurricanes*

1649 April 21

Maryland Act of Toleration

Contextual history: Passed by the assembly of the Maryland colony in St. Mary's City, 21 April 1649, the Maryland Toleration Act required religious tolerance in the British North American colonies. It granted freedom of conscience to all *Christians* and allowed freedom of worship for all Trinitarian Christians in Maryland (but sentenced to death anyone who denied the divinity of Jesus). Revoked in 1654 by William Claiborne, reinstated by the Calverts, then permanently repealed in 1692 after the Glorious Revolution.

1652 Mar

Northampton Co VA

Contextual history: "116 people of Northampton County signed the following pledge: "Wee whose Names are subscribed; doe hereby Engage and promise to bee true and faithful to the Commonwealth of England as it is nowe Established without King or House of Lords." *Source: Truitt Family History: 1066 to 1995, Compiled by Dr. William E. Groves, Ph.D., Chapel Hill, NC, Last updated June 28, 2001*

The repercussions of the English civil wars and the religious struggles of the Old World were felt keenly in the New. Virginia tended to support the royalist cause, and at one point, a supply fleet refused to unload a cargo of convicts until/unless Virginia officials agreed to recognize the authority of the new Parliamentarian government.

1652

Colonial Virginia

Contextual History: In 1652, the year after the <u>Battle of Worcester</u>, the final of the English Civil War, headrights to Virginia peaked for the period of 1635-1660. Presumably many of those imported into the colony between the years of 1647-1657 were prisoners of war. Robin Henderson did a study of George Cabell Greear's Early Virginia Immigrants (1623-1666) and <u>plotted headrights on this graph</u>.

1652

Northampton Co VA

Estimated date of arrival for **JAMES HENDERSON** Sr. (later of Somerset Co MD).

Robin's research indicates an influx of about 1,000 Scottish prisoners of the English Civil War to Virginia during 1652. He has concluded by various means that James was very likely a bondsman to Anthony Hoskins or Hodgkins of Northampton County VA. Hoskins also had headrights for a Mary Arundell and a Mary Hardwige (aka Harding or Hardin), who may have been the Mary that James was married to when he baptized his eldest son John at Hungar's Parish in Northampton County VA in 1661.

1652 May 10

Northampton Co VA

GILBERT HENDERSON is a headright for Thomas Johnson Jr. who patented 450a in Northampton Co VA on Pongoteague Creek.

This is the first record we have of a Henderson on the Eastern Shore. Robin Henderson speculates that Gilbert, and possibly also James, arrived with a contingent of Scottish POW's which had recently shipped to the colonies. Although headright patents

sometimes lagged importation by as much as 10 years (see para 3 below), I do not think that this was the case for Gilbert if Robin's theory is correct.

The Thomas Johnson patent was only a few miles north of the patents for James Barnaby and Henry Bishop on Occahannock Creek. **Gilbert Henderson** would later patent land on the Makepungo River beside Henry Bishop. Gilbert's son, John, would marry Mary Ann Savage, whose maternal grandfather William Jordan, purchased the land that Roger Johns had bequeathed to James Barnaby in 1652. Mary Ann's paternal grandfather, Richard Savage, was among the original 1640 headrights of John Holloway along with James and Sarah Barnaby.

I thought this comment from an article on Bob's Genealogy Filing Cabinet was applicable here and have copied it over: "My own analysis of all 17th century headright certificates in the records of Surry and Lower Norfolk counties shows that patent dates lagged headright certificates by about 5-6 five years, on average, but it was not uncommon for some to be used several decades later. And, of course, the certificate itself was typically granted years after the actual arrival, so that the lag between importation and patent averaged perhaps as much as ten years in all."

1654

Northampton Co VA

Contextual history: "All over the settled portion of Virginia at this time, great herds of cattle roamed almost at will and were at times hunted and shot as if wild animals. So wide and unrestricted was the range of the cattle in the marshes of the Eastern Shore that much trouble resulted to the owners, as only branded stock could be accurately identified. Not only cattle and horses roved over the peninsula, but also droves of hogs, which had become practically wild, were to be found feeding upon fish, crabs, and mollusca of the salt creeks." 1657

Northampton Co VA

Nicholas Waddelow assigns his 400a patent of Gabriell's Island (later <u>Watts Island</u>) to Robert King, John Watts, <u>GILBERT HENDERSON</u> and Robert Blake. Blake would deed his quarter of the property back to Waddelow's widow, Amy. In 1662, after several intervening assignments, the property would end up with Walter Taylor. <u>Source: Easternshoreheritage.com</u>

If Gilbert did arrive as a POW in 1651/52, he would likely have finished his term of service by 1657 and would have been operating as a free citizen. Gabriell's Island may have been a speculation or investment.

1657 Jan

Northampton Co VA

Contextual history: "The first road order was entered for the construction of roads on the Eastern Shore, like wharves, to be paid for at private expense." 1660 May 8

England

Contextual history: Charles II proclaimed King.

1660 through 1880

Virginia

Contextual history: The tobacco market is hit with a 20-year depression, causing a rise in the number of debt cases that come before the courts.

1660 Mar 25

GILBERT "HINDERS" (Henderson) married Mary Major in Hungars Parish, Northampton Co VA.

Mary Major was the daughter of William Major Sr. and Mary (possibly Dolby).

1660 May 12

Hungars Parish, Northampton Co VA

Allied line: <u>LYT. HENRY BISHOP</u> marries Anne (Smith?) Bowen. Henry and Ann Bishop were probably parents of <u>SARAH BISHOP</u> who married <u>WILLIAM HENDERSON SENIOR</u> (s/o James and Mary Henderson of Hungars Parish). <u>Source: Hungars Parish Register</u>

Ann (Smith?), the widow Bowen, had three children with first husband William Bowen: William Jr., David and Mary. Mary Bowen would marry her step-brother, John Bishop, son of Lt. Henry Bishop. This resulted in Sarah Bishop Henderson being a half sibling to

John Bishop as well as a half sibling to his wife Mary Bowen. Sarah was therefore an aunt to the Bowen-Bishop children on both the maternal and paternal sides.

1660 July 31

Virginia

Contextual history: Sir William Berkeley proclaimed governor by Charles II; colony is no longer governed by an independent assembly.

1660 Mar 25

GILBERT "HINDERS" (Henderson) married Mary Major in Hungars Parish, Northampton Co VA.

1661 Apr 2

Hungars Parish, Northampton Co VA

Baptism of **BRIDGET HENDERSON**, "ye daughter of Gilbert and Mary Henderson, April 2nd." Source:

The relationship between James Henderson and Gilbert Henderson, if any, is currently unproven. Circumstantial evidence leads me and Robin Henderson to speculate that they were brothers, and that there was possibly a third brother, a mariner named Robert who did not settle on the Eastern Shore. Gilbert's grandson, also named Robert Henderson, moved to Nanticoke Hundred of Somerset Co MD in 1727, and seems to have had some relationship with mariners James and Charles Henderson (grandsons of James Henderson Sr.). I am therefore watchful for a family relationship between James and Gilbert. Additionally, both men named their eldest sons John, so if they were following common traditional naming practices, the father of both men would have been called John, which could also indicate that they were brothers. See my earlier comments regarding a cluster of Hendersons in Perthshire whose names and birthdates could be in alignment with those we'd expect to find for Gilbert, James and possibly Robert.

1661 May 12

Hungars Parish, Northampton Co VA

Baptism of John Henderson s/o James & Mary Henderson

"One of the first historical references relating to <u>JAMES HENDERSON</u> is a church account taken sometime between March 25, 1661 and March 25, 1662 - a year before the *[counties were]* divided. The account, administered by Northampton County Hungars Parish officials, indicates the baptism of John Henderson: "<u>JOHN HENDERSON</u>, ye sonne of James and Mary Henderson, [baptized] May 12th [1661]." A true account of such persons as have bin borne, Baptized, Married and buried in Hungars Parish from ye 25th of March 1661 to ye 25th of March Anno 1662. http://genealogytrails.com/vir/northampton/church_hungarsparish_records_1660_1661.html

This is currently the earliest record we have for **James Henderson Sr.** who would become the progenitor of our line of Hendersons of the Eastern Shore, Onslow County NC and Chatham Co NC. It is the only known record of **Mary**, his first wife and also probable mother of children William and Jane. While we speculate that James was an immigrant, possibly from Scotland, we have not yet proved that. All we know for sure is that James immigrated to Virginia sometime prior to 1661. If he and Gilbert were transported closer to 1650, then it seems likely that James met Mary in Virginia. Like Gilbert's wife, Mary Major, James's Mary may have been a native Virginian. However, it is equally possibly that she too was an immigrant. She is a complete mystery, and she would die just a few short years later during a time when Virginia's Eastern Shore was devastated by a severe hurricane and a smallpox epidemic (although we do not know if either were responsible for her death).

1662 Jan 7 Accomack Co VA <u>JAMES HENDERSON</u> summoned for failure to pay tithes

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"Henderson, along with twenty-two of his male contemporaries, was summoned by the sheriff of Accomack County for not attending church. Churchwardens had initially called attention to the absentees, but based on primary sources, no real punishment was meted out against Henderson or the other men for their delinquency." [per illiari article]. Text of summons: "[It is ordered] by this Court that the now Churchwardens [shall have power] to distrayne upon the goodes and Chattells of [all such of the] inhabitants of Achawmack that have not paid their duties of Corne and tobacco onto the minister according to [an] Act made by the last Generall Grand Assembly [dated] the 4th of September 1632 And that the [said Church] wardens deteyne the said goodes and Chattels until satisfaction be made according to the tennor [and int]ent of the said Act." [Order Book One, Page 1, January 7, 1632] List includes: Francis Benstone, Wm. Benstone, Wm. Bouchter, Mr. Devorax Browne, Jno. Cary, Japhat Cooke, Wm. Dine, John Dye, Henry Eldridge, Wm. This is a curious entry. When I first became aware of James having been fined for "not attending church" it seemed to imply that he might have been among some of Accomack's religious dissenters (whether Quaker, Congregationalist or Presbyterian). Most of the Quaker element were preparing to depart for the Annemessex settlement across the Maryland border (if they had not already departed). After finding the text of the summons, it seems like the underlying issue that the establishment found problematic was not dissent, but failure to pay tithes. The interesting thing about this entry is that many of the men cited were prominent in the county and more than well able to pay the required tithes and avoid the harassment of the court and the parish, so it's a mystery why they didn't. We see Gilbert's kinsman John Major on the list, as well as John Watts, his partner in the Gabriell's Island land assignment (although there were three John Watts in early Accomack, so we cannot be sure this is the same).

In March of 1662 Walter Taylour patented 400a on Gabriell's Island (now <u>Watts Island</u>) "environed on all sides with the bayes of the Chesepiake." The Island had been patented originally in October 1652 by Nicholas Wadilow and (in 1657) by him assigned to Robert King, Jno. Watts, <u>GILBERT HENDERSON</u> and Robert Blake. In early October an Accomack Co militia of about 40 men (led by Col Edmund Scarborough) arrived at Annemessex and attempted to secure oaths of allegiance under threat of arrest and property confiscation.

