

Overview

Between 2013 - 2024, SOS collected **463,783 cigarette butts** from beaches, rivers, open spaces, and public areas! As the singularly most identifiable item littered locally, we know this is just a snapshot of the cigarette litter that continues to negatively impact human and ecosystem health.

Did you know that cigarette butt litter is not only single-use plastic waste, but it's toxic waste? The cost of cigarette butt litter is high, both economically and environmentally. Cigarette filters in the environment will break up into as many as 15,000 microfibers, irreversibly polluting our waters and environment with ever smaller bits of plastic that are essentially impossible to remove. The butts leach toxic chemicals into the environment including nicotine, lead, and arsenic that contaminate our food, soil, and water. The cities we call home each allocate an estimated \$3–16 million annually to remove public litter and cigarette butts from our streets, parks, and waterways. Picking up littered items including cigarette butts costs taxpayers and organizations big money.



For example, California invested \$1.1 billion in state and local waste clean-up in 2021 alone. Together we can ban the sale of filtered cigarettes!

- 4. Ask your city council to ban the sale of filtered tobacco products.

Dear	

I urge you to take action against one of the most pervasive and harmful forms of litter - cigarette butts. These toxic plastic filters are a major environmental, health, and economic burden on our community.

Cigarette butts are the most littered item in the world, and locally, they wash into Monterey Bay, contributing to ocean pollution and harming marine life. These filters do not biodegrade; instead, they break into microplastics and leach toxic chemicals like lead, arsenic, and nicotine into our environment. They are also a fire hazard, responsible for burning nearly 89,000 acres in California since 1980.

The financial burden of cigarette butt cleanup falls on local governments and volunteers rather than the tobacco companies responsible for the waste. In



California alone, Caltrans spends nearly \$14 million annually on cigarette litter cleanup.

I urge you to introduce and support a ban on the sale of filtered tobacco products in our city.

Eliminating these non-essential and harmful filters will significantly reduce pollution, protect public health, and lessen the financial strain on our local government.

Thank you for your time and leadership on this critical issue. I look forward to your response.

Talking Points

They're an Environmental Problem

- Cigarette butts are the most littered item in the world, locally they are washed into the Monterey Bay and contribute to a common form of litter in the world's oceans.
- Cigarette butts are a non-biodegradable plastic, which breaks into microplastics and bioaccumulates in marine organisms.
- Cigarette butts are toxic waste, leaching dangerous chemicals such as lead, arsenic, and nicotine into the environment.
- Cigarette butts are a fire hazard, responsible for burning 88,898 acres in CA since 1980.

They're a Human Health Problem

- Cigarette butts are the remnants of a product responsible for killing almost half a million people in the U.S. each year, including 40,000 Californians.
- There are between 2,000-7,000 chemicals in cigarettes, including 65 carcinogens that cause cancer / chronic disease.



• Tobacco waste is a health equity issue, disproportionately found in lower income communities / communities of color.

They're an Economic Problem

- Caltrans alone spends roughly \$13,940,000 a year cleaning up discarded butts in California.
- Big Tobacco takes no responsibility for its toxic waste, forcing the physical and financial burden of cleanup onto local government agencies and volunteer organizations.
