COMMON COURSE DESCRIPTION: Studio art course that introduces the analytic study of the human form and the figure's potential for compositional and expressive use in drawing.

PREREQUISITES: ARTS 1316 Drawing I or department approval.

COURSE RATIONALE: The purpose of LIFE DRAWING I is to provide each student with specific drawing media experiences and to build basic perceptual skills in terms of drawing from the human figure. The student will review basic knowledge of the elements of art: line, value, shape/volume, texture and color to lead to their deliberate manipulation for different types of spatial illusion, compositions, and expressive meaning.

COMMON COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Upon completion of the course, students will be able to:

- Describe the human figure using accurate and sensitive observation.
- Articulate the relationship between aesthetics and anatomy.
- Generate drawings that demonstrate descriptive, expressive, and conceptual approaches using varied materials and techniques within assigned parameters.
- Relate their drawings to historical and contemporary developments in the field.
- Analyze and critique drawings verbally and/or in writing.
- Demonstrate an appropriate level of professional practice, including safety, craft, and presentation.

ACC SPECIFIC COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Upon completion of the course, students will be able to:

- Convey gesture and create the illusion of expressive movement.
- Analyze and draw the human figure in correct proportion.
- Draw the figure so that the illusion of volume is achieved through a variety of shading techniques such as cross contour, hatching /crosshatching, continuous tone, and the use of the eraser as a drawing tool.
- Depict the figure in a variety of poses using foreshortening (linear perspective).
- Demonstrate knowledge of the bone structure of the human skeleton and the body's muscle structure by drawing and by tests on the nomenclature of anatomy.
- Evoke mood through the expressive use of drawing materials and methods, i.e. simplify, exaggerate, or distort aspects of the figure.
- Present completed work in a professional manner.

INSTRUCTIONAL METHODOLOGY:

Your grade on art projects will be determined by the following criteria:

1. How well your completed assignments fulfill the stated formal goals, if you have applied all of the design concepts assigned in a visual manner.
2. Technical skill in using the materials, presentation and neatness, the ambition of your work and innovative interpretation of the assignment.
3. Your demonstration of understanding the concepts by verbal discussion, test grades, effort in class, ability to follow directions, improvement over the semester, and participation in class.

Final grades will be determined by the total number of points acquired during the semester. Points needed for respective letter grades are shown below.

A = 90 and above / excellent; outstanding concept and execution, ambitious project, challenging to complete within time frame, technical skill is evident, used exercises to experiment and get ideas

B = 89-80 / good; design concepts are clear, composition is well planned, time managed well, technique does not detract from overall image, effort is being made to improve hand skills/technique, exercises complete

C = 79-70 / satisfactory; project doesn't visually express design goals clearly, composition was planned, problems with time management, average technique / hand skills, painting technique detracts from overall image, exercises completed but not explored fully

D = 69-60 / poor; project doesn't visually express design goals, composition appears to be unplanned, poor time management, unproductive in class, weak technical skills, minimal improvement from the last project, exercises incomplete

F = 59-0 / unacceptable; design objective not accomplished, technique ineffective, no improvement from the last project, exercises missing

Incomplete: Instructors will issue an "incomplete" grade only for extraordinary cases with extenuating circumstances. Instructors may include general guidelines for awarding incompletes. For example: Incomplete grades (I) will be given only in rare circumstances. Generally, to receive a grade of "I," a student must have successfully completed most of the coursework but after the last date to withdraw have a serious situation occur which prevents course completion. An instructor may award a grade of "I" (Incomplete) if a student is unable to complete the last of the coursework. An incomplete grade cannot be carried beyond the established date in the following semester. The completion date is determined by the instructor but may not be later than the final deadline for withdrawal in the subsequent semester.

Instructors may include other course policies they deem appropriate to address, such as studio clean up, safety, creative originality, etc.

Students Rights and Responsibilities:

Freedom of Expression: Each student is strongly encouraged to participate in class. In any classroom situation that includes discussion and critical thinking, there are bound to be many differing viewpoints. These differences enhance the learning experience and create an atmosphere where students and instructors alike will be encouraged to think and learn. On sensitive and volatile topics, students may sometimes disagree not only with each other but also with the instructor.