"JAMES HENDERSON brought a man named John King to court in order to settle a debt. It is unclear what this debt specifically referred to, but apparently West and Browne knew the circumstances of the suit enough to be intimately involved with settling the matter." Not clear whether this is John King a free black, or another John King. Could this person be connected with the Robert King who was a partner in Gilbert Henderson's Gabriell's Island venture? John West and Deverax Browne were, along with James Henderson, among those who were fined for failure to pay tithes in January 1662. West and Brown were both sitting justices in 1663.

Mariner Robert Henderson is owed a debt by Edward (or David) Revell

"ROBERT HINDERSON, mariner, assigned power of attorney to his good friend George Watson to sue David Revell for 1500 lbs tobacco. Signed December 1663 by Robert Hinderson. Recorded 18 January 1663/64, by Robt. Hutchinson (p52b). It appeared to the court that Edward Revell owed Robert Henderson by contract 1500 lbs tobacco. We do not currently know whether there was any connection between this Robert Henderson, mariner, and James Henderson of Accomack (or Gilbert). The 1666 Accomack Co VA tax lists shows James Henderson was living between Robert Watson and Edward Revell. George Watson was noted among other "distinguished lawyers of the seventeenth century" in Jennings C. Wise's Ye Kingdome of Accawmacke.

Henry Bishop property shares borders with Dorothy Jordan and John Savage

Allied line: "Cornelius Watkinson, 450a Accomack Co: Bet. the lands of Occahannock & Machepungo, bounded by trees of Dorothy Jordan, Arthur Upshoot, Jno. Salvadge (Savage), Jno. Stirgies (Sturgess), Edward Smith & **HENRY BISHOP.**" Source: Cavaliers & Pioneers by Nugent

Gilbert Henderson's son John would marry Mary Ann Savage, whose mother and grandmother were both named Dorothy Jordan and whose father was John Savage, both mentioned in this land record. Clearly, from this record, the Jordans, Savages, and Bishops were neighbors. Within a month they would be joined by new neighbor **Gilbert Henderson**. After Gilbert and his wife Mary had both died (by 1667) their son John was put into the care of neighbor Edmond Joynes, which resulted in John growing up near Mary Ann Savage. (I suspect that Mary Major Henderson married second to Edmond Joynes, as the Hendersons and Joynes would continue to interact, and one child was named Major Joynes.)

Lt. Henry Bishop, neighbor to Gilbert Henderson, is believed to be the father or grandfather of Sarah Bishop who married William Henderson Sr. (s/o James Sr and Mary Henderson) in Somerset Co MD on 10 Aug 1684. Bishop would move to Somerset Co MD within a few years, and Gilbert Henderson had died prior to 1677 so I don't know how long the two men were adjacent.

The modern name of the Makepungo River is Matchipong.

A women named Jean Powell testified; 'JAMES HENDERSON said that since Old John died in a tobacco house so remote and amongst hogs and after such and manner along, it was not fit he should be buried until a jury had passed on him."

The tithable lists of Accomack were said to have been recorded in the order of residence, so one can glean a sense of the neighbors by looking at the surrounding names. On the 1666 Accomack Co VA tax list we find "James Hinderson" living between Dermon Selevant and Edward Revell. This is significant because in 1663 a mariner named Robert Henderson had given power of attorney to George Watson (an Accomack attorney) to collect a debt from Edward Revell on his (Robt. Henderson's) behalf. Two doors down from Revell on the 1666 tax list was a "Mr. Fleming." There was a Robert Henderson in New Kent Co VA "before 1666" who shared a property line with a John Fleming. The New Kent Co Robert has previously been believed to have been connected with the larger group of Tidewater Hendersons (New Kent & Hanover), but now I'm not so sure. That Robert (of the Tidewater area) was believed to be the ancestor of the Hendersons of Hanover Co VA and later Granville Co NC, and very well may be, but now I'm wondering if he was connected with the Delmarva Hendersons instead of (or in addition to) the Tidewater group.

Edward Sacker (living a few doors down from James Henderson) married Frances Stokely, daughter of Francis and Joane Stokely of Accomack. I believe James Henderson's second wife, Alice, was the Alice Stewkly he transported into Accomack in April of 1666. She may have been related to the Accomack Stokelys. The Stokelys of Accomack would ally with the Bishops when Elizabeth (d/o Woodman Stokely) married George Bishop Sr.

Hurricane hits St. Christopher, Nevis, Virginia and Outer Banks

Contextual History: "Hurricane made landfall just to the northeast of Jamestown, Virginia. The hurricane lasted 24 hours, bringing with it violent winds, heavy rains, and a 3.7 m (12 ft) storm surge. Approximately 10,000 houses were destroyed. The colonists' tobacco and corn crops were lost, their cattle drowned, and their ships were greatly damaged. Considered to be one of the most severe hurricanes to ever strike Virginia. Rain was reported to have fallen for twelve straight days after the storm." Contextual history: "The 'Dreadful Hurricane of 1667'...is considered one of the most severe hurricanes to ever strike Virginia. On the first, this same storm was reported in the Lesser Antilles. The hurricane devastated St. Christopher as no other storm had done before. The 'great storm' went on to strike the northern Outer Banks of North Carolina and southeastern Virginia. The wind turned from the northeast to due south and finally to the west, which suggested a track similar to the August 1933 hurricane, a benchmark storm for the Hampton Roads area in the 20th century (see page 33). This 1667 hurricane lasted about 24 hours and was accompanied by very violent winds and tides. Approximately 10,000 houses were blown over. Area crops (including corn and tobacco) were beat into the ground. Many cattle drowned in area rivers and bays by the twelve foot storm surge and 'many people had to flee.' The foundations of the fort at Point Comfort were swept into the river. A graveyard of the First Lynnhaven parish church tumbled into the waters. Twelve days of rain followed this storm across Virginia. This system is blamed for the widening of the Lynnhaven river. Ships in regional rivers sustained great damage. Several accounts attest to the fury of this great storm. The first was published in London from Strange News from Virginia. The tempest, for the time, was so furious, that it hath made a general desolation, overturning many plantations, so that there was nothing that could stand its fury. A letter from

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¹ From *Strange News from Virginia*: "Sir having this opportunity, I cannot but acquaint you with the relation of a very strange tempest which hath been in these parts (with us called a hurricane) which had began August 27th (September 6th Julian calendar) and continued with such violence, that it overturned many houses, burying in the ruines much goods and many people, beating to the ground such as were any wayes employed in the fields, blowing many cattle that were near the sea or rivers, into them., whereby unknown numbers have perished, to the great afflication of all people, few having escaped who have not suffered in their persons or estates, much corn was blown away, and great quantities of tobacco have been lost, to the great damage of many, and utter undoing of others. Neither did it end here, but the trees were torn up by the roots, and in many places whole woods blown down so that they cannot go from plantation to plantation. The sea (by the violence of the wind) swelled twelve feet above its usual height drowning the whole country before it, with many of the inhabitants, their cattle and goods, the rest being forced to save themselves in the mountains nearest adjoining, while they were forced to remain many days together in great want.

Secretary Thomas Ludwill to Lord Berkeley describes the "dreadful hurry cane" of September 6th and gives added information about the cyclone.² The storm passed inland northeast of Jamestown into northern Virginia. A severe storm in Manhattan on the 8th was most likely a continuation of this cyclone, as it recurved northeast. Another hurricane may have passed very close to the Virginia coastline on September 10th since the "dreadful hurricane of 1667" was accompanied by twelve days and nights of rain. A second storm passing close to the Virginia coast would have extended the period of rain." *Source: Seventeenth Century Virginia Hurricanes*

James Henderson, German Gillet and Charles Rackliff taken under custody

"In another Court Order dated December 1667, HENDERSON and two other men, German Gillet and Charles Rackliff, were taken under the custody of the Sheriff of Accomack to 'be kept in safety.' Apparently, authorities in Virginia representing the Majesty objected to HENDERSON and the others supporting a known criminal named Thomas Middleton. The records do not specify to what extent HENDERSON and the other men spoke favorably of him. Later, Henderson, Gillet, and Rackliff "confessed the truth and craved the court's mercy. The Court released them from further censure. They paid court costs and posted bonds for their good behavior."

² From a letter from Secretary Thomas Ludwill to Lord Berkeley: "Jamestown Colony - this poore country is now reduced to a very miserable condition by a continental course of misfortune. On the 27th of August followed the most dreadful Hurry Cane that ever the Colony (Jamestown) groaned under. It lasted 24 hours, began at North East and went around northerly till it came to west and so it came to Southeast where it ceased. It was accompanied with a most violent rain but no thunder. The night of it was the most dismal time I ever knew or heard of, for the wind and rain raised so confused a noise, mixed with the continued cracks of failing houses.....The waves were impetuously beaten against the shores and by that violence forced and as it were crowded into all creeks, rivers and bays to that prodigious height that it hazarded the drowning of many people who lived not in sight of the rivers, yet were then forced to climb to the top of their houses to keep themselves above water. The waves carried all the foundations of the Fort at Point Comfort into the river and most of furnished and garrison with it....but then morning came and the sun risen it would have comforted us after such a night, had it not lighted to us the ruins of our plantations, of which I think not one escaped. It is my opinion that Mary died in Virginia before 1668 and James remarried, probably also in Virginia, and moved his new wife and three children across the border to Maryland as headrights. His fourth child, James Jr. would be born in 1669 in Maryland.

Gargaphia was the plantation of Edmund Scarburgh's mistress, Ann Toft. Edward Revell was mentioned in a 1663 Accomack Co VA lawsuit when mariner Robert Henderson gave power of attorney to George Watson to collect a debt from Revell.

Mr. Westlack's testimony is of particular interest: "The deposicon of John Westlack aged ninety years or thereabouts taken in Cort: the Jury present ~ ~ ~ ~ Sworne Saith The tradeing pointe that I used with mr: Harman; one of them was by John Johnsons where wee used to Swimme the horsses and the other against my house at the pointe of the forke where I traded there fifty years agoe; when wee Came hether to Seate this Land, Capta: Thorne, Thomas Bloyes, JAMES HINDERSON and my Selfe, mr: Revell Shewed Thomas Bloys that pointe of Land which I live on and he did not like it, and then said if he woulld not have it Shewed him a poynte of Land against Richard Ackworth and Thomas Bloyes marked A tree by the water Side this being the first year mr: Revell came up to Seate; the great Creek runs betweene the two pointes; and further Saith not..." "Captain Thorne" is probably Captain William Thorne, County Commissioner of Somerset (married to Winifred). Captain Thorne was present in Somerset County in 1665, and registered his livestock marks in 1665-1666. Captain Thorne and Stephen Horsey were early leaders of Somerset. "Horsey sat as a regular member of the Somerset County Court through the winter and spring of 1666. He traveled across the Chesapeake Bay in 1665 with Captain Thorne to meet with Charles Calvert, who swore them in as county commissioners." (Wikipedia)

John Westlack and Thomas Bloyes also <u>registered livestock in Somerset 1665-1666</u>. John Marlett was a "son in law" to John Westlack, which might mean Marlett was married to Westlack's daughter, or it might mean Marlett was a stepson.

