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Long Range Planning Grant: Early Career Mentoring Program

- What: A formalized mentoring program (initiated at ESA 2015) that pairs 10 early career mentees with 10 established ecologist mentors, and awards them \$200 towards registration/travel costs of attending ESA. Early Career participants must give an oral presentation and all participants must be present a minimum of 3 FULL days of ESA. We will add an informal breakfast to encourage networking among participants (they self-organized this year). We can request up to \$10,000, but most awards will be <\$5,000. We ran last year's program on \$2,000, but if we ask for \$3,000, we can fund 15 pairs and/or ask for extra funding for a more formal meet-and-greet or a related mentoring event, or to increase the award amount. Funds are for 2016, but there are avenues for requesting continuing funding for the future.</p>
- Who: Sarah Supp will write long-range planning grant to get sustaining funds for this program, so it can be repeated annually. She may ask officers to read/edit the draft before it is sent. (Related: Supp and others on planning team can compile post-assessment results and write a brief report for the winter edition of ESA Bulletin. Review and highlight participants in a short article, as well as need for effective mentoring in getting to the next career stage.)

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Making a lactation-friendly meeting (2 parts)

1. Ensure nursing mothers room(s)

• What: Coordination with local event staff to ensure that one or more appropriate rooms is properly designated for nursing mothers to nurse or breast pump. Will need to include comfortable and appropriate places to sit, table-like surface, electrical outlets, and refrigerator. (Such facilities have been lacking from the ESA conferences, even when requested in advance by at least one attendee.).

2. Ensure that family members and caregivers can get in FREE to ESA to hand off babies who need to nurse

- What: Apparently, it's pretty common for family members who are bringing a baby to an ESA attendee mom to nurse to be turned away from the convention center because they don't have a badge! Note that these adults are *only* there to facilitate the attendance of the lactating mom -- they're not going to social functions or seeing talks or anything. In a brief email on the matter, ESA indicated that though they were willing to consider the matter, they thought the \$45 guest fee was a reasonable fee for these caregivers. But this is not a family-friendly policy at all. A solution is needed to allow caregivers to enter the convention center for free to facilitate nursing. Whether this is a separate category, an exemption to the "guest" rule or whatever can be left up to discussion. ESA's initial email, though, suggests that we may need a petition in this particular case.

That would incentivize more people to become ESA members, and also publishing in ESA journals, since the initial fee would be a sunk cost. I'm not sure on the numbers exactly, and obviously this is long-term, in light of the new deal just inked with Wiley, but I think it might work well.... and at least is food for thought.