James Hinderson does not appear in the provincial court records until 1668. He may have still been residing across the border in Virginia.

Note: Robin Henderson has done extensive research into this Chincoteague patent and has concluded that the names of the headrights likely have little or no connection to the Whittington family, and were probably just a "cut and paste" job by the clerk who re-used names of headrights on multiple land patents. In other words, fraud.

Note: In 1677 a patent for 1,500a of this property was issued to Daniel Jenifer and the property was noted as "having been deserted by Whittington." In 1684 the property was patented to Thomas Clayton, as it had by that time been deserted by Jenifer. In 1691 a patent to the 1,500a was awarded jointly to William Kendall and John Robins, who later that year divided the island in two, each taking half. [Source]

Comment: There is one transcription in a publication at the Nabb Resource Center that lists James Henderson as "Rich'd Henderson" -- although we know of no contemporary Richard Henderson on the Eastern Shore during the period. It may have

simply been a transcription error. Notice that there is also a James Clark among the headrights. Although a common name, Clark is a name that shows up in connection with the Delaware and North Carolina branches of the Henderson family. For the most part, these names are unfamiliar to me despite extensive reading on the early inhabitants of the Eastern Shore. They almost seem made up, or at least purchased from other areas of the colony. -- Laura Henderson

The cause of these concerns was the speculative manipulation of the system.

This is an abstract of the original record, in which John is once erroneously called Gilbert. Edmond Joynes was a neighbor to the Hendersons since 1665 (on the former Westerhouse grant). Joynes may have been related in some way to Mary Major Henderson as he named second son "Major Joynes." The orphaned John was about 11 years old in 1677, and since there is no mention of

Bridgett (who would have been about sixteen), we can assume that she either died in childhood or possibly had already married. No other children are mentioned, and John Henderson is the only known surviving child of Gilbert and Mary Major Henderson.

Update 10/12/15: I begin to suspect that Edmond Joynes may have been Mary Major Henderson's second husband, meaning that Gilbert had probably died closer to 1664-1665 than 1677. Joynes had at least

A significant influx of Ulster Scots into Somerset County MD

While there was a trickle of immigration by Ulster Scots into Somerset County beginning as early as 1649, there was not a significant influx until the 1680's. Many of these immigrants came from Donegal and they were viewed with resentment by established settlers. In March of 1689 William Patton (Pattent) of Somerset complained of being called a "Scotch Irish dogg" by Matthew Scarborough, who not only verbally abused him, but struck him twice in the face. Edward Randolph of Virginia wrote to the Commissioners of Customs for James City County in June of 1692 and called Somerset County "...a place pestered with Scotch and Irish. About 200 families have within the two years arrived from Ireland and settled in [the] county besides some hundred of families there before..." The immigration did not last long since the conditions that had prompted the settlers to leave Ireland alleviated for a time in the early 1690's. By the time the next wave of Scots-Irish settlers hit the shores of the colonies, Pennsylvania was their destination of choice.

By ca 1705-1710 the land tract was "possessed by James Wilk." Little more than half of the Nanticoke Hundred eventually fell into Sussex Co DE. Robert Henderson (grandson of Gilbert) moved up from Accomack Co VA into Nanticoke Hundred in 1727.

George Truitt makes a complaint to the court against Richard Shockley for having, in November of 1687, fraudulently diverted one of Truitt's cows and its calf, which was grazing with the cattle of Aaron Bishop and Rowland Beevins back to his own home and "mismarked" the said cow to disguise its ownership, and then marked the calf as his own. The cow in question had returned of its own accord to Truitt, but had since died.. Truitt was suing for 1,600 lbs of tobacco. In response, Shockley's attorney asserted that the plaintiff "goes Cuningly & Craftily & brings in his own Suite the selfe same bisness and declares amongst

the rest after he saith the mismarking of the said Cow & which cow is since dead a coming of her own accord to the plantation as if the cow (of his) could Speake meere Nonsence neither doeth he = Mention noe time certains when mismarke nor time when he was a Coming to his plantacon." The defendent "desire satisfaction for unjust Molestacon." At this point a jury was impaneled, consisting of Samuell Collins, George Collins, William Leyton, Thomas Holbrook, Thomas Quillen, William Dencom?, Myles Grey, Walter Taylor, Wm: Allexander, **JAMES HENDERSON**, Richard Warren, and Gydian Tillman. The jury found for the plaintiff.

William Henderson's new property would make him neighbor to Lazarus Maddox, who in 1688 had bought 6a of the Barnaby's Lott property from John and Elizabeth Barnaby Henderson. The Willises (cousins on the Barnaby side) were also heirs and owners of a portion of Barnaby's Lott. In 1720 William would leave 96a of Barnaby's Lott to brother Joseph, who subsequently left it to sole heir Hannah Henderson (later Roach) when he died in 1723. William Turpin would purchase land from Barnaby Willis (William Henderson's cousin) and in 1755 he would leave that land to his son, Whitty Turpin. Whitty Turpin's daughter Sarah married into the Fountain family, and we will see the names Turpin, Maddox, Willis and Fountain associated with the Barnaby-Henderson line in a number of documents, particularly with those who owned land in the Manokin area. In 1760 James Henderson (William Henderson's brother, and son of John Sr and Elizabeth Barnaby Henderson) would sell 100a of the property to Nathaniel Whitaker, although it is not clear how or when James inherited the property, unless it is part of the "marsh swamp" referred to in his father's 1743 will.

Four years later William Henderson and Francis Lord would witness the will of Lazarus Maddox (with James Willis and Mercy Fontaine). William's 1721 will would mention godson Henry Lord and would be witnessed by Lazarus and Alexander Maddox. This leads me to believe that this is William Henderson, s/o John Jr and Elizabeth Barnaby Henderson (who also had connections with the Willis and Fontaine families).

To my son Edmond 100 A. being part of 300 A. purchased of Isaac Foxcroft. To wife [no name] use of still during her widowhood. To each of my daus. 10s. Son Edward extr. Witt: **Gilbert Henderson**, William 'X' Bell, William Betts." *The Miles Files* 15.0

This is Gilbert Henderson the Younger, grandson of the original Gilbert. Edmond Joynes raised John Henderson, father of Gilbert the Younger, after John was orphaned in 1677. Joynes (b ca 1640) would have been essentially the closest thing to a paternal grandfather that Gilbert the Younger would have known.

Update 10/12/15: I believe Edmund Joynes may have married Mary Major Henderson sometime between 1668-1677, and would therefore have been the step-father of John Henderson and the step-grandfather of Gilbert the Younger. Gilbert Henderson the Younger was married to Mary Green, sister of Ann Green Joynes (who had married Major [Mager] Joynes mentioned in Edmond's wil).

A Francis Newbold (who made his will in Sussex Co DE in 1777) is often cited as the same who (along with brother, John) inherited land from Thomas Newbold in Nanticoke Hundred ca 1712-1713. This does appear to be the same Francis Newbold who was living in the household of John Henderson in 1724, but the Francis Newbold who died in 1777 mentions wife Mary and sons John and Thomas C. Newbold (along with the widow of his dec'd son, Francis Jr.). This does not seem to dovetail with what we know about "our" Francis Newbold and his children with wife Comfort Henderson, but it is possible that Comfort died young, along with children William and Elizabeth, and that the widowed Francis (and surviving son John) remarried to Mary _____ and had Thomas C. and Francis Jr. This bears further investigation, but in the mean time, approach information online regarding Francis with caution and bearing in mind the possibility that researchers could be mixing men of that name. At any rate, it does appear that the Newbolds of Somerset County MD and Sussex County DE were a seagoing family. There were a number of mariners among them, including Francis. Brother John is found in early shipping records trading between DE/PA and the Caribbean, and grandson (?) Thomas traded with Antigua..

Mariner Charles Henderson is found in the household of Adam Spence on early Somerset County tax lists. Mercie Fountain and Edward Jones were connected with the Barnaby family. It is unclear whether the William Henderson mentioned here is William "the

Sawyer" Henderson, Sr. (the sawyer) or William "of Manokin" Henderson (son of John & Elizabeth Barnaby Henderson). William "the Cordwinder" Henderson Jr. was dec'd by January 1709, which left his father (the sawyer) and his cousin as the only two adult William Hendersons in Somerset in 1713. Robin speculates this record refers to William the Sawyer and that Whittington likely owed him for timber. Due to the number of names on the list that are known to be associated with the Henderson-Barnaby lineage, I am beginning to lean towards it being William "of Manokin" (son of John and Elizabeth Barnaby Henderson). Difficult to be certain, and can't read too much into a list of debts since there might be no connection whatsoever between the creditors.

Bishop Henderson will show up on Somerset Co MD census records annually beginning in 1723 when the census is first instituted. At present I believe he was a son of William Sr and Sarah Bishop Henderson and a grandson of James and Mary Henderson.

This is John Henderson, s/o Gilbert the elder. Ann Green Joynes was the sister of Mary Green Henderson, wife of Gilbert Henderson II (s/o John Henderson). Major Joynes was the son of Edmund G. Joynes and possibly Mary Major Henderson Joynes. I have found one record online written by a researcher who remembers reading that Major Joynes died by drowning, after jumping into the water to retrieve his hat. Major and Ann Green Joynes had two known daughters, Elizabeth and Ann.

this property to David Wilson. In 1747 the couple sold Wilson the remainder of Hannah's 96a, and thus, Barnaby's Lott had passed out of the Henderson-Barnaby family by 1747.

Curiously, although William of Manokin was apparently married to Elisabeth, widow of Henry Bishop Jr., at the time of his death (and I believe he was the father of the William Henderson apprenticed to shoemaker William McClemmy in 1728 by a widow Elizabeth Henderson), neither Elisabeth nor any children were mentioned in his February 1722 will. A "father-in-law" is mentioned, but not by name. A puzzling circumstance.

This couple is of interest because James "Isaac" Henderson'(b ca 1705-1715) had a daughter, Elizabeth, who married William Jenkins in Onslow County. The latter couple had a son named Benjamin. Do not know if there was any connection, but need to flag the Jenkins surname as a possible connection.

The <u>details in this abstract</u> confirm my suspicion that the William Henderson mentioned earlier (1712, 1713, 1716) in conjunction with the names Maddox, Lord, Willis and Fontaine is the same William who made this will. Daniel Young, the orphan lad, can be <u>found on tax lists</u> living in the household of William's father (not father-in-law), John Henderson Sr. from 1727-1729, and afterwards living the Hendersons (he may have married into the Henderson family).

In November of 1728 an "Elizabeth Henderson, widow" would bind son William Henderson to William McClemmy (of Manokin) until the age of 21 to learn the trade of a shoemaker. It's probable that this Elizabeth Henderson was the widow of William of Manokin (s/o John) Henderson who d ca Feb 1722 (above record). William's will does not mention a wife or any children, but it did mention a father-in-law twice (omitting his name). Possibly William's wife was with child when he died and he was unaware? Less likely, but also a possibility is that Elizabeth might have been the widow of William "the Sawyer" Henderson Senior (s/o James Sr.). This seems very unlikely. We know that one of the two William Hendersons who were living in Somerset Co MD in 1709 (William Senior and William of Manokin) married Elisabeth, widow of Henry Bishop (d bef Nov 1709, s/o John Bishop), but we cannot be 100% sure which. The elder William was quite a bit older than the widow, and we have no reason to believe he was not still married to Sarah Bishop Henderson, while William of Manokin was of the correct age for the young widow. There are other clues that point to William of Manokin as the second husband of Elisabeth, the widow Bishop, but I find it puzzling that neither she, nor a namesake child are mentioned in this will.

Elizabeth's father, John Senior, first sent his son Joseph to Doctor Feillet in August of 1722 to fetch medicines "to wash [Elizabeth's] throat and other sores." The doctor paid his first house call in September and continued sending remedies through the 9th of February 1723. He noted visits on the 15th of September, the 21st of October, the 31st of October, the 4th of December, the 18th of December, the 7th of February, and the 9th of February, always with remarks about treating "sores of the patient's throat." In March of 1723 Feillet sued Henderson for non-payment of the medical bills. Elizabeth was mentioned in her brother William's will in 1721 but was not mentioned in her father's 1743 will. The Doctor's remedies were apparently not particularly efficacious.

Not sure if the original debt was to John Williams III (Francis's cousin) or to a man named John Williamson. Francis and Lambden would be involved in another dispute over a 4yo servant boy, William Stevens. Henderson accused Lambden of unlawfully detaining and mistreating the boy, and Lambden appears to have been claims of his own against Francis (unrecorded). The court decided to give the boy to William Booth. In 1734 John Dennis Jr sued William Booth for a debt of 2,331.5 lbs of tobacco, and accused Booth of being "runaway & is about to remove his estate in order to defraud his Creditors."

Feillet alleged that on "10 Feb 1722" Henderson became indebted to him in the amount of £10.8.8 current money of Maryland for sundry medicines and ungents. He complained that he "did Reasonably deserve" the payment and that "the said John his severall promisses and assumptions afd in the form afd made Little regarding, but plotting and fraudulently intending the said Jurors in that part Craftilly and Subtilly to deceive and defraud the said severall sumes of Money to the said James as yett he hat not paid or to him for the same in any wise Contented." Feillet produced a receipt for "Sending unto John Henderson by his Son Joseph at his request the following Medicines for ye Use of Elizabeth his daughter with advices & directions." Henderson answered by his attorney, Levin Gale, and requested a continuance. When the case resumed **Henderson** stated that he had not "assumed upon himself" the doctor's charges. A jury was sworn (including Elizabeth's cousin, Isaac Williams) and they found for the defendant. It was decreed that Doctor Feillet "take Nothing by his writt afd and decln afd but be in mercy for his falce Clamour & that the said John Henderson goe thereof without day...and recover against the said James Feillet the sum of thirteen hundred pounds of tobacco here adjudged unto him for his Costs and Charges by him about his defence..." Witnesses for Feillet included Isaac and Sarah Wheeler. Witnesses for Henderson included Catherine Dorman and ALICE HENDERSON. I'm not sure who Alice Henderson is. It could be a very elderly Alice (Stewkly?) Henderson, second wife of James Henderson Senior. Alternatively, and much more likely, it could be John's **daughter-in-law**, the wife of his son James Henderson the younger of Pocomoke Hundred. (Some sources give James's wife's surname as "Kollock," but I believe that to be in error. Alice Kollock of Sussex Co DE married a <u>John</u> Henderson in the town of Lewes on 24 Jan 1763. <u>See notes.</u>)

This record calls John Henderson Senior "late of Coventry Parish in Somerset County" -- did John move? Did the parish boundaries move?

There is no reason to think Francis was the father of the child of Ann Whely. As the case continued, Francis's bond was released and Daniell Cowdery gave security for her appearance in subsequent sessions of court so that she would not have to remain in the custody of sheriff Joseph McClester.

Barnaby Willis was Joseph's first cousin once removed. He was the grandson of Rebecca Barnaby and James Willis.

In 1755 Barnaby Willis, William Fountain and John Waters would witness the will of William Turpin, who named the late William McClemmy as the father of his grandchildren. (One online source says that William McClemmy m Sarah Waters but Miles Files says Sarah Waters married Whitty McClemmy.) There were extensive familial connections between the Hendersons, Bishops and McClemmys both in Maryland and in North Carolina. In November of 1728 an "Elizabeth Henderson, widow" would bind son William Henderson to William McClemmy to learn the trade of a shoemaker, but this is not the same Elizabeth Henderson widowed by Joseph here in 1723. Joseph Henderson's widow would be Mrs. Solomon Tull by 1726, and later records make it very clear that Hannah Henderson (m Nathaniel Roach) was the sole heir of Joseph Henderson, so Joseph had no son named William.

Hannah Henderson, daughter of Joseph, was born bet 21 Feb 1720/21 and 11 Jul 1723. When her dec'd uncle William Henderson (bro/o of Joseph) made his will in Feb 1720/21, Joseph did not yet have heirs, but in Joseph's will in 1723 she is mentioned as a minor. She would have been no more than a toddler at the time of her father's death. I had wondered if she might be the "friend Hannah Henderson of Philadelphia" mentioned in John Murray's 1736 will, but by Apr 1738 she was the wife of Nathaniel Roach, (probably of Annamessex Hundred) so it seems unlikely.

I believe that John Henderson actually wrote his will in August of 1743, not 1723. There are several reasons I believe the 1723 date to be a transcription error. First, the will states that John Henderson was "of Worcester County" but Worcester was not created until 1742. Second, his will clearly refers to both his brother James and his son John in the past tense. Both men were alive, present and accounted for on the Somerset County tax lists during the 1720's (James probably died sometime after the tax rolls were recorded in 1727 because he no longer appears on the lists after that year).

I'm not certain at this point if this is James Henderson Junior (son the original James and his second wife Alice); or if it is James Henderson the younger, son of John & Elizabeth Barnaby Henderson (b ca 1685 d bef 1776). Due to the designation "planter" and the location of Coventry Parish, it seems much less likely to be Mariner James Henderson (later of Onslow Co NC), who was living in the Mattapany Hundred household of Bishop Henderson in 1724. Since Francis Henderson is standing as security for James, my guess would be that it is his (Francis's) father, James Henderson Junior rather than his cousin, however, if John Henderson Senior's 1723 will is correctly dated, James Henderson Junior is referred to in the past tense in that document.

Of interest is the fact that Francis Newbold is in the household of John Henderson. Presumably by 1725, Newbold had already married to John's daughter, Comfort, for close to a decade. Online researchers believe this Francis was a mariner and was the s/o Thomas and Jane (possibly Layfield?) Newbold of Nanticoke Hundred. They state that Francis and brother John each inherited half of Thomas's Somerset County MD property "Bastion." Quite possible. But they go on to assert that he is the same Francis Newbold who died in Sussex Co DE in 1777, leaving two living sons and a widow, Mary. Also quite possible, if Comfort died between 1743 (when she is mentioned in her father's will) and 1777 -- and Francis remarried "Mary." What is in question is which woman was the mother of which of Francis's children -- or whether researchers have melded two Francis Newbolds into one. This remains to be resolved and I would love to find a Newbold descendant willing to tackle the puzzle. Email me!

This is likely to be Elizabeth, widow of Joseph Henderson (s/o John Sr), who by July of 1726 appears to have married Solomon Tull. Part of the document mentions "to [Tull's] wife's account when Widdow." Joseph's will was proved in November of 1723 and in 1726 Solomon and Elizabeth Tull would give account of Joseph's estate, of whom Elizabeth was Executrix.

Solomon Tull (b ca 1696), second husband of Elizabeth ______ Henderson, was the son of Richard and Elizabeth Turpin Tull. Elizabeth Turpin Tull's sister Mary Turpin married Thomas Beauchamp of Annamessex, son of Edmund Beauchamp. The Beauchamps were neighbors to the <u>Williams family</u> of that Hundred. The marriage between Solomon Tull and widow Elizabeth Henderson brought young Hannah Henderson into the company of the Beauchamps, Kings, Horseys, Williamses and Roaches of Annamessex. Hannah would later marry Nathaniel Roach.

When <u>Samuel Morris</u>, <u>shipwright</u>, died in Somerset Co MD in 1721, Solomon Tull witnessed his will and Madam Betty (the former Elizabeth Denwood) Gale was the executrix. Morris left property to William Sr. and Sarah Turpin, and to William, son of Richard

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Waters (spelled "Wotters"). There appear to be extensive connections between the Turpins, Waters, Tulls and McClemmys but I haven't connected all of the dots yet.

There only seem to be two semi-viable candidates for the deceased husband of the widow Elizabeth Henderson and father of her son William. There are problems with each. The first candidate would be William (s/o John Sr) Henderson, planter of Manokin, who made his will in 1720 and named only siblings. He mentioned no wife or child, but he did twice refer to a "father-in-law." Perhaps William's wife was with child, unbeknownst to both, at the time of his death.

The second candidate is William Jr (s/o William Sr) Henderson who died sometime between 1709-1712. The problem with this second scenario is that by 1728, any child of this couple would have to be at least sixteen years of age. While it was not unheard of for an orphan to be bound out in his or her late teens, if the "orphaned" William (who apparently still had a living mother?) was sixteen or older in 1728, he should have appeared in McClemmy's household on the 1729 tax list. William Henderson does not appear on the list of taxables in William McClemmy's home until 1733. If he had turned 16 that year (the age at which a male became taxable) he would have been born around 1717. This doesn't work for either of the dead Williams. William Jr (s/o William Sr) was dead far too early to father a child in 1717, and William (s/o John Sr) would surely have mentioned a three-year-old son and heir, had he one.

In 1734 William Henderson is shown as a taxable dependent in the household of William McClemmy, but this time along with Woney McClemmy. (Woney McClemmy [s/o Thomas] would move to coastal NC 1737, at about the same time a William Henderson appears in Craven Co NC applying for land patents.) In 1735 William Henderson is no longer in the McClemmy household in Somerset, indicating that 1734 was likely the year he turned 21 and left the service of William McClemmy. If so, that would place his birth in 1712-1713, making it possible -- barely -- that he was the child of William Jr (s/o Wm Sr) Henderson of Pocomoke.

Another thing to note is the fact that Elisabeth Bishop, widow and executrix of Henry Bishop (d bef Nov 1709, s/o John Bishop) married one of the two William Hendersons. William Henderson was granted administration of the estate of Henry Bishop on 22 Nov 1709 (John Pitts and Robert Blades sureties).

This early display of animosity between Francis Henderson and Thomas Lambden would escalate into a nasty lawsuit in 1731 when Lambden bought a 1722 note of debt signed by Francis, then demanded payment and refused Francis's offered settlement.

Interestingly, neither Francis Henderson nor Lambden was awarded the child in the case above. The four-year-old boy was bound instead to **William Booth** to learn the trade of a Cooper. In 1734 <u>John Dennis Jr sued William Booth</u> for a debt of 2,331.5 lbs of tobacco, and accused Booth of being a "runaway & [who was] about to remove his estate in order to defraud his Creditors."

In a related case from November of 1733, Mary Burke, wife of John Burke, former servant to Thomas Lambden, complained to the court that she "hath a child named Mary bound by [her husband] to a Certain Thomas Lambden that the said Child is very ill used by [his] said master and your petitioner's husband being now out of the Country is incapable to apply to your worships on behalf of his said Child. Your petitioner therefore prays that your worships will take her said Child's Care into your consideration and give her such relief as your worships shall think proper..." In response to which complaint the court, asserting that the "Child has been very much abused" summoned Sarah Lambden, wife of the afd Thomas Lambden and heard the allegations and answers and declared that the act of John Burke in binding the child to Lambden was void, and that the child should be freed. View full text of case.

Note re Booth Surname 10/19/15: **Booth** is one of the names that appears in connection with a **William Henderson** found in Kent County DE in 1730-1731. In April of 1731 a William Henderson and a Mary Booth witness a POA between Richard Richardson and Mark Manlove (the Manloves were married into the McClemmy family). In the 1740 Somerset County Tax list, we will find Mariner James Henderson (returned from Onslow County NC) living in the Wicomico Hundred household of Levin Gale. The tax lists for 1741 & 1742 are missing but James is still nearby in 1743. Robin Henderson and I believe James may have been contracted to Gale's shipping operations.

Also notice that the <u>Manloves</u> married into the McClemmy family (the branch we find in Onslow Co NC in the mid-1700's who had extensive family ties to the Somerset Co MD Hendersons).

There was a Robert Richardson listed among the neighbors of James Henderson who was affected by the boundary definition between MD and VA. <u>View document.</u>

Thomas Lambden purchased a 1722 instrument of debt for £28 guaranteed by **FRANCIS HENDERSON** (originally indebted to **John Williams**[son], who then transferred the debt in 1729 to **William Booth**, who then assigned it to Lambden in 1730). **Henderson** is accused of having "Unjustly detain[ed]" payment, to the damage of Lambden. Henderson was represented by attorney **Levin Gale**, who, at Henderson's request, had the case continued four times (November 1730, March 1730, June 1731, August 1731). In August 1731 **Francis Henderson** offered to settle the debt by signing over to **John Williams** two parcels of land:, **Barren Lott** and **Henderson's Second Choice**. Lambden refused the settlement and the court ruled in his favor, converting Henderson's debt obligation to 846 pounds of tobacco. *View entire transcript including description of land parcels and boundaries Source: Somerset County Judicial Records 1725-1727 Vol 842 pg 121b*

There are several interesting contextual issues surrounding the players in this case, not the least of which, <u>Thomas Lambden himself was in jail for debt by 1755</u>. The petition for his release required him to surrender his entire estate in exchange for his freedom, excepting the clothes on his family's back, his bedding, and his tools up to a value of £5. As early as 1733 Lambden was living adjacent to the Hendersons in Pocomoke Hundred. There were several years when he was enumerated between Henderson households which leads us to wonder if there was a familial connection between Lambden and the Hendersons.

It is unclear whether the original debt was owed to John Williams or John Williamson. The text of the case spells the name both ways. If John Williams, then it could possibly be referring to Francis's first cousin, John Williams III, son of John Jr and Jane Henderson Williams. Unfortunately there were a number of men named John Williams in Somerset County during the time in question, so it is hard to know for certain.

The second thing to notice about the case is that John Pitts (husband of Francis's cousin Hannah Henderson Pitts) gave evidence for <u>Lamden</u>, who was ordered to pay Pitts 120 pounds of tobacco for his testimony (<u>see following record</u>).

The third thing to be aware of is that according to what I have been able to find online in Lambden family genealogies, Thomas Lambden was married to "Sarah Henderson." The only Sarah Henderson I have been able to identify of roughly a marriageable age is a granddaughter of Gilbert Henderson, although I have no documentation to support the marriage. Another possibility is that Thomas Lamden may have married Sarah Bishop Henderson, widow of William Henderson Senior, although I think that improbable based on the age difference. A third possibility is that there is a previously unknown Sarah Henderson belonging to either James Henderson Junior and his wife Esther, or William Sr and Sarah Bishop Henderson (John & Elizabeth Barnaby Henderson did not have a daughter named Sarah). Another website says that Thomas Lambden married an Elizabeth Henderson. John and Elizabeth Barnaby did indeed have a daughter named Elizabeth, but she is not mentioned in her father's 1743 will, so she may have died prior to that. It is possible that Thomas Lamben married this Elizabeth, or alternatively he might have married the unidentified "widow Elizabeth Henderson" who bound her son William to William McClemmy in in 1728. Just to further complicate matters, we must bear in mind that there was also a Thomas Lambden Junior. In 1747 Thomas Lambden (probably Senior) would become owner of the 50-ton Sussex Co DE-built sloop Ogle, captained by Thomas Elmore.

A word about the attorneys. Francis Allen was the attorney for the plaintiff in this case. He was the same attorney who represented Thomas Dukes in his (Duke's) 1724 suit against **James Henderson** (also for debt, for which Francis Henderson stood security on James's behalf). For his attorney in this case, Francis Henderson had **Levin Gale**. In the 1740 tax list (tax lists are missing for 1741 and 1742) Mariner James Henderson can be found in the Wicomico household of Levin Gale, ostensibly participating in some capacity in Gale's extensive shipping interests. In 1743 he is still in Wicomico living next to another Gale employee (who is living with two of Gale's slaves). Levin Gale died in 1744 and James Henderson would be later be found in the home of Captain John Williams, attached to Gale as aforementioned.

Quite an extensive web of connections involved in this single record.

John Pitts was the husband of Hannah Henderson (d/o John & Elizabeth Barnaby Henderson). Francis is called "heir at law" and "sole heir" but that does not necessarily mean he was an only child. Law of primogeniture would have awarded him the estate by default since his father died intestate. Note that the name Booth is also connected with a 1731 Kent County DE record which mentions a William Henderson in documents with a Mary Booth.

I thought this record significant enough to include in the timeline due to the mention of Robert and Mary Pitts having removed to Bath County NC by 1732. We know that mariner James Henderson was already in the Onslow County NC area by 1732, so this reinforces our theory that a number of Somerset County Henderson relatives removed to the coast of NC around that time. John and Elizabeth Barnaby Henderson's daughter Hannah was the wife of John Pitts.

This is an interesting record. Although there were several Comfort Hendersons in Gilbert's line in Accomack County VA, the only one I have found for James's line in Somerset Co MD is Comfort d/o John & Elizabeth Barnaby Henderson, who by 1733 had been Mrs.Francis Newbold for over a decade. This record simply seems too early to be any of the other Somerset Co MD Comfort Hendersons. Puzzling, and not helpful that there are no details about the record online.

As to the case of Ann Eddes, in March 1734 Eddes appeared to give security for good behavior. In June 1734 Ann and her husband Laurence petitioned against Thomas Fletcher for unlawfully detaining her "for the space of five months beyond what she by Law was obliged to serve him." In November of 1734 Eddes came into court again to give security for good behavior, especially in regards to Sarah Fletcher, wife of Mr. Thomas Fletcher. I didn't find a resolution to the suite in this volume of the records.

This record is curious in that this is the only appearance (thus far) of a "Charles Henderson <u>Junior</u>." There were two Charles Hendersons living in Somerset County in 1736 - Charles of Pocomoke Hundred, son of John and Elizabeth Barnaby Henderson, and a second Charles of Bogerternorton Hundred, the man we are calling "Mariner Charles" (believed to be a brother to William Henderson Junior, Bishop Henderson, and Mariner James Henderson). I believe Mariner Charles is the same Charles Henderson who made his will in Worcester County in 1772 (see May 14, 1772, below) but am not yet certain. The designation "Junior" in this record is misleading, and may simply mean the younger of the two Charleses. Charles "The Ropemaker" of Pocomoke (presumed to be the elder of the two Charles by a few years to a decade), was the same Charles who married Parthenia Merrill, and they had <u>no known sons named Charles</u>. Charles and Parthenia's son Barnaby <u>did</u> have a son named Charles, but he was not born until about 1753 (probably in Onslow Co NC). The range of possibilities for the Charles Junior of this 1736 record are, in order of likelihood, 1) younger cousin to Charles of Pocomoke, thus presumably Mariner Charles, son of William and Sarah Bishop Henderson 2) a previously unknown son or grandson of James Henderson Junior and Esther, and thus a brother or nephew of Francis Henderson, 3) a previously undocumented son of Charles "the Ropemaker" of Pocomoke Hundred and his wife Parthenia Merrill Henderson, 4) a mistake by the original recorder of the document, 5) a random unrelated Charles Henderson in Somerset temporarily during 1736. Based on what we know about the Somerset County Hendersons of the early 18th century, there do not seem to be any other possibilities outside of these.

Although I am not sure who John Murray is, he could be connected to the William Murray who was master of two of Levin Gale's ships (the 1737 Leah and the 1739 Mary); a William Murray gave security in court for James Henderson in 1741 while James Henderson (mariner of Onslow) was living in the Gale household. My instincts and circumstantial evidence are combining to convince me that this little group of Sussex Co DE and Philadelphia PA Hendersons are connected to our mariner Hendersons of Somerset County MD.

In 1719 part of Henry Bishop's original Snow Hill tract was divided between John and Elizabeth Murray, Elizabeth Henderson (formerly Elizabeth Bishop, who m 2nd William Henderson), and Hugh and Elizabeth Nelson. I don't know what the relationship of the Murrays or Nelsons (if any) were to the Bishops, but this may be where the Murray connection fits in. Perhaps Hannah Henderson was somehow connected with the family of Elizabeth Bishop Henderson and William "of Manokin" Henderson.

I believe that John Henderson actually wrote his will in August of 1743, not 1723, as is widely reported online. There are several reasons I believe the 1723 date to be a transcription error. First, the will states that John Henderson was "of Worcester County" but

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Worcester was not created until 1742. Second, his will clearly refers to both his brother James and his son John in the past tense. Both men were alive, present and accounted for on the Somerset County tax lists during the 1720's (James probably died sometime after the tax rolls were recorded in 1727 because he no longer appears on the lists after that year).

Note that the will mentions daughter Comfort Newbold, which means she must have died after 1743. Online researchers estimate that Francis Newbold (the same man we believe was the husband of Comfort Henderson) married a woman named "Mary" ca 1730, and had sons John, Thomas C. and Francis Jr. This is based on the fact that the 1777 Sussex Co DE will of a Francis Newbold named wife Mary and sons Thomas C. and John (also named Sarah, wife of dec'd son Francis Jr.). Obviously Comfort was still living in 1743, and if the online records all refer to the same/correct Francis Newbold, it seems more likely that Comfort was the mother of some or all of the children mentioned in the 1777 will, and that Mary was a second wife of Francis, married sometime between 1743 and 1777.

Virginia to Cape Cod

Contextual history: "A tremendous hurricane tracked offshore Virginia, northeast to Cape Cod. At 1:00 a.m. at Norfolk, winds became violent from the northeast. The fury of the storm peaked between 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m.. In Williamsburg, one family drowned as flood waters carried their house away. At Hampton, water rose to four feet deep in the streets; many trees were uprooted or snapped in two. Torrents of rain flooded northern Virginia and Maryland. The Bay rose to fifteen feet above normal...destroying waterfront buildings. An account of this tremendous storm was given in the biography of Commodore James Barron, An Affair of Honor, by William Oliver Stevens. Barron's grandfather witnessed the hurricane first hand while stationed at Fort George.³ The next morning Commodore Barron swept the distant waters with his spy glass. He was astonished to see across Hampton Roads a wide, sand promontory which had not existed there before. A sand spit had been thrown up during the fury of the storm, which was the beginning of Willoughby Spit. Another account of the storm given by a letter written at Annapolis, Maryland describes the storm as such: "....On Saturday October 18th, the wind began to blow hard and by 1:00 a.m. (The 19th) was very violent from the northeast with rain. The hardest portion of the storm occurred from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on the 19th. The bay (Chesapeake) rose 15 feet perpendicular, according to one witness. The tide kept fluxing and ran some small craft nearly a mile from common high water and left some in cornfields. At least four ships were destroyed at the south end of Chesapeake Bay (Shomette). Bodies washed ashore from the shipwrecks for days afterward. Damage in the area totaled £30,000...as currency of the colonies was British. Benjamin Franklin was keeping an eye

³ An account by Commodore James Barron: "A threatening sky was observed to the southeast over the Chesapeake Bay. The wind increased which soon brought the rain. As the hours wore on the wind and rain increased in fury. Sometimes the downpour slackened. One could hear the sand picked up by the wind from the beach outside and blasted against every object that still withstood the gale. All the while the rising tide was rapidly being piled up to a height never seen before in that area. The waves were pounding on the shore, finally to the very foot of the outside wall at Fort George. A large tree crashed over on its side with its roots in the air and was driven against the land side of the Fort. With the impact the wall yawned and broke. Shortly afterwards the seawall lurched and sank at the point where it was exposed to the wave fury of the storm. Finally the outside wall of the fort gave way, and the filling of sand poured out, leaving the inner wall exposed to the blast without support. When this too fell apart and collapsed, the barracks took the full force of the wind. About sundown, the storm slackened and in another hour the rain and wind had diminished to such a degree that it was clearly spent."

The first order of business for the Onslow County Court of Pleas and Quarter Sessions of spring 1753 was to address the "loss of records from the destroy'd courthouse from the violent storm of September last...The destroyed courthouse contained records like deeds, tax documents, and wills. Therefore, no one could prove land ownership, collect taxes, or probate (make legal) deceased persons' wills...Residents eventually gathered themselves and petitioned...the Colonial Assembly meeting in New Bern that March to replace the records." View Source [per Onslow County NC court records Vol 5 pg 17]

This was a very unfortunate event, and one relevant to the Hendersons of the Somerset Co MD. Mariner James Henderson Sr. had settled on the New River of Onslow County, along with Bishop and McClemmy relations from Somerset County MD. The last time Mariner James appears in any records is in the 1750 tax lists (see record above). We know from late 18th-century Onslow County NC records that he left a will which bequeathed Henderson's Landing, his property on the New River, to son James "Isaac" Henderson, but the will has never been found. I speculate that Mariner James probably died sometime between 1750 and September 1752, and that his Onslow County NC may have been lost in this hurricane.

Why is Daniel Henderson now "late of Somerset?" Where did he move to, and why? He obviously went on a shopping spree in September of 1760, but apparently on credit. Did his departure from the county have anything to do with the the debt to Stuart? Is this Alexander Stuart the same Alexander Stewart/Steward in whose household the mariner Hendersons were living in the 1720's?

A Daniel Henderson patented "Henderson's Inclosure," 245a in Baltimore County, on 20 Mar 1771, but this may be too late to be the same Daniel Henderson who had left Somerset County by 1761. <u>View patents</u>.

Samuel Ackworth made his will on 10 Jun 1761 in Stepney, Parish, Somerset County. He left the bulk of his property to be divided by wife Patience (Nock) Ackworth, daughter Esther and son Ephraim. To his married daughters, Sarah Bounds and Mary Watkins, wife of blacksmith John Watkins, he left a negro girl, Eunice, to be shared by the sisters when she came of age at 16. His will was witnessed by Day Givens, Matthew Dorman and George Farrington. There were two copies of the will. Widow Patience kept one, and the other was kept by George Farrington, who wrote it. A few days after Samuel's death, John Watkins offered Farrington £20 to hand over or destroy his copy of the will in order that his wife receive an equal distribution from Samuel's estate. The next night, the original will was stolen from the Widow Ackworth's home. Matthew Dorman testified that Watkins had approached him in an attempt to get the widow's copy of the will, but fearing that Watkins would attempt to destroy it, he refused to allow him to have it. Dorman said he saw Watkins at the widow's home and the next day the chest where she kept it (along with money and other documents and valuables) had been stolen. Apparently Dorman and the Widow Ackworth enlisted the aid of Daniel Henderson to search for the missing chest. They found it "on the bank of a creek nearby, but could not find either the will, the bond, the accounts or the money." View Source

DANIEL HENDERSON, Patience Ackworth, Day Givens, Mary Olfee, and Matthew Dorman are bound to appear to testify against John Watkins on suspicion of felony in the provincial court at Annapolis.

Cape Hatteras and the Virginia Capes

Contextual history: "A major hurricane brushed Cape Hatteras and remained east of the Virginia Capes." Source: Seventeenth Century Virginia Hurricanes

1761 Oct 30

Worcester Co MD

CHARLES HENDERSON, Ropemaker, writes his will. He leaves land to son William Henderson; slaves to son Jesse and William; personal goods (including a number of items of pewter) and livestock to sons William and Jesse, and daughter Levinah Blaids. He mentions grandson Curtes (or Charles?), and wife Parthenia (Purtheney). Will witnessed by Joshua Merrill, Mary Blaids and Rachel Young. Will was proved January 29th, 1762. View full text of will

Curiously, Charles Henderson makes no mention of son Barnaby, who had by 1761 recently removed to Onslow County NC. Perhaps Charles had given Barnaby some portion of the estate prior to his departure. Neither does Charles mention son Levin, although he does mention Levin's son, Curtis. Some transcriptions replace the name Curtis/Curtes with Charles, so the original will should be reviewed. The will was witnessed by a kinsman of his wife Parthenia Merrill Henderson, and there were probably also familial connections with the Blaids and Young witnesses.

1762 Jan 29

1763 Jan 24 Sussex Co DE

JOHN HENDERSON marries Alice Kollock.

VITAL RECORDS OF KENT AND SUSSEX COS. DE 1686-1800, Wright, p 123

We do not know for sure yet if the John Henderson and Alice Kollock (d/o Shepard Kollock) mentioned here in Sussex Co DE were part of the Eastern Shore Henderson Group, however, later instances of records connecting this Sussex Co DE record with Hendersons (perhaps transiently) in Philadelphia seem to indicate a connection. John and Alice Kollock Henderson kept a shop in Lewes, (see record below, May 1796) and John apparently did business (poorly) in Philadelphia and nearly lost his wife's property.

I believe that this John was probably a brother to Hannah Henderson who married Stokely Hossman (b 1748 d 1788) in Pennsylvania (Philadelphia) January 1769. Stokely Hossman named heirs Benjamin Stokely and **James Henderson** in his 1776 will (not probated until 1788). Hossman and **John Henderson** took an oath of allegiance to the state of Pennsylvania in 1779. Despite their residence in Lewes DE and Philadelphia PA, this family of Hendersons does appear to have had connections to families in Somerset Co MD. Stokely Hossman died in 1788 at the age of 40 and is buried at the Lewes Presbyterian Church in Lewes, DE. His gravestone has been photographed and archived by the Lewes Historical Society.

There are some Somerset/Worcester trees that show that James Henderson, son of John Jr. and Elizabeth Barnaby Henderson married an Alice "Kollock." That James Henderson supposedly died before 21 Aug 1776 (which means he could not be the James Henderson named in <u>Stokely Hossman's Oct 1776</u> will, either Alice married two Henderson men (John <u>and</u> James), or researchers have confused the name of her husband.

An Alice Kollock married a John Green in Pennsylvania in 1765. Green is a surname associated with descendants of Gilbert Henderson of early Northampton and Accomack Counties, VA as well as the Nixon family of Onslow Co NC (who married with Hendersons), so although no connection between these two Alice Kollocks is obvious, and I am unsure of where or how the John Henderson and Alice Kollock of Sussex Co DE fit in with our larger Eastern Shore group, there is enough strong circumstantial evidence to include this record in the Delmarva timeline.

1764 Aug 7

Coventry Parish, Somerset (Worcester) Co MD

JACOB HENDERSON and Edeth Outten Henderson (d/o John and Sarah Purnell Outten, widow of Samuel Henderson) are married in Coventry Parish, Somerset Co MD. Jacob was s/o Francis and Elizabeth Henderson. Children of Jacob and Edeth Outten Henderson was son Outten Henderson (b ca 1765 Worcester Co MD). http://www.esva.net/ghotes/descendants/outten.htm

Samuel Henderson died on or before 5 Feb 1764. Edith remarried Samuel's cousin Jacob Henderson, son of Francis and Elizabeth Henderson of Somerset Co MD.

1765 29 May

Kent Co DE

MAJOR HENDERSON sells a 101-acre tract of land on Brown's Branch of Mispillion Hundred in Kent County, Delaware, called *Hopewell* to Elizabeth Clark, wife of John Clark. View original deed: Page 1 | Page 2

Major Charles Henderson married Priscilla Clark, daughter of Thomas and Sarah Luff Clark of Dover DE. Direct line male descendants of this couple are Y-DNA matches to descendants of James Henderson of the Eastern Shore and Mariner James Henderson of Onslow Co NC, however, as of yet, we cannot determine with certainty how the families are connected. It is worth remembering that Gilbert Henderson's wife was Mary Major (which may have been the source of this man's given name). Also, Argalus Henderson's family of Chatham Co NC intermarried heavily with Clarks (although a very common name and certainly no proof of any connection).

John Clark, probably Priscilla's brother. The property's provenance is given in the deed as having originally belonged to Abraham Wynkoop, and from him transferred to John Crumpton, and from him transferred to William Caffa and from the said William Caffa to Henderson. Neighbors were Alexander Whitley, and subsequently John Bowers and Adam Killins(?).

From Mispillion Hundred, Kent County, Delaware: "Mispillion Hundred originally included in its borders all of what is now Milford Hundred, and extended from the Delaware Bay to the Maryland line, and was bounded on the north by Murderkill Hundred, and on the south by Sussex County."

1766 Sep 11 (Julian Calendar)

Virginia

Contextual history: "A hurricane struck the Virginia coast." *Source: Seventeenth Century Virginia Hurricanes*

1767 Apr 9

Worcester Co MD

Joshua Merrill makes his will. To wife Mary, use of all lands and one-third estate. To son Joshua, the plantation "where I now live and all my tract of land called *Security* except 5 acres which I give to <u>JAMES HENDERSON</u>. To three youngest daughters, Nancy, Elinor, and Ann - personalty. To son William, all my land on east side of *Merrill's Addition Enlarged*; all lands lying between Thomas Tyler's and his brother Joshua's land; 15 cash; personal property. To daughters Sarah and Betty, personalty. To children William, Sarah, Betty, Leah, Nancy, Elinor, Joshua and Ann, the remaining two thirds estate. Executrix: Mary Merrill. Witnesses: Jacob Boston, Thomas Marshall, Elijah Jarman. Written Apr 9 1767, proved 25 Apr 1767. *Source: Maryland Register of Wills*, 1629-1999, Worcester County, MD Vol 3 1759-1769

Joshua Merrill was the brother of Parthenia Merrill Henderson. His wife was Mary Pryor. The James Henderson mentioned here is probably James, son of John and Elizabeth Barnaby Henderson. James's son, James Henderson Junior, married Sarah Merrill about 1757. Sarah Merrill was the daughter of Joseph and Elizabeth Merrill. Witness Jacob Boston would become the second husband of Sarah Merrill Henderson after James Junior died (abt 1783).

1767 Sep 21

Coastal NC

Contextual History: Hurricane: "Caused a number of vessels to be lost. Floods struck Virginia, with a mill entirely destroyed in Warwick county." *Source: Virginia Gazette, Aug 6, 1767*

1769 Jan 14

Sussex Co DE or Pennsylvania

HANNAH HENDERSON granted marriage license to wed Stokely Hossman. <u>View record</u> Pennsylvania Marriage Licenses, 1769-1776 Vol XL, p457; see also <u>Pennsylvania Archives Second Series</u>, Vol II, p 143

This Hannah Henderson is probably too young to be the "friend Hannah Henderson of the City of Philadelphia" mentioned by <u>John Murray in his 1736 Somerset Co MD will</u>. This Hannah appears to be connected with **John Henderson** who married Alice Kollock in Sussex Co DE in 1763 (ostensibly the same John Henderson who swore an oath of allegiance with Stokely Hossman to the state of Pennsylvania in 1779). Stokely Hossman made his will in 1776 when he was bound for NC on the schooner Mosquito and named

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heirs **Benjamin Stokely** and **James Henderson**. The will was probated in 1788 and Hossman was buried in Lewes DE. See biographical dictionary entry for <u>Hossman</u>. <u>Stokely</u>.

1769 May 4 Sussex Co DE

ALICE HENDERSON wife of **JOHN HENDERSON** is mentioned in a record concerning property belonging to the Kollock family of Lewes in Sussex County: "George Kollock, ship joyner, from Boaz Manlove, High Sheriff of Sussex Co. 4 May 1769. Simon Kollock, Esgr., late of Sussex Co., died intestate, and 2/3 of his tract fell to Shepard Kollock, eldest son, admr. of his late father who left and begueathed by his last will the afsd. land amongst his several heirs, which heirs exhibited a petition to the Court of Common Pleas for a division of the land and the above land was allotted to **ALICE HENDERSON** wife of JOHN HENDERSON, shopkeeper, being one of the heirs of Shepard Kollock, land in the suburbs of the town of Lewes, on the southeast side of the main county road that leadeth from the town of Lewes to Rehoboth and on the northeast side and adjoining David Hall's land which he bought of Simon Kollock, one of the afsd. heirs and joining the afsd. George Kllock's land on the southwest side of his land, being part of the afds. dividend or tract surveyed and divided of 42 1/4 acres, which JOHN HENDERSON as above mentioned by a certain obligation became indebted to John White and Samuel Coldwell of Philadelphia, merchants and sometime afterwards said White and Coldwell recovered a judgement against afds. Henderson for the sum of the afds. obligation and whereas his land was seized and sold by public sale to George Kollick for 40 shillings. Wit John Russel, Wm Prettyman. Within deed ackn. 4 May 1769

Huh-oh. Thankfully George was standing by to redeem the land. This record obviously confirms the connection between a John Henderson and the Kollocks of Sussex Co DE and the records of the Hendersons in Philadelphia (ie Stokely and Hannah Henderson Hossman). Still don't know who John, Hannah and James Henderson of Sussex Co DE belong to, though.

Manlove is a name that could be connected with the Hendersons of Dover, DE.

1769 May 4 Sussex Co DE

George Kollock, Sussex Co, joyner, from <u>ALICE HENDERSON</u>, Sussex Co., spinster. 4 May 1769 For 87. Parcel of land being part of a larger tract granted by patent to Alexander Molleston, late of afds co., dec'd, and by sundry deeds of conveyances became the property of Simon Kollock, Esqr. late of the county adsd., died intestate and Shepard Kollock admr. of afds. Simon Kollock and the land became the property of Shepard Kollock and the land fell to the heirs of afds. Shepard Kollock and a parcel was allotted to <u>ALICE HENDERSON</u>, one of the daughters of afds. Shepark Kollock. Lnd being in the suburbs of the town of Lewes joining land of David Hall and George Kollock. 41 1/4 acres. Wit: Benjamin Miflin, John Haverlo. Within deed of sale ackn. 5 May 1769.

Spinster!? Ho, man, what happened to John?

1769 Sep 8 NC/VA/MD and New England Great Chesapeake Bay Hurricane

Contextual History: "Hurricane center was close to Williamsburg. Many old houses in eastern North Carolina and southeastern Virginia were destroyed, particularly around Williamsburg, York, Hampton, and

Norfolk due to 13 hours of high winds from the northeast to northwest. Known as 'The Great Chesapeake Bay Hurricane of 1769'" *Source: Early American Hurricanes, David Ludlum, p 25*

1769 Sep 7-8 (Julian Calendar)

Williamsburg, Virginia

Contextual history: "Considered one of the worst storms of the Eighteenth century, this hurricane passed over Williamsburg. Winds increased at 1:00 a.m., blowing a violent gale between 10 and 11 a.m.. Winds increased out of the northwest and continued "until dinnertime". Many old homes and trees were leveled. Heavy rain ruined tobacco crops and flooded roads. Tobacco in storage was also damaged at the warehouse. Heavy damage was seen in Chesapeake Bay. High winds tore off the top of a wharf at Yorktown; a schooner rammed a nearby storehouse. Four ships in the York river were driven ashore. Two ships on the James River were also wrecked. A vessel from Norfolk, filled with coal from Williamsburg, was forced up to Jamestown before it went to pieces. At least six perished due to shipwreck. The storm tracked northeast along the coast, accelerating as it passed by New England and into Canada." Source: Seventeenth Century Virginia Hurricanes

BENJAMIN HENDERSON SR makes his last will and testament, leaving Haphazard to his wife **Mary** for her lifetime, then to son **Benjamin** and his heirs. He gives son **Lemuel** a negro man named Harry and various pieces of personal property. To grandsons **James** (a chest) Henderson and **Lemuel** (his gun) Henderson, and **Thomas Collins** (a chest and an ewe and a heifer). To daughter **Mary Horsey** his featherbed and furniture, and to daughters **Leah**, **Rhoda** and **Betty**, a shilling each. He leaves his personal property to his wife Mary to dispose of at her death as she sees fit, and appoints Mary and Lemuel executors. Witnessed by Solomon Webb, John Blades and William Franklin.Probated 22 May 1772. View full text of will

JAMES HENDERSON makes his will. Names son Joseph (and his son James, all of tract Morlock); son James and his son Joseph (balance of aforesaid on Pocomoke River); granddaughter Elizabeth Henderson; son James, executor. Witnessed by Thomas Lambden, Ephraim Henderson and Tabitha Henderson. Proved 21 Aug 1776. Source 1 Page 37 (folio 311)

Ephriam Henderson was the son of James's nephew, Jesse Henderson (son of Charles and Parthenia Merrill Henderson). His wife was Tabitha Quinton.

1772 Feb 15

Worcester Co MD

JACOB HENDERSON witnesses the will of **John Handy**. Handy mentions step-mother Elizabeth Handy and father Benjamin Handy, brothers Levin, George, Mathias and Benjamin, son Haste (under 20),

brother James Martin Handy, brothers-in-law Robert and William Dashiell, friends Robert Dashiell, William Winder, Joseph Dashiell, Benjamin Handy and Tabitha Mackall. Wit in addition to Jacob Henderson were James Buckanan and Thomas Irving. Will was proved 29 Feb 1772. Source 1 Page 13-14

1772 May 22

Worcester Co MD

BENJAMIN HENDERSON SR has died. His will was proved 22 May 1772. View full text of will

1772 May 14

Worcester Co MD

<u>CHARLES HENDERSON</u> makes his will. He names daughter **Mary** as executrix and mentions children **Steward**, **William**, **Rachel**, **Betty** and **Nanny**. Witnesses were Whittington and Levin Bowin. <u>Source 1</u> Page 29

This may be Mariner Charles (who may or may not be the "Charles Henderson Junr" referred to in this 1736 judicial record). If Mariner Charles, he may have named son Steward for Alexander Steward, in whose household he and Mariner James were living in 1726 (James had been with Steward since at least 1723). Charles also mentions a daughter named "Nanny" -- the only other time I have seen this name (vs. the more common Nancy) is in the 1770 will of James "Isaac" Henderson, who also mentioned a daughter named Nanny. James "Isaac" Henderson also had a grandson named Stewart.

It is interesting that the witnesses were Bowens. I believe that Sarah Bishop Henderson's mother was probably Ann, widow of William Bowen and second wife of Lt. Henry Bishop. Ann Bishop had two sons by her first marriage to William Bowen. Those sons were David (b ca 1658) and William Junior. I don't know who Whittington and Levin Bowin were, but they may have been cousins to Charles Henderson through his mother's Bowen half-siblings.

1772 Sep 1 (Julian Calendar)

Outer Banks

Contextual history: "A tropical storm forced fourteen vessels ashore at Ocracoke Bar in North Carolina with 50 persons perishing. It is likely this storm caused significant winds in southeastern Virginia." Source: Seventeenth Century Virginia Hurricanes

1773 Feb 24

Worcester County MD

Will of Dixon Quinton, 24 February 1773 (written). 26 August 1783 (proved). Wife Tabitha, EX. Had land bought of **BEN. HENDERSON** where John Peach lives. Son Philip. Son James. Son Dixon, under age. Daughters Susanna and Eleanor. Wit; Joshua Houston, William Merrill, Zipporah Baker. Wife renounces EX.

This is puzzling. The will of Dixon Quinton mentions wife Tabitha in 1772. However, my records show that Ephriam Henderson (s/o Jesse and Rhoda Henderson) married Tabitha Quinton

1773 Aug 5

Somerset County MD

Listed among "a list of the debts due to the estate of Eli Campbell:" Simon Kollock, **STEWART HENDERSON**, **BENJAMIN HENDERSON**, **WILLIAM HENDERSON**, **Thomas Lambden**, Sterling

Marchment, Samuel Marchmont, James Murray, Charles Merchment, Charles Raitlif, James Rooks, John

Savage, William Vessey, Peter Watson, William Whittington," and *numerous* others. *Source: Land Grants*of Somerset County MD by Ruth T. Dryden, p210

This is of interest because of the name Stewart Henderson, which we rarely see. I believe this Stewart Henderson is probably the "Steward Henderson" mentioned in the 1772 will of Charles Henderson of Worcester County. The William Henderson mentioned here may be his brother, or could be first cousin William Henderson (s/o William Jr.), or possibly second cousin William Henderson (s/o Charles and Parthenia Merrill Henderson).

1775 Aug 29 - Sep 2 (Julian Calendar)

The Independence Hurricane

North Carolina to Newfoundland

Contextual history: "This savage hurricane raged from North Carolina to Newfoundland. Heavy rains began to fall across the colony on the 29th of August and slowly increased with time. The coast was ravaged from Currituck to Chincoteague. Wharves and storehouses on the waterfront of Norfolk were devastated. Bridges were carried away by the raging waters. At Williamsburg, mill dams broke and corn stalks were blown flat. Winds blew furiously until 10:00 p.m. Many ships were damaged as they were thrown ashore at Norfolk, Hampton, and York. Around twenty-five vessels were run ashore, or "irrecoverable gone." The gun ship H.M.S. Mercury was driven hard aground on Portsmouth Point at 5:00 p.m. on the 2nd. It was stranded in two feet of water for eight days (Shomette). The Liberty became "hopelessly stranded" in Back River, near Hampton. A number of locals boarded her, captured the crew, secured her goods, and set the ship afire in the first outright act of war. A full blockade of Hampton Roads thereafter brought shipping to a halt for three months. At least twenty-five died due to shipwreck." *Seventeenth Century Virginia Hurricanes*

1776 Jul 10 (Julian Calendar)

Virginia

Contextual history: "A strong gale played a role in a battle between the Royal Governor of Virginia, Dunmore, and General Lewis of the rebel forces. The royal fleet had been injured prior to the storm by General Lewis' forces and was sailing from Gwynn's Island toward St. George's Island, in the Potomac. The British crew was without water and enduring smallpox when the gale struck. A flour-laden supply ship ran aground. One ships foundered at the Mouth of the Rappahannock, while another was stranded on the Eastern shore (Shomette). The H.M.S. Otter, the Governor's ship, was rescuing another ship in distress. They were rescued just in time. After loading the distressed ship's cargo, the ship sunk. The governor later left Virginia for good on August 5th. Many ships in the area suffered damage to their rigging, sails, and anchors. Two vessels were driven ashore in St. Mary's county (Shomette). "Source: Seventeenth Century Virginia Hurricanes"

1776 Aug 21

Worcester Co MD

<u>JAMES HENDERSON</u> son of John and Elizabeth Barnaby Henderson has died. Will of 30 April 1771 was proved 21 Aug 1776. <u>Source 1 Page 37 (folio 311)</u>

1776 Oct 2

Sussex Co DE

Stokely Hossman makes a will naming wife Hannah [Henderson], heirs <u>JAMES HENDERSON</u> and Benjamin Stokely. Stokely Hossman was a "house carpenter" and "a mate of the "Scooner Musquito" and bound for North Carolina." *CALENDAR OF SUSSEX CO DE PROBATE RECORDS* 1680-1800 on pg 193

We do not know if this James Henderson, probably a brother of Hannah Henderson Hossman, was connected to the Delmarva and/or Onslow Hendersons, but the location in Sussex Co DE (where there were also Bishops), a 1763 marriage between John Henderson and Alice Kollock of Sussex Co DE, the connection with a namesake of the Stokely family, and maritime travels to North Carolina -- make this record seem relevant to the Delmarva Hendersons. There was also a 1736 will of John Murray of Somerset Co MD naming "friend" Hannah Henderson "of Philadelphia," although that may be too early to be connected. "On the 13th of January, 1777, a number of loyal colonists in Somerset and Worcester Counties represented to Congress that the Tories in those counties entertained disloyal designs, possibly an uprising in arms. They asked Congress for an armed force to maintain peace and protection. Congress referred the matter to the General Assembly of Maryland, requesting that a military force be sent there to suppress disorder, arrest and disarm any disloyal organizations, and make them take the oath of allegiance to the State. An expedition of militia under Brig. Gen. Henry Hooper, a naval force from Hooper's Straits, commanded by Capt. James Campbell of Dorchester County, and Col. Southey Simpson, of Virginia, with a command which had advanced into Maryland, coerced the Tories in that part of the Eastern Shore and arrested a large number of them, who were carried to Cambridge jail. They were held there for some months in prison; and in 1778 they petitioned Governor Johnson for a special hearing to determine their offences for which they were detained. Purnell Outten (d 1795) married Mary Houston. The Hendersons had family connections with Purnells, Outtens and Houstons He was the father of Purnell Outten Jr. (d 1798 Accomack Co VA). Samuel Dreaden or Dryden was probably a son or grandson of the Samuel Dreaden found on Somerset Co MD Tax Lists of the mid-1700's. The Benjamin Henderson mentioned here is probably Benjamin Henderson Junior, son of Benjamin B. and Mary Henderson, and grandson of John and Elizabeth Barnaby Henderson. Stephen Roach may be related to Hannah Henderson Roach (d/o Joseph Henderson who d 1723).

In 1778 an Irish immigrant named <u>SAMUEL HENDERSON</u> arrived in Accomack Co VA. He purchased land from Ezekiel and Mary Delastatius and was a partner in the mercantile firm of Downing & Henderson (with William Downing). He had sons William, Richard, Captain Samuel Jr., Jackey, and Joseph, and daughters Jinny, Sally, Elizabeth "Betsy" and Rebecca. His daughter Jinny married into the Gillett family.

Note: There is no known relationship between this late Irish immigrant and the Hendersons already established on the Delmarva Peninsula. Records for this Samuel Henderson should not be confused with records of the existing Delmarva lines.

We know that Stokely Hossman mentioned James Henderson in his 1776 will when he was bound for NC aboard the Mosquito from Sussex Co DE. He was married about January 1769 to Hannah Henderson. No idea at this point of a connection between Hossman and the Hendersons, but the name Stokely in connection with John and James Henderson and maritime employment taking Hossman to NC make this record worth inserting. This is probably Thomas Lambden Sr, the same who was involved in the debt suit with Francis Henderson in the 1730's. It is believed he married a Sarah Henderson (possibly of Gilbert Henderson's line, or a widow of a second or third generation Henderson of James's line). He lived among the Hendersons of Pocomoke for several years and mentions having bought land from Robert Pitts, founder of the Pitts Creek settlement. The name Roach is connected with Hannah Henderson Roach, only child of Joseph Henderson (s/o John & Elizabeth Barnaby Henderson) who died in 1723. A Thomas Lambden was in debtor's prison earlier, so I am curious as to how (if the same man) he was able to preserve his property. The debtor may have been his presumed son, Thomas Lambden Jr.

Pomfrett had originally been patented in 1663 by William Coulbourn (1000a) and it was subsequently divided and sold by the Coulbourn family over the 17th and 18th centuries. Researcher Liz D. reports that William Henderson married Elizabeth Coulbourne, widow of William Coulbourne, (d 1765 Somerset Co.) and the land was probably Elizabeth's dower right. We're getting a little close to the beginning of 19th century now and there are a lot of Hendersons out there in Worcester and Somerset Counties. The reason this one caught my eye was the reference to <u>Daniel of St. Thomas Jenifer</u>. Although this Daniel Jenifer was born in Charles Co MD. Online biographies are vague about his parentage, likely because of his connection with the notorious Ann Toft of Somerset Co MD. This record appeared in the archives for Somerset Co MD so I am assuming that this is one of the Somerset Hendersons and not William Henderson, son of Irish Samuel Henderson who arrived in Accomack County VA in about 1778

Jacob Boston made two wills in the 1780's. The first (23 Sep 1780) was witnessed by Dixon Quinton, Thomas Marshall and Elijah Boston. The second (27 Jan 1786) was witnessed by Thomas Layfield, Isaac Boston and James Henderson. Sarah Merrill Henderson Boston had no sons named James, and her husband James Henderson had died in about 1783. Her father-in-law James Henderson was also dead by 1786. Not sure who this James Henderson belongs to. After Boston's death, widow Sarah Merrill Henderson Boston deeded several of the Boston family slaves to Hendersons: 1801 a negro boy named Moses to son William H. Henderson for \$200; Francis, Hannah and Walter to son Levin Henderson for \$100; and 1802 a negro girl Eve to son Jesse Henderson and his wife Polly (no charge). Worc. Deeds U: 482-3, 526; V:427.

Jesse Henderson, son of Sarah Merrill Henderson may be the same Jesse Henderson, shipbuilder, mentioned in the 1883 edition of "History of Pocomoke City" by Rev. James Murray. On page 53: "Jesse Henderson was a ship carpenter by trade...With him, his wife, daughter and grandchildren [Rev. Murray was] most intimately acquainted. He was an honest, upright man in his dealings, very retired in his disposition and highly respected by the entire community. He was great-grandfather to Edward H. Clarke and Mrs.

Mary Quinn. He died in 1832 or '33 and his remains rest in the old Long Burying Ground...His wife, aunt Polly Henderson, for so we used to call her, was a most exemplary woman. I knew her well from my infancy to the time of her death. While I am giving some account of her husband, I feel it due to her name to say that she was my ideal of a model wife. She was a keeper-at-home, no gadder-about, no tattler, no busybody in other people's business. I never heard her speak an unkind word of any one; always had a pleasant word and pleasant face. She died in a good old age, and was buried in the Methodist Episcopal Church Burying ground..." The aunt Polly mentioned in this passage was Polly Long, sister of Captain Henry Long, Captain John W. Long and David Long. All three are buried in the Methodist Episcopal Church burying ground of New Town (Pocomoke City).

This is probably Thomas Lambden Jr. He is supposed to have married an Elizabeth Henderson (possibly d/o John & Elizabeth Barnaby Henderson who had died bef 1743?). Lemuel Henderson is probably the son of Benjamin B. and Mary Henderson, and a grandson of John and Elizabeth Barnaby Henderson. Isaac Henderson is probably the son of Jesse and Rhoda Henderson (an unsourced record reported that he died in 1785, but obviously not, unless there is a stray Isaac up in Worcester County in the 1790's). Isaac, son of Jesse and Rhoda Henderson, was the grandson of Charles and Parthenia Merrill Henderson. Outten Henderson was the son of Jacob and Edith Outten Henderson and a grandson of Francis and Elizabeth Henderson.

This record is interesting for a couple of reasons. First, this cannot be the Bishop Henderson of the pre-1742 Somerset Co tax lists. If the orphan Lemuel was about 18yo in 1802, he would have been born about 1784. The original Bishop Henderson of the tax lists would be approaching 90-100 years old in 1784. That means there was likely a son or grandson named Bishop, who then had a son named Lemuel (a name frequently associated with John Henderson Senior's descendants).

The second thing we can learn from this record is that an 18yo boy was still considered "an orphan" and even at this late age, could still be bound out in service. The John Bishop in question here was likely a distant kinsman on the Bishop line, which reinforces my opinion that this Lemuel and Bishop Henderson should likely fall under the lineage of the original Bishop Henderson.
